TODAY'S MUSIC

Lord, Don't Move That Mountain lyrics and music were written by Doris Mae Akers (1923-1995), a famous African American gospel composer, arranger, and singer. This is another gospel song that Mahallia Jackson sang and this arrangement is by Brendan Henry.

When the Saints Go Marching In has both a text and tune unattributed, but it was first published in 1896. The most famous use of this rousing hymn is in New Orleans at the close of a burial service when the mourners and band leave the cemetery joyfully declaring the departed to be a saint and singing the hope that all of us "will be in that number, when the saints go marching in."

The text for *Blessed Assurance* was penned by one of the most famous American hymnodists, Fanny Crosby (1820–1915). She wrote literally hundreds of hymn texts that were set to music by many composers. To be taken seriously, she used at least 20 pseudonyms, at least half of them male names. She became blind as an infant at 6 weeks of age. The tune ASSURANCE was composed in 1873 by Phoebe Palmer Knapp (1839–1908). She was the daughter of a Methodist evangelist. She married at age 16 the founder of Metropolitan Life Insurance and composed more than 500 gospel songs in her lifetime.

The text for *His Eye Is on the Sparrow* was written in 1905 by Civilia D. Martin (1866-1948). She accompanied her baptist minister husband on his evangelical work; however, her frail health often kept her at home. One can speculate that she felt like the sparrow in her hymn. The composer, Charles Gabriel (1856-1932), was also the author of thousands of hymn texts and songs, including *I Love to Tell the Story.* He grew up on a farm in Iowa and later in life authored a book on gospel music.

Rollo Dilworth's (b. 1970) setting of the energetic spiritual *No Rocks A-Cryin'* dates from 2001 and the spiritual text is based on Psalm 47. We actually have a double connection to Dr. Dilworth. Our alto section leader sang with him when she was a student and premiered this anthem when he was Director of Choral Activities at North Park University. This past year, Dr. Dilworth was a guest lecturer for St. Pauls on Zoom. He shared with us some of the history of "Spirituals, Social Justice and Cultural Appropriation." He received his Doctorate of Musical Arts in Choral Conducting from the Bienen School of Music at Northwestern University, and he is now the Chair of Music Education and Therapy at Temple University. His many choral works are published by Hal Leonard.

The music for *Sweet Hour of Prayer* was composed in 1861 by William Bradbury (1816-1868), a prodigious composer of hymns with many authors including Fanny Crosby (1820-1915). William W. Walingford (1772-1850) composed the text in 1845. He was a blind English, self-taught preacher.

Andraé Crouch (1942–2015) wrote both the text and tune for *How Can I Say Thanks*, MY TRIBUTE, in 1971. Crouch is among the greatest gospel composers and performers. Both his mother and father were pastors. He first began playing services for his father's church at age 11. The opening lines of the refrain, *To God be the glory*, pays homage to Fanny Crosby by quoting her famous hymn text.

Great Is Thy Faithfulness, tune FAITHFULNESS, dates from 1923 and was composed by William M. Runyan (1870 - 1957). He finished his ministry in Kansas and was particularly fond of the poet Thomas Chisholm (1866 - 1960), who wrote this text. Runyan set 25 of Chisholm's poems to music. Chisholm based this text on Lamentation 3:22 & 23: *Because of the Lord's great love, we are not consumed.*

Joseph Medicott Scriven (1819–1886) wrote the famous text for *What a Friend We Have in Jesus* in 1855. He was an Irish immigrant to Canada. His life was full of ill health and grief, which he worked out in Christian poetry. The tune, ERIE, is also known as CONVERSE and was composed in 1868 by John C. Converse (1832–1918) who grew up in Erie, PA, which explains both tune names. He was an attorney who also composed "church songs." He studied both law and music in Leipzig before returning to this country.

The text for *Amazing Grace* is by John Newton (1725–1807), who was a slave ship captain, but became an Anglican clergyman and fervent abolitionist. He once said that writing this text saved his soul. The tune, NEW BRITAIN, is most likely an African American spiritual and was first published in 1829.

Our *Festival Doxology* is to the German hymn tune *Lasst uns erfreuen*, dates from 1623, and was first found in a hymnal published in Cologne, Germany.

All Are Welcome is a recently composed hymn and one of our favorites from a past hymnefest. The tune is TWO OAKS. It dates from 1994 and the words and music were both created by Marty Haugen (b. 1950), an American composer of numerous hymns and liturgical music. This hymn was shared with Kurt R. Hansen by a college friend, Alisa Kasmir, and it has quickly become an anthem of St. Pauls' Open And Affirming ministry.

Mayor Lightfoot and the Chicago City Council passed a budget for 2022 which includes historic investments in climate mitigation, resiliency, and environmental justice. Important community-driven initiatives to be implemented include:

- Planting 75,000 new trees across the city over the next five years
- Building 20 new Spaces to Grow green schoolyards
- Neighborhood park improvements
- Community-driven investments in the Little Calumet River Initiative
