




PRAYER OF CONFESSION by Hafiz





A gluten-free bread option is wrapped and available on a separate tray.



WELCOME TO TODAY'S GUEST PREACHER: REV. CYNTHIA LINDNER

Cynthia Lindner was born and raised in central Illinois. She received her theological education at the University of Chicago's Divinity School, earning both a master's and a doctorate in divinity, with emphases in biblical studies, ethics, and psychological studies. She also completed a master's degree in marriage and family therapy at Northwest Christian College while pastoring congregations in Oregon.

Cynthia has worked as a parish pastor, hospice chaplain, and pastoral psychotherapist for more than thirty years. She has served as the Director of Ministry Studies and Professor of Preaching and Pastoral Care at the Divinity School since 2002 and is one of the directors of the Divinity School's Chicago Commons Project, an early-career pastoral leadership development program funded by the Lilly Endowment.

Rev. Lindner is also a pastoral psychotherapist at the Center for Religion and Psychotherapy, where she conducts clergy groups and offers congregational consultation in addition to her work with individuals and couples. Lindner explores pastoral multiple-mindedness in her book, *Varieties of Gifts: Multiplicity and the Well-Lived Pastoral Life,* published in 2016 by Rowman and Littlefield, and is currently developing two new research projects: one on the narrative experience of congregational life and another on multi-religious ways of knowing.

TODAY'S MUSIC

The Chancel Choir is on summer break and will return on September 11.

Intrada-A Fanfare - Johann Christoph Pezel (1639-1694). Pezel was an early German Baroque composer, violinist and trumpeter. He was born in Silesia, and converted to the Lutheran Church after leaving a seminary in 1672. He worked in Leipzig from 1661 to 1681. Leipzig became the primary post for Bach in 1723. He is principally known for his works for brass and wind instruments.

The tune, *DIADEMATA*, was composed in 1868 by George P. Elvey (1816-1893) specifically for the text *Crown Him with Many Crowns*. Elvey became the organist for St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle.

The text for *Morning Has Broken* was written by Elinor Farjeon (1881-1965), who also wrote children's books. The tune we know so well, BUNESSAN, is a Gaelic melody.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. The translation was made in 1905 from the original Gaelic by Mary E. Bryne (1880-1931), who was born in Ireland.

Ave Maria is an arrangement for brass of the motet choir from the All-Night Vigil, Op. 37 composed in 1915 by Sergei Rachmaninov (1873-1943). Those that look for melodies that remind them of Rachmaninoff's great symphonic or piano works will find this style very different. Rachmaninoff faithfully uses the Russian Orthodox Church chant melodies to create a great composition that is a "musical icon." Here the term "icon" refers to the style of religious art that is different from Western religious art. Written two years before he fled Russia, Rachmaninoff's belief in his All-Night Vigil was such that he asked to have a copy buried with him.

The text for *For the Beauty of the Earth* was written by Folliott S. Pierpoint (1835-1917). In the spring of 1863, Pierpont sat on a hill above his home of Bath, England, and this text flowed from his gratitude for the wonders of nature. The tune DIX was composed by German composer Konrad Kocher (1786-1872). He was trained as a teacher and eventually founded the School for Sacred Song in Stuttgart.

The Limpid Stream, Op. 39, is a ballet in three acts by Dimitri Shostakovitch (1906-1975) and was premiered in 1935 in Leningrad. The story reflects the struggles faced by artists having to glorify the Soviet Union to avoid running afoul of

the KGB. The ballet lifts up the harvest festival on the Soviet collective farms. Shostakovitch created an orchestral suite, *Op. 39a*, of five movements from the ballet. The *Adagio* is one of those movements. The oppression that often surrounded Shostakovitch never dimmed his musical vision and brilliance as a composer.

Taste and See, both the text and tune, I WILL BLESS THE LORD AT ALL TIMES, were composed and written by James E. Moore (b. 1951) and was first published in 1983. Moore is a Black Catholic composer. A native of Virginia, he now resides, teaches and conducts a professional choir in Vienna. The text is a contemporary communion hymn.

O God Beyond All Praising is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934). The tune is called THAXTED, which is the main theme of the Jupiter movement from Holst's *The Planets*. It is truly a majestic hymn. Thaxted is the village where Holst grew up. It was Ralph Vaughan Williams that adapted "Thaxted" as a hymn. The author of our text is Michael A. Perry (1942–1996). He began studies as a physicist and changed to theology.

The Lord Bless You and Keep You was composed in 1900 by Peter Christian Lutkin, (1858-1931). He was the founder and first dean of the School of Music at Northwestern University in 1895. He was organist at St. Clement's Church, as well as one of the founders of the American Guild of Organists. Along with F. Melius Christiansen at St. Olaf College, Lutkin was one of the leaders of the American a capella choral movement in the early part of the 20th century. Kurt R. Hansen's maternal grandfather, John Mahard Rosborough, received his Bachelor of Music degree in 1905 at Northwestern under Dean Lutkin and was his first accompanist. This benediction was composed while Kurt's grandfather was a student of Lutkin.

Jerusalem is a hymn composed in 1916 by Sir Charles Hubert Hastings Parry (1848-1918). The text was inspired by a poem by the English Romantic, William Blake (1757-1827). The hymn was also famously and majestically orchestrated by Sir Edward Elgar (1857-1934). Parry composed in a heroic style and in the twilight of the Victorian age. His most famous work is the choral anthem *I Was Glad* which was composed for the coronation of Edward VII in 1902. We would now consider the text of *Jerusalem* to embody the hubris of nationalism, comparing England to the "shining city on the hill" and predestined by God to be the modern Jerusalem. Nonetheless, it is musically uplifting and inspiring.

ABOUT THE PROCESS

Hiring decisions for Associate Pastors at St. Pauls are made by the Executive Committee of the Church Council and the Senior Pastor. This effort began in January with a job description written by the Youth and Children's Ministry Revitalization Task Force. This description and our Local Church Profile were posted on the UCC's national job board.

We received interest from more than twenty pastors. Applications were reviewed and applicants were screened in three phases by Pastor Matt and our Interview Team. The Interview Team members were Nancy Curotto, Sharon Collins, Ben Emmrich, Renae Bradshaw, Justin Hartanov, and Pastor Matt.

After receiving enthusiastic feedback about Pastor Liz following the first two steps in this process, the Interview Team viewed several of her sermons and met with Liz for group interviews. These concluded with the Team's unanimous agreement that she would be an excellent Associate Pastor for St. Pauls. The Executive Committee shared the Interview Team's excitement and agreed, unanimously, to extend a call, inviting Rev. Liz Nickerson to serve as an Associate Pastor as the third member of St. Pauls pastoral staff.
