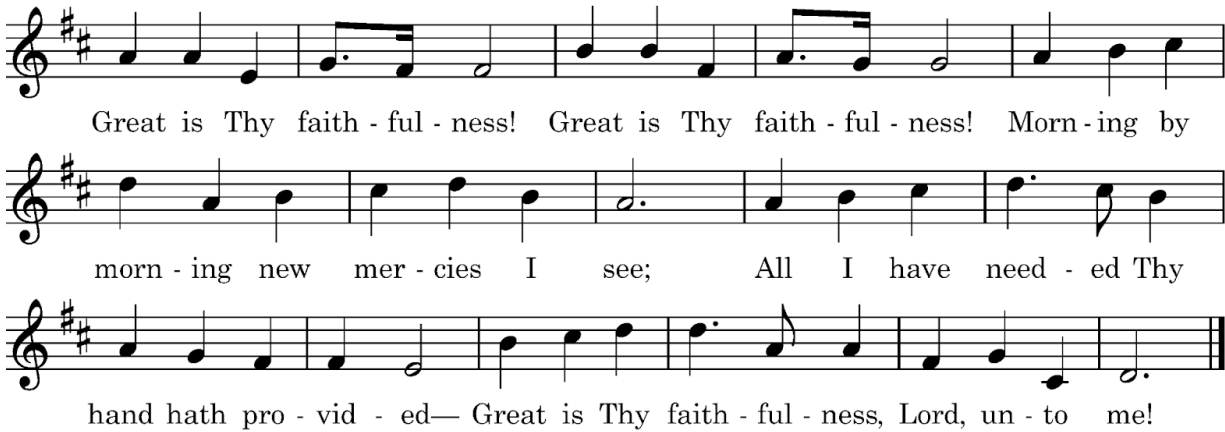

Luke 12:13–31

Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, “Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me.” But Jesus said to him, “Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?” And he said to them, “Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one’s life does not consist in the abundance of possessions.” Then he told them a parable: “The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, ‘What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?’ Then he said, ‘I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, ‘Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.’ But God said to him, ‘You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?’ So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God.”

Jesus said to his disciples, “Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat, or about your body, what you will wear. For life is more than food, and the body more than clothing. Consider the ravens: they neither sow nor reap, they have neither storehouse nor barn, and yet God feeds them. Of how much more value are you than the birds! And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? If then you are not able to do so small a thing as that, why do you worry about the rest? Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, how much more will God clothe you—you

of little faith! And do not keep striving for what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not keep worrying. For it is the nations of the world that strive after all these things, and your Father knows that you need them. Instead, strive for God's kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well.

TODAY'S MUSIC

The Chancel Choir is on summer break and will return on September 11.

We welcome The Altos from the Chancel Choir who will sing our offertory anthem. They are led by their section leader, Breanna Coe. Singing today are Pamela Woll, Amy Beck, Jana O'Brien, Marti Pechnyo, Carrie Bettler, Pat Ruch, Micki Fayhee, Karen Johnson, Winnie Kearns, Cindy Zinn Ball, and Carrie Bruggers

Russell Woolen (1923-1994), who composed ***Meditation***, was a Connecticut born pianist, organist, and composer. In his works, he combined elements of Medieval music with a more modern harmonic vocabulary. He was also ordained a priest in the Roman Catholic Church in 1947. In the 1960s, the "pressures of secular life" caused him to leave the priesthood. He continued to compose and perform until his death. One of his works, *In martyrum memoriam* (1968-69), was performed by the Chicago Symphony Orchestra and Chorus under the direction of Margaret Hillis in 1979. It was composed as a memorial tribute to Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

All Are Welcome is a recently composed hymn and one of our favorites from a past hymnfest. The tune is TWO OAKS. It dates from 1994 and the words and music were both created by Marty Haugen (b. 1950), an American composer of numerous hymns and liturgical music. This hymn was shared with Kurt R. Hansen by a college friend, Alisa Kasmir, and has quickly become an anthem of St. Pauls' Open and Affirming ministry.

Great Is Thy Faithfulness, tune FAITHFULNESS, dates from 1923 and was composed by William M. Runyan (1870-1957). He finished his ministry in Kansas and was particularly fond of the poet Thomas Chisholm (1866-1960), who wrote this text. Runyan set 25 of Chisholm's poems to music. Chisholm based this text on Lamentation 3:22 & 23: "*Because of the Lord's great love, we are not consumed.*"

De colores is a folk song from the rich resources of Mexican music. It gained wide popularity when it was sung at meetings and marches of the United Farm Workers. Our *New Century Hymnal* was the first to share it with a wider audience and the translation is unattributed.

Susan Thrift arranged this great African American spiritual, ***Carry Me Home***, in 2014. She taught both middle school and high school music for 16 years and still serves as Minister of Music in her church in Waco, TX. The arrangement is dedicated to her parents, Paul and Helen Ledbetter, "who have already been carried Home."

God of Grace and God of Glory has, for us, the unusual Welsh tune name CWM RHONDDA. The text we know is by the famous American author and Baptist clergy, Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969). He wrote this text in 1930. The well-known tune was composed in 1905 by John Hughes (1873-1932). He had very little formal education and became a deacon and precentor, lay minister positions, in his Baptist church. He wrote this tune for a Welsh Baptist choral festival.

Thomas Dorsey (1899-1993) is truly the originator of gospel music, a fusion of church music with jazz. He is a Chicago original and beloved worldwide. He wrote ***I'm Gonna Live the Life I Sing About in My Song*** in 1956 for Mahalia Jackson (1911-1972). Dorsey and Jackson collaborated many times since first meeting here in Chicago at Pilgrim Baptist Church.

ABOUT THE PROCESS

Hiring decisions for Associate Pastors at St. Pauls are made by the Executive Committee of the Church Council and the Senior Pastor. This effort began in January with a job description written by the Youth and Children's Ministry Revitalization Task Force. This description and our Local Church Profile were posted on the UCC's national job board.

We received interest from more than twenty pastors. Applications were reviewed and applicants were screened in three phases by Pastor Matt and our Interview Team. The Interview Team members were Nancy Curotto, Sharon Collins, Ben Emmrich, Renae Bradshaw, Justin Hartanov, and Pastor Matt.

After receiving enthusiastic feedback about Pastor Liz following the first two steps in this process, the Interview Team viewed several of her sermons and met with Liz for group interviews. These concluded with the Team's unanimous agreement that she would be an excellent Associate Pastor for St. Pauls. The Executive Committee shared the Interview Team's excitement and agreed, unanimously, to extend a call, inviting Rev. Liz Nickerson to serve as an Associate Pastor as the third member of St. Pauls pastoral staff.

Recycle old cell phones, small electronic devices, and battery chargers at Lincoln Park Zoo Searle Visitor Center, **now through September 24**. Lincoln Park Zoo is partnering with institutions across the globe for "Gorillas on the Line." This cell phone recycling initiative directly supports gorilla conservation. Coltan (used to manufacture small electronics) is hand-mined in the Democratic Republic of Congo, prime gorilla habitat. The deforestation of coltan mining displaces these critically endangered species.
