Luke 24:13–35

That same day two of them were walking to the village Emmaus, about seven miles out of Jerusalem. They were deep in conversation, going over all these things that had happened. In the middle of their talk and questions, Jesus came up and walked along with them. But they were not able to recognize who he was. He asked, "What's this you're discussing so intently as you walk along?"

They just stood there, long-faced, like they had lost their best friend. Then one of them, his name was Cleopas, said, "Are you the only one in Jerusalem who hasn't heard what's happened during the last few days?"

He said, "What has happened?"


They said, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene. He was a man of God, a prophet, dynamic in work and word, blessed by both God and all the people. Then our high priests and leaders betrayed him, got him sentenced to death, and crucified him. And we had our hopes up that he was the One, the One about to deliver Israel. And it is now the third day since it happened. But now some of our women have completely confused us. Early this morning they were at the tomb and couldn't find his body. They came back with the story that they had seen a vision of angels who said he was alive. Some of our friends went off to the tomb to check and found it empty just as the women said, but they didn't see Jesus."

Then he said to them, "So thick-headed! So slow-hearted! Why can't you simply believe all that the prophets said? Don't you see that these things had to happen, that the Messiah had to suffer and only then enter into his glory?" Then he started at the beginning, with the Books of Moses, and went on through all the Prophets, pointing out everything in the Scriptures that referred to him.

They came to the edge of the village where they were headed. He acted as if he were going on but they pressed him: "Stay and have supper with us. It's nearly evening; the day is done." So he went in with them. And here is what happened: He sat down at the table with them. Taking the bread, he blessed and broke and gave it to them. At that moment, open-eyed, wide-eyed, they recognized him. And then he disappeared.

Back and forth they talked. "Didn't we feel on fire as he conversed with us on the road, as he opened up the Scriptures for us?"

They didn't waste a minute. They were up and on their way back to Jerusalem. They found the Eleven and their friends gathered together, talking away: "It's really happened! The Master has been raised up—Simon saw him!" Then the two went over everything that happened on the road and how they recognized him when he broke the bread.



TODAY'S MUSIC

Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

Guide My Feet is another uplifting spiritual from the African American tradition. It is one of the many songs that was sung during marches during the civil rights movement in the 1960's. The believer asks God to guide them on the path of life.

The text for *Child of Blessing, Child of Promise* was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal, *Psalmodia Sacra*, the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), he composed nearly 100. He was Kappelmseister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. As an interesting side note, Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, was until recently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musick in Stuttgart. He is returning to Eastman School of Music in the fall of 2022.

The tune for *The Strife Is O'er* has two names VICTORY and PALESTRINA. The name PALESTRINA comes from the melody of the hymn and Latin poetry by the famous Italian Renaissance composer Giovanni da Palestrina (c. 1525-1594), whose last name is the name of his home city. It would be like calling our Senior Pastor, Matt from Duluth. The English translation was made in 1854 by Francis Pott (1832-1909). Pott was an English cleric who translated numerous Latin texts into English hymns. *Forty Days and Forty Nights* is also one of his translations that we often sing during Lent.

Since By Man Came Death is in Part Three of <u>Messiah</u>, the "resurrection section." It is preceded by *I Know That My Redeemer*, and followed by *The Trumpet Shall Sound*. George Frideric Handel (1685-1759) composed the entire <u>Messiah</u> in a two-week flurry of creativity in 1741.

The original text for *Thank Our God for Christian Siblings* was written in 1948 by Roger K. Powell (1914-2003) as a rallying song for The National Council of Churches meeting in 1952. The text was updated for our New Century Hymnal. PLEADING SAVIOR was first published in 1830 and is attributed to Joshua Levitt (1794-1873). Levitt was a Yale graduate and became a Congregational minister. He aided a slave to escape the South and raised funds for the defense of the Amistad captives.

The tune, *Good Christians, All Rejoice and Sing*, dates to the 16th century and is attributed to Melchior Vulpius (c. 1570-1615). Though born in poverty, Vulpius rose to become Kantor in Weimar. Gilbert Martin (b. 1941) uses this ancient tune in the same way that Bach used chorales as the basis for decoration as chorale preludes. Martin has composed more than 300 works for organ, piano, choirs and orchestra.


MOTHER'S DAY MISSION TRIP MEAL BOX

Pull the Plugs! According to the Natural Resources Defense Council, the outlets in the average American home are likely powering about 65 different devices. All things plugged in will bleed some energy. Called "standby" loss, it's also known as "phantom" or "vampire" electricity. Even when turned off, many appliances keep drawing power. The same goes for all those chargers, whether or not a device is charging. Use power strips and turn off when devices are not in use. Timers are also helpful. Unplug rarely used devices. Adjust computers/monitors to automatically power down to the lowest power mode when not in use.

Originally from Edinboro, Pennsylvania, Tim Hoellein completed a B.S. in Biology from West Virginia Wesleyan College and a Ph.D. in Biology at the University of Notre Dame.
