



TODAY'S MUSIC

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685 - 1750) had the ability and genius to turn even musical exercises into incredible art. Prime examples would include both books of the *Well-Tempered Clavier* and the source of this morning's **Prelude**. Bach composed six trio sonatas for the organ. We heard a Largo from the *5th Trio Sonata* two weeks ago. "Trio" means that there is one voice each for the right hand, left hand and pedal. That must be easy, right? Hardly! Every organist knows that these seemingly "simple" pieces are a supreme test of an organist's technical skill; oh, and they are beautiful too.

The tune, ROYAL OAK, adapted for the text, ***All Things Bright and Beautiful***, is an English folk song, probably from the 17th century. It is a part of a long tradition of the church adapting secular songs for sacred or liturgical purposes – in this case a patriotic song extolling King Charles II. The text is by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818 - 1895). She began composing poetry and hymn texts in childhood. As the wife of the Anglican prelate of Ireland, she devoted herself to service of the poor and sick.

The text for ***For The Beauty of the Earth*** was written by Folliott S. Pierpont (1835 - 1917). In the spring of 1863, Pierpont sat on a hill above his home of Bath, England, and this text flowed from his gratitude for the wonders of nature. The tune DIX was composed by German composer Konrad Kocher (1786 - 1872). He was trained as a teacher and eventually founded the School for Sacred Song in Stuttgart.

Spirit of the Living God was written in 1926 by Daniel Iverson (1890 - 1977) and gets its tune name, IVERSON, from the author/composer. Mr. Iverson was inspired to compose this hymn after hearing a sermon on the Holy Spirit at an evangelism crusade.

Won't You Let Me Be Your Servant, tune title THE SERVANT SONG, is a relatively new hymn composed in 1977 by Richard Gillard (b. 1953). Gillard was born in England, but moved to New Zealand when he was only 3 years old. He is a self-trained musician.

Avinu malkeynu is one of Max Janowski's (1912 - 1991) most performed works and is a prayer made on Rosh Hashanah for another year of blessing. Max Janowski was Cantor and Director of Music at KAM-Isaiah Israel Congregation in Chicago for 50 years. Kurt and Terry Hansen sang with him for his last 17 years. Mr. Janowski was truly one of the "great lights" of Jewish music of the 20th century. This anthem was composed on the kitchen table of the Rabbi of KAM in 1967, Jacob Weinstein.

O God Beyond All Praising is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934). The tune is called THAXTED, which is the main theme of the Jupiter movement from Holst's *The Planets*. It is truly a majestic hymn. Thaxted is the village where Holst grew up. It was Ralph Vaughan Williams that adapted "Thaxted" as a hymn. The author of our text is Michael A. Perry (1942–1996). He began studies as a physicist and changed to theology.

From the Top of My Head was composed by Roy Hargrove (1969 - 2018), an American jazz trumpet player, a two time Grammy winner, who played primarily in what is called a “hard bop” style. He led the group RH Factor which combined jazz, funk, hip-hop, soul, and gospel. The lyrics are by Gerald Levert (1966 - 2006).


