If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.



POSTLUDE

TODAY'S MUSIC

Liebster Jesu, wir sind hier, Dearest Jesus, We Are Here, is a chorale prelude, which is a compositional genre where the composer creates an "arrangement" using a well known melody as a theme. The chorale, hymn, and melody was composed by Benjamin Schmolk (1672-1737). Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) thought so highly of this chorale that he set it for organ four times throughout his life.

The Introit for today uses the second and fourth stanzas of *Gracious Spirit, Holy Ghost* because of their poetic reference to our scripture lesson. The text was written in 1862 by Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885). He was the great nephew of the great Lake Poet William Wordsworth. He became a prominent Anglican priest and prolific writer of prose and poetry. The much more contemporary tune, ANDERSON, was composed in 1985 by Jane Marshall (1924-2019). She was born, raised and educated in Dallas, Texas. She became a pianist and organist as a teenager and composed more than 200 hymns.

The music for *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* (ODE TO JOY) was composed by Beethoven (1770-1827) and is the chorale melody from the final movement of his *Symphony No. 9* (1824). The original German text (1785) was by the famous poet and dramatist Friedrich Schiller (1759-1805), and the English text was composed in 1907 by Henry Van Dyke (1852-1933). Van Dyke was an American author and clergy who was also appointed ambassador to the Netherlands by President Woodrow Wilson prior to the outbreak of World War I.

Craig Curry, whose arrangement of *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* is used for our Postlude, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

Jesus Loves Me This I Know is one of the first hymns many children learn. The words are both simple and profound. They were written in 1859 by Anna Bartlett Warner (1824-1915). She was born in New York City, wrote many hymn texts and collaborated with her sister Sarah on novels. The composer of the tune, JESUS LOVES ME, is William Bradbury (1816–1868). He penned this sweet melody in 1861. He also composed the famous hymn *Just As I Am*.

My Song Is Love Unknown is a hymn text written in 1664 by Samuel Crossman (1623-1684). Very little is known about his life beyond the fact that he was clergy. The one observation is how clearly this text speaks to us across more than four centuries. The tune, RHOSYMEDRE, was composed in 1840 by John David Edwards (1806-1885). He was an Anglican priest and the tune name is taken from one of the parishes he served in Wales.

O Love That Will Not Let Me Go is a text written in 1882 by Scottish minister George Matheson (1842-1906). He lost his sight as a child, but had a brilliant career as a lecturer, author, and minister. The tune, ST. MARGARET, was composed in 1884 by Albert L. Peace (1844-1912). He was born in Yorkshire, England, began as a gifted self-taught musician, went on to earn a doctorate in music from Oxford, served as the organist at the Glasgow Cathedral, and was a prominent recitalist.

Simple Song is from *Mass*, which premiered in 1971. The music was composed by Leonard Bernstein (1918-1990) and lyrics were written by Stephen Schwartz (b. 1948). Although Bernstein was Jewish, he spoke about how deeply the text of the Latin Mass affected him. His *Mass* is a theatrical work bordering on opera that deals with the faith struggles of young people during the Vietnam era. In *Simple Song*, Schwartz cleverly uses the Latin word for praise, *lauda*, as a sweet form of jazz scat within the English text.

E.A. Hoffman (1839-1929) wrote the text for *What a Covenant*, that many of us learned as *What a Fellowship*, in 1877. He was an ordained minister and wrote more than 2,000 gospel songs in his lifetime. The tune bears two names, LEANING, which is the first word of the refrain, and SHOWALTER, in honor of the composer, A. J. Showalter (1858-1924). He actually began teaching shape-note singing at age 14. He attended a number of private Christian music programs to learn his craft.
