



POSTLUDE

Toccata and Fugue in d minor, BWV 565 Kevin Dzierzawski, organ J. S. Bach

TODAY'S MUSIC

The music for *Ode to Joy*, which we know as *Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee*, was composed by Beethoven (1770-1827) and is the chorale melody from the final movement of his Ninth Symphony (1824). Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

There is no better way for a church with a strong German heritage to celebrate the Reformation than by bookending our service with *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*, the great Martin Luther (1483 - 1546) hymn. It is arguably his greatest hymn, encapsulating the theology of the Lutheran Church. The Introit is the original almost dance-like rhythmic version that Luther composed and congregations of that time sang. The recessional hymn presents a more majestic march. The final stanza is a harmonization of the final chorale by Bach (1685–1750) from his cantata, BVW 80, which bears the tune name, EIN FESTE BURG .

Sing Praise to God is another great hymn from our German heritage. The tune, LOBE DEN HERRN, is the first line of the first stanza of the German text. First published in a hymnal in 1668, the composer is unknown. The original text was written by Joachim

Neander (1650 - 1680). Although he was reported to have spent a "riotous youth," he became the first important hymn writer of the German Reformed Church.

All That I Am was composed by William Grant Still (1895 – 1978). He was an influential and important African American composer. His *Afro-American Symphony* was premiered by the Eastman Rochester Orchestra in 1931, and was performed by 34 other American and European orchestras in the 1930s. He was the first African American to conduct a major symphony orchestra. He wrote operas, chamber music, and vocal music in addition to works for orchestra. His wife, Verna Arvey (1910 – 1987), was a journalist and pianist who provided texts and inspiration to her husband's music. Ms. Arvey was not African American, so she and Still overcame a double social prejudice in addition to raising a family and producing great art together.

Now Thank We All Our God is a translation by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) of the original German by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) written 1636. Winkworth, although born in England, spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's rights. Rinkart became a scholar at St. Thomas School in Leipzig where Bach would later be Kapellmeister. The tune, NUN DANKET, takes its name from the first words of the German text. It is most often attributed to Johann Crüger (1558-1662), who in reality was the publisher of the *Psalter* where this hymn tune first appeared.

Guide My Feet is another uplifting spiritual from the African American tradition. It is one of the many songs sung during marches in the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960s. The believer asks God to guide them on the path of life.

We Are Not Alone was composed in 2005 with text and music by Pepper Choplin. Mr Choplin is a full-time composer, choral conductor, and humorist. He has conducted premieres of his works at Carnegie Hall, but still resides in his home town of Raleigh, North Carolina. For us at St. Pauls, the opening text is well known from the last two lines of our Statement of Faith, "... We are not alone. Thanks be to God." This anthem was purchased in gratitude for Breanna Coe's online choral leadership during our time of virtual worship 2020 to 2021.

The postlude, *Toccata and Fugue in d minor, BWV 565*, is arguably the most well known of Bach's works for the organ. Sadly, it is often thought of as "spooky" and associated with Halloween and Disney's *Fantasia*. Toccata is an Italian term meaning "touched." A toccata is supposed to highlight the organist's technique with improvisatory sounding flourishes, while also demonstrating the varying colors within a pipe organ. Fugue is a highly sophisticated imitative form, like a round with voices entering at different times, creating a layered soundscape that can be compared to the many small pieces of stained glass in our windows creating a larger picture or design.
