
PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Luke 14: 1 and 7-14

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely.

When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable.

"When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place.

But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you.

TODAY'S MUSIC

The Chancel Choir is on summer break and will return on September 11.

This setting of *Morning Has Broken* was composed by Keith Chapman (1945-1989). He was an American concert organist and composer. He was the Principal Organist of the famous Wanamaker Organ in Philadelphia. The tune, BUNESSAN, that we know so well is a Gaelic melody.

To You O God, All Creatures Sing is a text that was adapted by Sister Miriam Therese Winter (b. 1938). She is a Catholic theologian and also a Medical Mission Sister that has worked in a number war torn areas including Ethiopia and Cambodia. The German hymn tune, LASST UNS ERFREUEN, dates from 1623 and was first found in a hymnal published in Cologne, Germany. The text for *Morning Has Broken* was written by Elinor Farjeon (1881-1965), who also wrote children's books. The tune, BUNESSAN, that we know so well is a Gaelic melody.

I Will Lift the Cloud of Night was composed and text also written by Charles P. Jones (1865–1949) in 1910. The tune is the composer's last name, JONES. The Reverend Jones was African American and founder of the Church of Christ. He composed more than 1,000 gospel hymns, both music and texts.

Natalie Douglass Grana, who plays our Offertory today, is a member of our Chancel Choir. She is on the music faculty at both Lake Forest College and DePaul University. She is a published author on Oxford University Press, a Fulbright Scholar, and received her Doctorate of Musical Arts from the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

Wolfgang Amedeus Mozart (1756-1791) composed his *Horn Concerto No. 2 in E flat Major, K. 417* in 1783 at the height of his musical powers. In the same year, he composed the *"Linz" Symphony No. 36, K. 425*, two concerti for piano, a rarely performed opera, *L'oca del Cairo, K. 422*, and the great *Mass in C minor, K. 427*. It is hard to fathom the sheer brilliance and output of Mozart in his all too short 35 years.

The text for *Thank Our God for Sisters, Brothers* was written in 1948 by Rev. Roger Powell (1914-2003). The text was composed for a Thanksgiving service. Rev. Powell served as pastor of a baptist church in Camillus, NY. HOLY MANNA is an unattributed melody from the great American series of shaped-note hymnals from the early 19th century including *The Sacred Harp*.

Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

ABOUT THE PROCESS

Hiring decisions for Associate Pastors at St. Pauls are made by the Executive Committee of the Church Council and the Senior Pastor. This effort began in January with a job description written by the Youth and Children's Ministry Revitalization Task Force. This description and our Local Church Profile were posted on the UCC's national job board.

We received interest from more than twenty pastors. Applications were reviewed and applicants were screened in three phases by Pastor Matt and our Interview Team. The Interview Team members were Nancy Curotto, Sharon Collins, Ben Emmrich, Renae Bradshaw, Justin Hartanov, and Pastor Matt.

After receiving enthusiastic feedback about Pastor Liz following the first two steps in this process, the Interview Team viewed several of her sermons and met with Liz for group interviews. These concluded with the Team's unanimous agreement that she would be an excellent Associate Pastor for St. Pauls. The Executive Committee shared the Interview Team's excitement and agreed, unanimously, to extend a call, inviting Rev. Liz Nickerson to serve as an Associate Pastor as the third member of St. Pauls pastoral staff.

St. Pauls Green Team Occasional Note: Get All Excited: Climate Impact of the Inflation Reduction Act

President Joe Biden signed the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (Act) into law on August 16, 2022. Although not perfect, it is indeed good news! For the Act to be adopted and overcome political stalemate, significant compromises had to be made and a number of important provisions of the original package – the Build Back Better Act – were cut. This note covers only those provisions of the Act directly affecting the environment.

The Act is considered a landmark achievement. It is the first major federal legislation to address climate change and includes \$369B in federal funding for climate and clean energy programs. According to Earthjustice, an environmental legal advocacy organization, "Finally, we have legislation that begins to match spending with the true scale of the climate crisis, and we now have a path to just-in-time solutions." Experts estimate that by 2030, the Act will enable the U.S. to reduce carbon pollution by 35-45% over 2005 levels, create up to 1.5M jobs and help prevent up to 3,900 premature deaths.

Among the Act's more important environmental provisions are:

<u>Clean Power</u> – the first linchpin to de-carbonize the economy. The Act includes clean energy tax credits, government loan guarantees to leverage private sector investment in clean energy (i.e., wind, solar, hydro, geothermal, etc.) technologies, and rural electricity investments.

<u>Clean Transportation</u> – this sector creates the greatest share of greenhouse gas pollution. The Act includes electric vehicle (EVs) tax credits for new and used EVs, investment in creating zero-emission heavy duty vehicles, and investment in domestic clean vehicle manufacturing.

<u>Clean Buildings</u> – The "built environment" accounts for 13% of national greenhouse gasses. The Act includes rebates for home electrification and energy efficiency (i.e., heat pumps, electric appliances, etc.) and tax credits for "efficient" residential and commercial buildings.

<u>Oil and Gas Leasing</u> – Several extremely controversial provisions in the Act concern "giveaways" to fossil fuel corporations; in fact, two provisions mandate oil and gas leasing on American public land under certain circumstances.

According to Rev. Brooks Berndt, UCC Minister for Environmental Justice, "After many long years in which climate legislation from Congress seemed like an impossibility to many, I believe this is the first chapter to a new story. This new story tells us that change is possible and that we can make a difference for the sake of justice and for the sake of God's creation. This legislation will embolden and renew us for continued struggle, so that this story of hope and possibility keeps unfolding."
