SCRIPTURE Ephesians 2, selections

You let the world, which doesn't know the first thing about living, tell you how to live. You filled your lungs with polluted unbelief, and then exhaled disobedience. We all did it. It's a wonder God didn't lose his temper and do away with the whole lot of us. Instead, rich in mercy and with an incredible love, he embraced us. He took our sin-dead lives and made us alive in Christ.

Don't take any of this for granted. Only yesterday you once-Gentiles were utter strangers to the commonwealth of Israel. Unlike us once-Jews, you had no knowledge of, or right to, the promises of God. You had nothing to look forward to and no God to whom you could turn. But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. He is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the hostility between us. He has abolished the law and made a new kind of human being, a fresh start for everybody.

Christ brought us together through his death on the cross. Christ came and preached peace to you outsiders and peace to us insiders. He treated us as equals, and so made us equals. You're no longer wandering exiles. This kingdom of faith is now your home country. You're no longer strangers or outsiders. You *belong* here, with as much right to the name Christian as anyone. God is building a home. He's using you, fitting you in brick by brick, stone by stone, with Christ Jesus as the cornerstone that holds all the parts together. We see it taking shape day after day—a holy temple built by God, all of us built into it, a temple in which God is quite at home.



TODAY'S MUSIC

To My Humble Supplication is a text composed in 1620 by Joseph Bryan (dates unknown). The tune, GENEVAN 86, derives its name from a famous psalter published in Geneva, Switzerland in 1551. Each psalm setting was assigned its number corresponding to the same number in the Book of Psalms. Among other tunes we still sing from the *Genevan Psalter* is *Comfort, Comfort Ye My People*.

Sing Praise to God is another great hymn from our German heritage. The tune, LOBE DEN HERRN, is the first line of the first stanza of the German text. The composer is unknown and it was first published in a hymnal in 1668. The original text was written by Joachim Neander (1650-1680). Although he was reported to have had a "riotous youth," he became the first important hymn writer of the German Reform Church. This updated translation was made in 1993 for our *New Century Hymnal* by Madeleine Forell Marshall (b. 1946).

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and also has a doctorate in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and is first found in the great American shape-note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing, to the tune NETTLETON, is from the rich American tradition of the Sacred Harp hymnals, specifically *Wyeth's Repository Of Sacred Music*. The text was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790), who began his professional life as an apprentice to a hairdresser before committing himself to a religious life.

This arrangement of *Lord, I Want to Be a Christian* was composed in 1995 by Moses Hogan (1957-2003). In his all too brief life, Mr. Hogan continued and amplified the great tradition of spiritual arrangement that includes William Dawson. He recorded a number of compact discs and provided solo arrangements for singers like Kathleen Battle. He was commissioned by St. Pauls to write an anthem, *I Got a Home in-a Dat Rock*, in honor of Ron McCowan's 25 years of service to this congregation. Mr. Hogan invited Ron and our Chancel Choir to sing that anthem with his professional choir when they sang in Chicago.

In the Cross of Christ I Glory is a text written in 1825 by John Bowring (1792-1872). He was an English Unitarian and became a member of Parliament. His text is decidedly Christian. RATHBURN was composed in 1851 by Ithamar Conkley (1815-1867). Conkley was an American of Scottish descent. He became a professional bass and also organist in New York City.

A Prayer of Saint Patrick was composed in 1982 by John Rutter (b. 1945). The text is from a 5th century manuscript, *St. Patrick's Breastplate*, and was translated from the Gaelic into English by Cecil Francis Alexander (1818-1895). She translated numerous hymns from Gaelic and also wrote her own original hymn texts. The most famous of hers is *All Things Bright and Beautiful*. John Rutter is certainly a well-known contemporary English composer. Our Chancel Choir has sung anthems and larger works by him in past years.

Needed Items: cereal (whole grain, less sugar varieties), nuts, brown rice, jelly/jam (low sugar), peanut butter (natural, no hydrogenated oils), cooking oil, pasta sauce (low sodium), soup (low sodium), easy prep meals (e.g., Hamburger Helper, low sodium or whole grain varieties if possible), ground coffee, toothpaste, deodorant, disposable razors, shampoo, conditioner, mouthwash.
