





#### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

#### The Chancel Choir is on summer break and will return on September 11.

**Truth** is the opening song on the 2017 EP, *Harmony of Difference*, by Kamasi Washington (b.1981). Mr Washing ton is a jazz saxophonist, born and raised in Los Angeles. He studied in the Department of Ethnomusicology at UCLA. As a student, he was invited to play with a faculty quartet. In addition to his solo career, he has collaborated with musicians in jazz, hip-hop, and pop music.

The text for *Bring Many Names* was written by Brian A. Wren (b. 1936). He is a major British contributor to contemporary hymn writing. He was a pastor of a Congregational Church in Essex. WESTCHASE was composed in 1989 by Carlton R. Young (b.1926). He served in World War II and became a teacher, editor, composer, and conductor. He edited two editions of the *United Methodist Hymnal*.

*Lord, I Want to Be a Christian* is another in a long line of great African American spirituals. Neither the tune nor text are attributed. The origin may go as far back as 1750. The first publication to include it was *Folk Songs of the American Negro* (1907) compiled by brothers Frederick (no dates) and John (1871-1925) Work. John Work was also music director of the famous Fisk Jubilee Singers.

*My Shepherd Will Supply My Need* employs a text by the great English poet and hymnodist, Issac Watts (1674-1748). Watts set the entire book of Psalms poetically, many of which we still sing today, notably *Our God, Our Help in Ages Past*. RESIGNATION is another hymn melody whose composer is unattributed and is from the great early American hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*.

Edvard Grieg, (1843-1907), composed *Lyric Pieces, Op. 54* for piano in 10 volumes from 1867 to 1901. They were special enough to him that he orchestrated four of the pieces from Volume 5 into the *Lyric Suite.* **Notturno Op. 54**, **No. 4** is one of the *Lyric Pieces* that Grieg orchestrated. *Op. 54* came in between and during the composition of one of Grieg's most beloved works, the *Peer Gynt Suites No. 1, Op. 46* and *No. 2, Op. 55.* Grieg is arguably the most famous Norwegian composer. He was part of a group of 19th century composers referred to as "nationalist," which meant that he used folk themes and Norwegian stories and dramas as inspiration for his compositions. Grieg was so famous and busy as a composer and pianist, that his death in 1907 was attributed to exhaustion.

*God Is Working His Purpose Out* is a favorite hymn of Pastor Emeritus Tom Henry. The text was written by Arthur Campbell Ainger (1841–1919) in 1894. The text demanded a muscular tune, which Martin Shaw (1916–1999) provided in 1915.

**Rejoice!** - Richard Smallwood (b. 1948) is one of the top composers and performers of Gospel music. His group, The Richard Smallwood Singers, has toured the world. He is a graduate of Howard University, which also counts Vice President Kamala Harris and so many other luminaries as alumni. He was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 2006.

rice, jelly/jam (low sugar), peanut butter (natural, no hydrogenated oils), cooking oil, pasta sauce (low sodium), soup (low sodium), easy prep meals (e.g., Hamburger Helper, low sodium or whole grain varieties if possible), ground coffee, toothpaste, deodorant, disposable razors, shampoo, conditioner, mouthwash.

**REDUCE** ELECTRICITY USAGE.

- Shut down your computers.
- Computers are some of the biggest energy wasters. Turn your monitor off at night and dump the screen saver. Today's computers can be turned off and on more than 40,000 times. Opting to turn off your screen saver does nothing to your computer's lifespan.
- To avoid paying for this "vampire power" (i.e., idle electronics), use a power strip to turn all devices off at once. Flipping the switch on your power strip has the same effect as unplugging each socket from the wall, preventing phantom energy use. So power down!
