


#### THE LORD'S PRAYER

### SCRIPTURE


## 2 Timothy 1:1-12

Every time I say your name in prayer—which is practically all the time—I thank God for you, the God I worship with my whole life in the tradition of my ancestors. I miss you a lot, especially when I remember that last tearful good-bye. I look forward to a reunion, so that I may be filled with joy.





## **TODAY'S MUSIC**

*Come, My Way, My Truth, My Life* is a text by George Herbert (1593-1633). He bears the title "Shakespeare of the Church." Herbert was a contemporary of "The Bard" (1564-1616), and like Shakespeare, Herbert's poetry lifted common religious practice to the spiritually sublime. THE CALL was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) as part of a cycle for baritone, choir, and orchestra, *Five Mystical Songs*, composed between 1906 and 1911 and using the poetry of Herbert. Vaughan Williams then adapted THE CALL as a congregational hymn. The words are especially appropriate for a communion Sunday.

The author of the text of *For All the Saints* was William Walsham How (1823-1897). He penned the poetry we love so much in 1864. How was an Oxford graduate and served many parishes in England throughout his life. Just to prove that there can be a sense of humor even in hymn tune names, SINE NOMINE, means "no name" in Latin. The stirring music was written in 1906 by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). He is one of the greatest English composers of the post-Victorian era and composed music for nearly all performance genres.

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and also has a Ph.D. in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and is first found in the great American shape-note hymnal *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

**The Creator Has a Master Plan** was composed by Pharoah Sanders (1940-2022). He was born Farrell Sanders and changed his name after his conversion to Islam. He was a saxophonist known for creating "spiritual jazz" as well as exploring the overtones on the sax. The legendary saxophonist John Coltrane, who became a close friend of Sanders, recorded this work as an almost musical mantra and featured it on his testament album, *A Love Supreme*.

James L. Haddix (b. 1946) wrote the text for *O God, Whose Steadfast Love* in 1986 and revised it in 1994. The tune, RHOSYMEDRE, was composed in 1840 by John David Edwards (1806-1885). He was an Anglican priest and the tune name is taken from one of the parishes he served in Wales.

*Avinu malkeynu* is one of Max Janowski's (1912-1991) most performed works and is a prayer made on *Rosh Hashanah* for another year of blessing. Max Janowski was Cantor and Director of Music at KAM-Isaiah Israel Congregation in Chicago for 50 years. Kurt and Terry Hansen sang with him for his last 17 years. Mr. Janowski was truly one of the "great lights" of Jewish music of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. This anthem was composed on the kitchen table of the Rabbi of KAM in 1967, Jacob Weinstein.

**Forward Through the Ages** is known as *Onward Christian Soldiers* (1865) by many older believers. This text was penned by Frederick L. Hosmer (1840-1929) in 1908 as a less militant encouragement to believers. Hosmer became a Unitarian minister who wrote more than 100 hymn texts. The tune, ST. GERTRUDE, was composed in 1871 by the famous Sir Arthur Sullivan (1841-1900), who composed a great deal of classical music in addition to his famous collaborative theater pieces with Sir W. S. Gilbert. He composed the stirring tune for the Hosmer text.

The *Festive Trumpet Tune* was composed by David German (b. 1954) for his own wedding ceremony. He was Organist/Choir Master at Calvary Church in Charlotte, NC, from 1983 until the mid-1990s. It is by far his most performed work.

#### **ABOUT THE PROCESS**

Hiring decisions for Associate Pastors at St. Pauls are made by the Executive Committee of the Church Council and the Senior Pastor. This effort began in January with a job description written by the Youth and Children's Ministry Revitalization Task Force. This description and our Local Church Profile were posted on the UCC's national job board.

We received interest from more than twenty pastors. Applications were reviewed and applicants were screened in three phases by Pastor Matt and our Interview Team. The Interview Team members were Nancy Curotto, Sharon Collins, Ben Emmrich, Renae Bradshaw, Justin Hartanov, and Pastor Matt.

After receiving enthusiastic feedback about Pastor Liz following the first two steps in this process, the Interview Team viewed several of her sermons and met with Liz for group interviews. These concluded with the Team's unanimous agreement that she would be an excellent Associate Pastor for St. Pauls. The Executive Committee shared the Interview Team's excitement and agreed, unanimously, to extend a call, inviting Rev. Liz Nickerson to serve as an Associate Pastor as the third member of St. Pauls pastoral staff.

**Columbus Day?** Columbus Day commemorates the arrival of Christopher Columbus in the Americas on October 12, 1492. Efforts have been made in recent decades to change the name of Columbus Day to **Indigenous Peoples' Day** to celebrate the past, present and future of civilizations that were in the U.S. long before Columbus's arrival. It is observed in addition to Columbus Day in 30 states and is a state holiday in three states. Alternatively, many Hispanic countries celebrate *Dia de la Raza* ("Day of the Race") on October 12 to recognize and lift up the cultural fusion of indigenous America and Spanish heritage.
