

Luke 7:36-50

One of the Pharisees asked Jesus to eat with him, and he went into the Pharisee's house and took his place at the table. And a woman in the city, who was a sinner, having learned that he was eating in the Pharisee's house, brought an alabaster jar of ointment. She stood behind him at his feet, weeping, and began to bathe his feet with her tears and to dry them with her hair. Then she continued kissing his feet and anointing them with the ointment.

Now when the Pharisee who had invited him saw it, he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet, he would have known who and what kind of woman this is who is touching him—that she is a sinner."

TODAY'S MUSIC

Spirit of the Living God was written in 1926 by Daniel Iverson (1890-1977) and gets its tune name, IVERSON, from the author/composer. Mr. Iverson was inspired to compose this hymn after hearing a sermon on the Holy Spirit at an evangelism crusade.

The text for ***Love Divine, All Loves Excelling*** was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788). His brother, John, was the founder of the Methodist faith. The words are set to the famous Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL composed by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887) when he was only 19. We also sing this tune to the text *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven*. This text is one of the few that is the source of a "hymn battle" over which tune to sing. The other well-known tune for this text is BEECHER.

There Is a Balm in Gilead is a Black Spiritual. In the Hebrew Bible, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed that this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief of their oppression. This great spiritual is also the inspiration for our Prelude and arranged by our own Brendan Henry.

Help Us Accept Each Other is a text written in 1975 by Fred Kahn (1929-2009). He was born in the Netherlands and survived the Nazi occupation. Many of his hymn texts focus on peace. He became a Congregational minister in England. AURELIA, which means "golden," was composed by Samuel S. Wesley (1810-1876) in 1864 and was originally set to a Wesley text, *Jerusalem, the Golden*. Wesley was English and strove throughout his career to improve church music and the lives of church musicians. We know the tune to the more familiar words *The Church's One Foundation*.

I Can Tell the World, a truly uplifting Black spiritual, was arranged in 1998. In his all too brief life, Moses Hogan (1957-2003) continued and amplified the great tradition of spiritual arrangement that includes William Dawson. He recorded a number of compact disks and did solo arrangements for singers like Kathleen Battle. He was commissioned by St. Pauls to write a piece, *I Got a Home in-a Dat Rock*, in honor of Ron McCowan's 25 years of service to this congregation.

God of Grace and God of Glory has, for us, the unusual Welsh tune name CWM RHONNDA. The text we know is by the famous American author and Baptist clergy, Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969). He wrote this text in 1930. The well known tune was composed in 1905 by John Hughes (1873-1932). He had very little formal education and became a deacon and precentor, lay minister positions, in his Baptist church. He wrote this tune for a Welsh Baptist choral festival.
