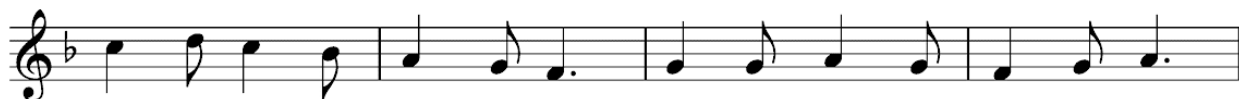

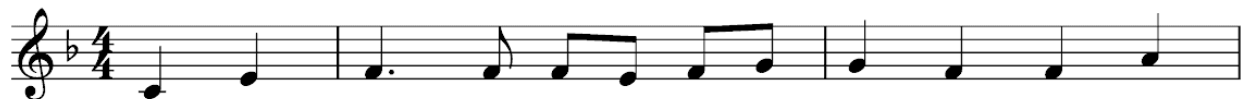

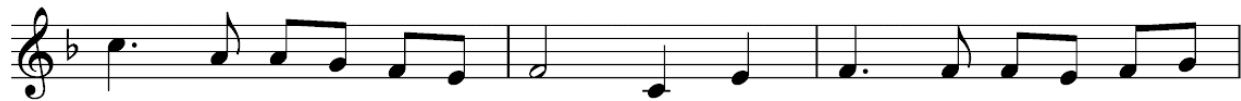

TODAY'S MUSIC

Rejoice! - Richard Smallwood (b. 1948) is one of the top composers and performers of Gospel music. His group, The Richard Smallwood Singers, has toured the world. He is a graduate of Howard University, which also counts Vice President Kamala Harris and so many other luminaries as alumni. He was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall Of Fame in 2006.

The Introit, ***From Heaven Above Unto Earth I Come***, is one of the most recognised German Christmas hymns. The original music and text are both by Martin Luther (1483-1546), the founder of the Lutheran Church and the cause of the Reformation. The hymn had 15 stanzas (!), and Luther used it as a “game hymn” about the birth of Christ. The tune, VOM HIMMEL HOCH, takes its name from the first line of text in German.

Good Christian Friends, Rejoice is a translation of the original Latin by John Mason Neale (1818-1886). He was born into an evangelical home, became an Anglican clergy, but had real sympathies for Catholicism. IN DULCI JUBILO, which means “in sweet rejoicing,” is an early undated folk dance.

The original text for ***Away in a Manger*** was written by Martin Luther (1483-1546) for his own children. The familiar English text for the first stanza is unattributed. The tune, MUELLER, was composed by American James R. Murray (1841-1905). He was a friend of another great 19th century American hymnodist, William Bradbury. He also fought in the Civil War.

Theodore Baker (1851-1934) translated the original German into the English we love, ***Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming***. He was born in New York City and immigrated to Germany, where he spent the rest of his life. His famously created *Baker's Biographical Dictionary of Musicians* was first published in 1900. ES IST EIN' ROS was first published in 1599 in the Cöln Gesangbuch.

Once in Royal David's City became popularized as the traditional opening carol of the “Festival of Lessons and Carols” broadcast each year from King's College Chapel at Cambridge in England. The text was composed in 1848, not long after the founding of our St. Pauls, by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895), the wife of the bishop of Ireland. She wrote many hymn texts specifically for children. The tune, IRBY, was composed in 1849 by Henry J. Gauntlett (1805-1876). Gauntlett became the organist at his father's church, and after beginning a career in law, gave it up to become a full-time church musician. He even held patents on organ mechanical parts.

The Work of Christmas was composed in 2014 by Dan Forrest (b. 1978), who is a prolific composer and arranger of Christian music. He is on the faculty at Wheaton College. Howard Washington Thurman (1899-1981) was a prominent Black American author, theologian and civil rights leader. As a prominent pastor, he played a leading role in many social justice movements in the 20th century.

God Rest You Merry, Gentlemen is an English carol from the 18th century with an unattributed text and source for the tune. The tune, GOD REST YOU, obviously takes its name from the first words of the first stanza.

Angels We Have Heard on High is originally an 18th century French Noël (carol) freely translated by James Chadwick (1813-1882), an Irish Catholic priest. GLORIA is from the text of the joyfully cascading Latin refrain, which we sing as a Benediction Response after Christmas and during Epiphany.

The ***Trumpet Tune on the Sussex Carol*** was arranged by David Lasky (b. 1957). He earned both a Bachelor of Music degree and a Master of Music degree in Organ Performance from the University of Massachusetts at Lowell. He is an active organist and composer with many published works. The SUSSEX CAROL is more often known to us with the text *On Christmas Night All Christians Sing*. The carol is a traditional melody made into a hymn by the famous 20th century British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams (1871-1958).

CREATION CORNER - provided by Green Team

If you don't have a dishwasher, try these tips for hand-washing to reduce waste. If you have two sinks, plug them and place hot water with detergent in one and plain water for rinse in the other. If you do not have two sinks, use some other type of container. Another option is to try using a little water to get sponge soapy/wet and then turn water off until you're ready to rinse multiple dishes. The overall goal is to avoid letting water run.
