

This is the last Sunday of the church year. The new church year begins next week with the First Sunday in Advent. TODAY'S MUSIC

Thomas Dorsey (1899-1993) is truly the originator of gospel music, a fusion of church music with jazz. He is a Chicago original and beloved worldwide. He wrote *There'll Be Peace in the Valley for Me* in 1939 for Mahilia Jackson (1911-1972). It was the first gospel recording to sell more than 1 million copies. It has been covered by singers from country and western singer Red Foley (1910-1968) to Elvis Presley (1935-1977).

The Countless Hosts in White Array is a Norwegian folk melody from the 17th century. DEN STORE HVIDE FLOK, which is the tune name, is the first line of the Norwegian poem by Hans Adolf Brorson (1694-1764), who composed the poem c. 1760. Helen A. Dickinson (1875-957) provided the translation into English in 1907. This hymn arrangement was by one of Norway's most famous composers, Edvard Grieg (1843-1907). Among Grieg's many great works is the *Peer Gynt Suite* and his *Piano Concerto*.

The text for *For the Beauty of the Earth* was written by Folliott S. Pierpoint (1835 - 1917). In the spring of 1863, Pierpont sat on a hill above his home in Bath, England, and this text flowed from his gratitude for the wonders of nature. The tune DIX was composed by German composer Konrad Kocher (1786 -1872). He was trained as a teacher and eventually founded the School for Sacred Song in Stuttgart.

The tune, KREMSER, is an unattributed Dutch folksong and dates from the 16th century. We also know a more traditional Thanksgiving text in English, *We Gather Together to Ask the Lord's Blessing*. The text of this version, **We Praise You, O God, Our Redeemer, Creator,** was written by Julia C. Cory (1882-1963) in 1902. Because her father was a Sunday school superintendent and an amateur hymn writer, Julia began composing hymn texts at a very early age.

The text for *Child of Blessing, Child of Promise* was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal *Psalmodia Sacra* the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), nearly 100 were composed by him. He was Kapellmeister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. As an interesting side note, Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, is currently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musick in Stuttgart.

Now Thank We All Our God is a translation by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) of the original German by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) written in 1636. Winkworth, although born in England, spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's rights. Rinkart became a scholar at St. Thomas School in Leipzig where Bach would later be Kapellmeister. The tune, NUN DANKET, takes its name from the first words of the German text. It is most often attributed to Johann Crüger (1558-1662), who in reality was the publisher of the psalter where this hymn tune first appeared.

Goin'Home is an anthem based on a beautiful theme in the Symphony No. 9, "From the New World" by Antonin Dvořák (1841-1904). Dvořák was a Czech composer who spent a very important part of his career in the United States. He was deeply affected by folk music of his Bohemian heritage, so it is not surprising that during his time in our country that he was also moved by the African American spirituals he heard. The famous African American composer Harry T Burleigh worked with Dvořák, so for many years, it was assumed that the tune we associate with Goin' Home was a spiritual Dvořák had heard. The problem is that there is no record of a spiritual with that title or melody. It is a tribute to Dvořák that he created a melody that was an homage to a musical genre that was foreign to him but also tugged at the roots of his love for Bohemian folk music. The words were added in 1922 by one of his American students, William Arms Fischer, who expressed the hope and belief of life beyond death just close by, through an open door.

The author of the text of *For All the Saints* was William Walsham How (1823-1897). He penned the poetry we love so much in 1864. How was an Oxford graduate and served many parishes in England throughout his life. Just to prove there can be a sense of humor even in hymn tune names, SINE NOMINE, means "no name" in Latin. The stirring music was written in 1906 by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). He is one of the greatest English composers of the post-Victorian era. He composed music for nearly all genres of performance.

The **Finale** from *Symphony No. 4 in F minor, Op 13 No. 4* was composed by Charles-Marie Widor (1844-1937) and dates from 1872. Along with Louis Vièrne, Widor was one of the great Romantic symphonists for organ. Vièrne was one of his students, as was Marcel Dupré. He was born into a family of organ builders. He composed 10 symphonies for the organ. He was also the organist of Saint-Sulpice in Paris from 1870 to 1933. This Finale has been eclipsed in popularity by his Toccata from his *Symphony No. 5 in F minor, Opus 42, No. 1*, but it shows his brilliance as both a composer and his own talent as a performer.
