

## SCRIPTURE

Thomas Clancy

### *Matthew 2:1-12*

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage."

When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born.

They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.



All are welcome.*





## TODAY'S MUSIC

***Of the Father's Love Begotten*** is a chant melody from the 13th century. The melody inspires both the Prelude and the Introit. The tune, DIVINUM MISTERIUM, translates as “divine mystery,” which certainly describes how God chose to come to be with us. The author of the Latin was Aurelius Clemens Prudentius (348-410), a Spanish poet, devoted believer, and lawyer. The translations were made by John M. Neale (1818-1866), who was born into an English evangelical home but developed great sympathies for Catholicism, and Sir Henry Wiliam Baker (1821-1877), an Anglican priest who wrote a number of hymn texts, among them *The King of Love My Shepherd Is*. Wilbur Held (1914-2015), who arranged the Prelude setting, has an actual Chicago connection. He was born in Des Plaines, studied at the American Conservatory with Leo Sowerby, and became Sowerby's assistant for seven years at St. James Cathedral in the Loop. In addition to having been an active composer, he was also very involved in the American Guild of Organists and was Professor of Organ Studies at The Ohio State University for more than 30 years.

***We Three Kings*** is a truly American hymn. It was composed in 1857 by an Episcopalian priest, John H. Hopkins (1820–1891). His father was the Bishop of Vermont. Hopkins was also an ecclesiologist, which means he was interested in church art. He designed stained glass and other church ornaments.

***In the Bleak Midwinter*** text was composed by Christina Georgina Rossetti (1830–1894) in 1872. She was a prolific English poet. The tune, CRANHAM, is by Gustav Holst (1874-1934), who is best known as the composer of *The Planets*.

***O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright*** is a famous German tune, *Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern*, composed in 1599 by Philipp Nicolai (1446–1608). Catherine Winkworth (1827–1878) translated the German. Having been raised in Dresden, she was well known for her translation of German chorales.

***Nova, Nova*** is an example of a teaching song. At a time when very few could read, music in the vernacular, drama, worship, and even stained glass windows were used as teaching tools to tell the stories in the Bible. The title is a pun on the Latin words “ave” meaning, “hail” (“Hail Mary, the Lord is with Thee,” the greeting of the angel in Luke 1:2) and “Eva,” meaning Eve, the partner of Adam. Eve's name during the 15<sup>th</sup> century was synonymous with the story of “original sin.” Eve's name is inverted to form “ave,” i.e., “hail,” a greeting to Mary, whose child will release us from sin.

***As With Gladness Those of Old*** is set to the tune DIX, which was composed by W. Chatterton Dix (1837–1898). Mr. Dix also composed the original lyrics. He was a Scottish insurance company manager who also published a number of volumes of hymns.

***Angels We Have Heard on High*** is originally an 18th century French Noël (carol) freely translated by James Chadwick (1813-1882), an Irish Catholic priest. GLORIA is from the text of the joyfully cascading Latin refrain, which we sing as a Benediction response after Christmas and during Epiphany.
