

It is such a pleasure to welcome **Pastor Jamie Frazier**, **The Voices of Light**, their Director of Music, **Raymond Wise**, and congregants from **Lighthouse UCC**, our sibling congregation that worships in the Chapel. We are grateful to share this celebration of the music of Thomas A. Dorsey and Mahalia Jackson that complements the dedication of our two new music windows.

OUR HONOREES

Mahalia Jackson (1911-1972) was born and raised in New Orleans. Both sets of her grandparents were born into slavery. She was raised in the Baptist church and was deeply moved by the call and response music sung by the congregation. Both she and Dorsey were part of the Great Migration that occurred in the 1920s when a great portion of the southern Black population migrated to northern industrial states seeking more freedom and escape from the repressive laws in the Jim Crow south. Her first week in Chicago in 1928, feeling cold and very homesick, she attended what would become her spiritual home here, the Greater Salem Missionary Baptist Church. She sang in their choir. She made her first solo recording in 1931. Jackson became an entrepreneur. She met Dorsey in 1938 when she had a beauty salon she bought across the street from Pilgrim Baptist Church. Dorsey was Music Director. They formed a fast and lifelong friendship and musical partnership, touring extensively. During the Civil Rights Movement, she also met and befriended a young Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. She famously sang I've Been 'Buked at the Lincoln Monument during the March on Washington and can be heard on the videos of that event encouraging King during his speech, "Tell'em about the 'dream,' Martin!" She also developed a close friendship with another Chicago icon, Studs Terkel. Heart trouble finally claimed her in January 1972. Fifty thousand people came to Greater Salem Missionary Baptist Church for her funeral. Needless to say, many stood out in the cold to mourn the inspiration she was musically and spiritually to so many. What made her singing so special was her ability to fearlessly convey the deep and honest longing, sadness, joy, or exaltation of her faith.

Thomas Andrew Dorsey (1899-1993) was born in rural Georgia. His father, Thomas Madison Dorsey, was a minister and farmer. The elder Dorsey and his wife Etta Plant Spencer were sharecroppers. Dorsey's mother played piano for her husband's services. Even with a religious upbringing, Dorsey found it impossible to make a living only playing in church, so when he moved to Atlanta, he played the blues at parties, often rent parties, juke joints called "barrel houses," and brothels. In 1919, he joined the Great Migration to Chicago and after some fits and starts, devoted the rest of his life to serving God as the Music Director for Pilgrim Baptist Church. He held that position for 40 years. It was at Pilgrim that he melded his background in blues and jazz with religious music. What emerged was Gospel music, and Dorsey is called the "Father of Gospel Music." Lest we think his music was beloved from the start, Dorsey sometimes quipped that he had "been kicked out of some of the best churches in the country." Read the story of *Precious Lord* in TODAY'S MUSIC. His music and life story is a legacy and inspiration to generations of musicians and believers.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Precious Lord was composed c. 1940 by Thomas A. Dorsey. (More information about Dorsey is in the notes for the Offertory below.) Wilbur Held (1914-2015), who arranged the setting, has a deep Chicago connection. He was born in Des Plaines, studied at the American Conservatory with Leo Sowerby, and became Sowerby's assistant for seven years at St. James Cathedral in the Loop. In addition to having been an active composer, he was also very involved in the American Guild of Organists and was Professor of Organ Studies at Ohio State University for more than 30 years.

Johann Sebastian Bach's (1685-1750) cantata *Meine Seele erhebt den Herrn, BWV 10* is a German setting of Mary's song *Magnificat* from the Gospel of Luke. It was to be sung on the Feast of the Visitation on July 2, when Elizabeth, mother of John the Baptist, visits Mary. *Glory Be to the Creator* was the final chorale of that work. It was composed in 1724 and was part of the second cycle of cantatas Bach composed in Leipzig. The "Gloria Patri" is a prescribed response in worship after any scripture reading except a reading from the gospels. Since Bach's stained glass remains as one of our three music windows, it is appropriate that a little of his music is included in our service.

Over My Head is another text and melody from the great wealth of spirituals. Its current version was arranged in 1981 by Verolga Nix (1933-2014), a world class pianist and graduate of Oberlin Conservatory; and J. Jefferson Cleveland (1937-1986), one of the most important scholars of African American spirituals. Cleveland and Nix collaborated on a seminal work about African American music, *Songs of Zion*. It is actually a shortened version, including only the very catchy refrain of a longer song.

