SCRIPTURE

Luke 16: 19–31

TODAY'S MUSIC

Liebster Jesu, wir sind hier, *Dearest Jesus, We Are Here*, is a chorale prelude, which is a compositional genre where the composer creates an "arrangement" using a well known melody as a theme. The chorale, hymn and melody was composed by Benjamin Schmolk (1672-1737). Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) thought so highly of this chorale that he set it for organ four times.

God of Grace and God of Glory has, for us, the unusual Welsh tune name CWM RHONDDA. The text we know is by the famous American author and Baptist clergy, Harry Emerson Fosdick (1878-1969). He wrote this text in 1930. The well known tune was composed in 1905 by John Hughes (1873-1932). He had very little formal education and became a deacon and precentor, lay minister positions, in his Baptist church. He wrote this tune for a Welsh Baptist choral festival.

Praise to the Lord, the Almighty is another great hymn from our German heritage. The tune, LOBE DEN HERRN, is the first line of the first stanza of the German text. The composer of the music is unknown and it was first published in a hymnal in 1668. The original text was written by Joachim Neander (1650-1680). Although he was reported to have spent a "riotous youth," he became the first important hymn writer of the German Reformed Church.

Diana Perez and **Alex Hansen** both are June 2022 graduates of Elmhurst University. They have formed a duo, **Diial**. You can find them on Spotify. **Beautiful** is a collaborative work. Diana has a musical presence on Facebook, Sound Cloud and other platforms. Alex can be found on Spotify as *ahans*. We are so grateful that they returned to share their music and friendship today.

Come Ye Sinners Poor and Needy, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals including *Southern Harmony*. Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

The text for *Amazing Grace* is by John Newton (1725-1807), who was a slave ship captain, but became an Anglican clergy and fervent abolitionist. He once said that writing this text saved his soul. The tune, NEW BRITAIN, is most likely an African American spiritual and was first published in 1829.

Sh'ma koleynu was composed by Max Janowski (1912-1991). He was born in Berlin, and after fleeing after *Kristallnacht*, he eventually came to this country and became Cantor and Director of Music at KAM-Isaiah Israel Congregation in Chicago for 50 years. Kurt and Terry Hansen sang with him for his last 17 years. Mr. Janowski was truly one of the "great lights" of Jewish music of the 20th century. *Sh'ma koleynu* is a devoted and impassioned prayer for mercy from the *S'lichot* service. *S'lichot* is a service at "midnight" on the Sabbath preceding *Rosh Hashanah*. This summer, our Chancel Choir participated in a CD recording of his music.

God Reigns O'er All the Earth is sung to the tune: TERRA BEATA. The source of the music is an English folk melody which first appeared as a hymn in 1906. The text was written in 1981 and is by Jane Parker Huber (1926 - 2008), one of the most prolific contemporary authors of hymn texts. She was born to missionary parents in China and was a lifelong Presbyterian who focused her hymn texts and ministry on peace-making, justice and inclusiveness.

Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

ABOUT THE PROCESS

Hiring decisions for Associate Pastors at St. Pauls are made by the Executive Committee of the Church Council and the Senior Pastor. This effort began in January with a job description written by the Youth and Children's Ministry Revitalization Task Force. This description and our Local Church Profile were posted on the UCC's national job board.

We received interest from more than twenty pastors. Applications were reviewed and applicants were screened in three phases by Pastor Matt and our Interview Team. The Interview Team members were Nancy Curotto, Sharon Collins, Ben Emmrich, Renae Bradshaw, Justin Hartanov, and Pastor Matt.

After receiving enthusiastic feedback about Pastor Liz following the first two steps in this process, the Interview Team viewed several of her sermons and met with Liz for group interviews. These concluded with the Team's unanimous agreement that she would be an excellent Associate Pastor for St. Pauls. The Executive Committee shared the Interview Team's excitement and agreed, unanimously, to extend a call, inviting Rev. Liz Nickerson to serve as an Associate Pastor as the third member of St. Pauls pastoral staff.

NEXT SUNDAY - SHARE THE TABLE OF JESUS

We're collecting food for the Common Pantry every communion Sunday - which is next week. St. Pauls helped found the pantry in 1967. Unexpired food and personal items most needed are listed below. Modest-sized products are best for distribution to the folks they serve (e.g., a few 24 oz. containers of cooking oil are preferable to one 64 oz. container). Items can be left in the bin in the Narthex.



Needed Items: cereal (whole grain, less sugar varieties), nuts, brown

rice, jelly/jam (low sugar), peanut butter (natural, no hydrogenated oils), cooking oil, pasta sauce (low sodium), soup (low sodium), easy prep meals (e.g., Hamburger Helper, low sodium or whole grain varieties if possible), ground coffee, toothpaste, deodorant, disposable razors, shampoo, conditioner, mouthwash.

ELECTION WATCH 2022: Contact Voters!

During the 2020 election, we estimate that St. Pauls members (in very loose coordination) contacted more than 1,000 voters around the country via postcards and phone calls to encourage them to vote. Let's continue this in 2022! Vote Forward is one voter encouragement service with which many St. Pauls members are involved. Volunteers send heartfelt handwritten letters to low-propensity voters encouraging them to participate in our democracy. There are even Vote Forward, <u>votefwd.org</u>, letter-writing get-togethers to make the project more fun. In addition, for those with a special interest in climate change and the environment, Greenpeace USA has established the "Build the Climate Vote" plan, <u>voteclimate2022.org</u>. In just the 2022 primaries, Greenpeace volunteers sent more than 50,000 personalized letters to climate voters in key congressional districts, and they plan to expand this success into the midterm elections.

JOIN THE MOVEMENT - provided by SPARC

September 15 – October 15 is National Hispanic Heritage Month (NHHM).

NHHM celebrates the history, cultures and contributions of American citizens whose ancestors came from Spain, Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America. The date September 15 is significant because it is the date of independence for numerous Central American countries. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September16 and September 18 respectively. As of July 2021, the U.S. Hispanic population is about 60 million, which constitutes 18.9% of the U.S. population, making people of Hispanic origin the nation's largest racial or ethnic minority.

CREATION CORNER - provided by Green Team REUSE/REPURPOSE/REIMAGINE

Recycling aluminum cans saves about 92% of the energy that's required to produce new cans and reduces carbon dioxide emissions and the amount of waste headed into landfills. Before recycling, think about reusing. Examples: cookie cutters, jewelry, candle holders, pencil holders, vases, tea light lanterns, seasonal wreaths, storage, herb gardens, bird feeders, plant label stakes, ingredient labels, garden markers.
