

Acts 27 selections

As soon as arrangements were complete for our sailing to Italy, Paul and a few other prisoners were placed under the supervision of a centurion named Julius, a member of an elite guard. We boarded a ship that was bound for Ephesus and ports west. Julius treated Paul most decently.

We sailed north under the protection of the northeast shore of Cyprus because winds out of the west were against us, and then along the coast westward to the port of Myra. There the centurion found an Egyptian ship headed for Italy and transferred us on board. We ran into bad weather and found it impossible to stay on course. After much difficulty, we finally made it to the southern coast of the island of Crete and docked at Good Harbor (appropriate name!).

We had passed the autumn equinox, so it would be stormy weather from now on through the winter, too dangerous for sailing. Paul warned, "I see only disaster ahead for cargo and ships—to say nothing of our lives!—if we put out to sea now."

The centurion set Paul's warning aside and let the ship captain and the shipowner talk him into trying for the next harbor. But they were no sooner out to sea than a gale-force wind, the infamous nor'easter, struck. They lost all control of the ship. It was a cork in the storm.

Next day, out on the high seas again and badly damaged now by the storm, we dumped the cargo overboard. The third day the sailors lightened the ship further by throwing off all the tackle and provisions. It had been many days since we had seen either sun or stars. Wind and waves were battering us unmercifully, and we lost all hope of rescue.

With our appetite for both food and life long gone, Paul took his place in our midst and said, "Friends, from now on, things are looking up! Last night God's angel stood at my side, an angel of this God I serve, saying to me, 'Don't give up, Paul. You're going to stand before Caesar yet—and everyone sailing with you is also going to make it.' So, dear friends, take heart. I believe God will do exactly what he told me. But we're going to shipwreck."

With dawn about to break, Paul called everyone together and proposed breakfast: "This is the fourteenth day we've gone without food. None of us has felt like eating! But I urge you to eat something now. You'll need strength for the rescue ahead. You're going to come out of this without even a scratch!" He broke the bread, gave thanks to God, passed it around, and they all ate heartily—276 of us, all told! With the meal finished and everyone full, the ship was further lightened by dumping the grain overboard.

At daybreak, no one recognized the land—but then they did notice a bay with a nice beach. They decided to try to run the ship up on the beach. They cut the anchors, loosed the tiller, raised the sail, and ran before the wind toward the beach. But we didn't make it. Still far from shore, we hit a reef and the ship began to break up.

The soldiers decided to kill the prisoners so none could escape by swimming, but the centurion, determined to save Paul, stopped them. He gave orders for anyone who could swim to dive in and go for it, and for the rest to grab a plank. Everyone made it to shore safely.

to proclaim Jesus, crucified and risen, our judge and our hope.





TODAY'S MUSIC

Our prelude this morning, *Slane*, is a chorale variation on the same Irish melody you will hear in the Offertory. Noel Rawsthorne (1929 - 2019) was an English organist and composer. Marcel Dupré, famous French organist and composer, was one of his teachers. Rawsthorne became organist of Liverpool Cathedral.

What a Covenant is also known to us as Leaning on the Everlasting Arms, the first words of the refrain. The text is by Eisha Hoffman (1879 - 1939). He was educated at Union Seminary and served a number of Congregational churches during the term of his ministry. The tune, SHOWALTER, takes the name of its composer A. J. Showalter (1858 - 1924). He composed more than 100 hymns. He grew up and was deeply influenced by the American shaped-note tradition, which includes famous hymnals like The Sacred Harp.

Be Still My Soul uses a tune called FINLANDIA, because the melody was composed by Jean Sibelius (1865–1957) as part of his famous tone poem by the same name that honored his homeland. The original German text is by Kathrina von Schlegel (1697–17??) and it was translated into English by Scottish Jane Borthwick (1813–1897), who translated and composed many hymn texts.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. The translation was made in 1905 from the original Gaelic by Mary E. Bryne (1880 - 1931), who was born in Ireland. This arrangement is by Dan Forrest (b. 1978), who has composed a great deal of religious music. His undergraduate education was completed at Bob Jones University.

I Will Lift the Cloud of Night was composed and text also written by Charles P. Jones (1865–1949) in 1910. The tune is the composer's last name, JONES. The Reverend Jones was an African American and founder of the Church of Christ. He composed more than 1,000 gospel hymns, both music and texts.

Golden Breaks the Dawn uses a Chinese tune, LE P'ING, which was composed by Zhao Zichen (1888 - 1979). We can thank the editors of our New Century Hymnal (our Black Hymnal) who reached beyond traditional western music and text sources to include this and other hymns from wider cultural resources. Zhao Zichen was raised as a buddhist, but during his education at a missionary school, he became a Christian. He received his master's degree and Bachelor of Divinity from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, TN. He then returned to China to teach. He survived the Communist revolution and the Cultural revolution as well. Sadly, he had a crisis of faith during his "re-education."

Hayward McCrary is a gospel musician and actor. In 1986, he received the ASCAP Duke Ellington Award. He has done arrangements for Michael Jackson, Quincy Jones, and Earth, Wind, and Fire to name just a few. *Sunshine Day* is the theme song from *The Brady Bunch*. Its upbeat melody certainly speaks to our spiritual needs at this time.