Lift Every Voice and Sing takes its title from the joyous refrain of a longer hymn that is the unofficial anthem of Black churches and the civil rights movement. J. Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954), the composer, and James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938), the poet, were brothers who crafted this wonderful hymn together. They also wrote Broadway musicals and edited song collections as a team.

Praise Is What I Do was first composed and recorded in 2001. Shekinah Glory Ministry is an American gospel music group from Chicago that started making music in 2000. The group is from Valley Kingdom Ministries International in Chicago. They have their own label imprint, Kingdom Records.

Thomas A. Dorsey (1899-1993) began his career as a blues pianist and songwriter. Later he became a church choir director here in Chicago at Pilgrim Baptist Church and was a co-founder of the National Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses. Widely known as the "Father of Gospel Music," he played an important role in the development of African American gospel music. His best known song, *Precious Lord*, was composed following the tragic double death of his first wife Nettie and their newborn son. It was a great comfort to Mr. Dorsey in his grief and countless others who have sung it. The arrangement was written by Arnold Sevier while he was a student at Hyde Park High School in the 1970s. Mr. Sevier is a past Director of Music at Pilgrim Baptist Church where Thomas Dorsey got his start in Gospel music.

Both Mary Gardner (no dates available) and Thomas A. Dorsey provided the text for *Walking Up the King's Highway* in c. 1940. The tune KINGS HIGHWAY was composed by Dorsey.

Our **Festival Doxology** is to the German hymn tune LASST UNS ERFREUEN, and dates from 1623. It was first found in a hymnal published in Cologne, Germany.

The text for *When in Our Music God Is Glorified* was written in 1971 by Fred Pratt Green (1903-2000). He was one of the best known British hymn writers of the last century. He also translated hymn texts into English. Among the best known is *All My Hope on God Is Founded*. The tune, ENGELBERG, was composed in 1904 by Charles Villers Stanford (1852-1924), one of the great British composers of the post-Victorian era. ENGELBERG was originally the tune for *For All the Saints* until SINE NOMINE by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) replaced it. The text presents a creed for how music lifts the spirits of individuals and the church.

Thomas A. Dorsey wrote both the text and tune for *God Be with You Till We Meet Again* in c. 1940.

Lord, Don't Move That Mountain – Lyrics and music were written by Doris Mae Akers (1923-1995), a famous African American gospel composer, arranger and singer. This is another gospel song that Mahalia Jackson (1911-1972) sang and made popular. This arrangement is by Brendan Henry.

WEEKEND OF PRAYER FOR FAITH.HOPE.LIFE

A Campaign to Engage Faith Communities in Suicide Prevention

Let's be honest: life can sometimes feel overwhelming. The loss of a job or a relationship, trouble in school, a serious mental or physical illness, a divorce, or the death of a loved one can happen to anyone. Life events like these can leave us feeling unworthy, abandoned or isolated. The last two years of living through a global pandemic has only increased such feelings for many of us.

St. Pauls seeks to be a caring community focused on helping one another and loving our neighbors, especially in difficult times. *Whoever you are, whatever you are facing,* God loves you. God knows your struggles and failures, as well as your joys and triumphs. In the times when it feels like God is far away or doesn't hear our prayers, God gives us people who can help—friends, loved ones, co-workers, others at church, our pastors and Stephen Ministers, and clinical professionals. If you, or someone you know has lost hope, is feeling completely alone, or that life doesn't matter, *reach out* for help. Let others help. This is especially important if someone is experiencing thoughts of suicide or wanting to die.

We can all help in many ways:

- **Know the facts**. Suicide does not discriminate; it can touch people of all ages and classes; all racial, ethnic, and religious groups. However, suicide is also usually preventable, and our church can play a role. There is hope and help.
- Talk about mental illness. Help our church members understand mental health problems as being real and treatable in the same way that physical health problems are. Speak and pray about mental illness just as you would about physical illnesses, such as cancer, heart disease or diabetes.
- **Promote connectedness.** Fellowship groups, choirs, service work, worship—all are ways people connect at St. Pauls. Such connections let people know they are not alone and that they are cared for.
- Share "stories of hope." Churches share stories from scripture of how people
 have overcome adversity and experienced God's presence in times of struggle
 and hardship. We also share the stories of our own lives—our faith and
 courage—that can give hope and strength to others.
