



#### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

Our familiar hymn *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* is based on "Ode to Joy," the theme from the last movement of *Beethoven's Symphony No. 9* (1824). Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

There is no better way as a church with a strong German heritage to celebrate the Reformation than by bookending our service with *A Mighty Fortress Is Our God*, the great Martin Luther (1483-1546) hymn. It is arguably Luther's greatest hymn and encapsulates the theology of the Lutheran Church. The Introit is the original almost dance-like rhythmic version that Luther composed and congregations of that time sang. The recessional hymn presents a more majestic march. The final stanza is a harmonization of the final chorale by Bach (1685–1750) from his cantata, which bears the tune name, EIN FESTE BURG .

Our familiar hymn *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* is based on "Ode to Joy," the theme from the last movement of *Beethoven's Symphony No. 9* (1824). The introduction, choral interlude and finale to today's processional hymn are brief excerpts from that work. The music for *Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee* (ODE TO JOY) was composed by Beethoven (1770-1827) and is the chorale melody from the final movement of his Ninth Symphony. The original German text (1785) was by the famous poet and dramatist Friedrich Schiller (1759-1805) and the English text was composed in 1907 by Henry Van Dyke (1852-1933). Van Dyke was an American author and clergy. He was appointed ambassador to the Netherlands by President Woodrow Wilson prior to the outbreak of World War I.

*There Is a Balm in Gilead* is a Black Spiritual. In the Hebrew Bible, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed that this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief of their oppression. For slaves in our country, crossing the Jordan River was code for escaping their bondage by escaping to the north going over rivers like the Potomac and Ohio.

*God, When You Called St. Pauls* is a text created for our celebration of 175 years as a church. BROTHER JAMES AIR was composed by James Leith Macbeth Bain (c. 1840-1925), and first published in 1915. He was born in Scotland. He was a mystic, healer and poet. Although born into a devout Christian home, he rejected his traditional upbringing.

*Now Thank We All Our God* is a translation by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) of the original German by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) written in 1636. Winkworth, although born in England, spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's rights. Rinkart became a scholar at St. Thomas School in Leipzig where Bach would later be Kapellmeister. The tune, NUN DANKET, takes its name from the first words of the German text. It is most often attributed to Johann Crüger (1558-1662), who in reality was the publisher of the psalter where this hymn tune appeared for the first time.

Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847), like Mozart, had a very short and artistically productive life. He was born in Germany, but a great source of his popularity was outside his home country. He was especially beloved in England. Amongst his greatest accomplishments was the revival of the works of J.S. Bach, and the first "modern" performance of Bach's *St. Matthew Passion* since his death. *Elijah* is performed in England almost as often as *Messiah*, which is, of course, by another "adopted" German, Handel. This chorus, *He Watching Over Israel*, is sung in the oratorio as assurance to Elijah during his sojourn in the wilderness.

On Reformation Sunday, it is good to remember that our *Festival Doxology* is also part of our German and Reform heritage. Its German hymn tune, LASST UNS ERFREUEN, dates from 1623 and was first found in a hymnal published in Cologne, Germany.

The postlude, *Toccata and Fugue in D Minor BWV 565*, is arguably the most well known of Bach's works for the organ. Sadly, it is often thought of as "spooky," because of its use in the first Dracula film and also with Halloween and Disney's *Fantasia*. Toccata is an Italian term meaning "touched." A toccata is supposed to highlight the technique of the organist with improvisatory sounding flourishes and also to demonstrate the number of varying colors within a pipe organ. Fugue is a highly sophisticated imitative form like a round with voices entering at different times, creating a layered soundscape that can be compared to the many small pieces of stained glass in our windows creating a larger picture or design.

#### **2023 GIVING CAMPAIGN - IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS**

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as Saint Pauls United Church of Christ.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls UCC, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 72. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age 70 ½, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 72. You cannot make QCDs from your 401K; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor. **ELECTION WATCH 2022: Cook County Forest Preserve Referendum and Illinois Constitutional Amendment 1 on Workers' Rights.** If adopted, the Cook County "Clean Air, Clean Water and Wildlife Habitat Protection Referendum" would increase property taxes .025% to protect, expand and maintain the Cook County Forest Preserves. Currently, less than 1% of property tax revenue goes to the Forest Preserves. If the Referendum passes, "the tax increase per year for an average homeowner would be less than \$20 per year, or about a dollar and a half per month." The proposed amendment to the Illinois Constitution, titled Illinois Amendment 1, is more popularly known as the "Workers' Rights Amendment." It would add Section 25 to the Bill of Rights Article of the Illinois Constitution to give employees the ability to bargain collectively through representatives they select to negotiate wages, hours, working conditions, and workplace safety. The amendment would also prohibit any law that "interferes with, negates, or diminishes the right of employees to organize and bargain collectively." Supporters of the amendment believe it would give workers greater power (through their unions), safer workplaces and greater pay. Opponents believe the amendment would give labor unions too much power and lead to higher taxes. To be adopted, an amendment to the Illinois Constitution requires either a three-fifths majority vote of those voting on the question or a simple majority of those voting, period. There is substantial public discussion on pros and cons of Illinois Amendment 1 which voters should prayerfully consider prior to voting.

**REUSE** IN YOUR YARD - According to the EPA, leaves and other yard debris account for more than 13% of the nation's solid waste. Without enough oxygen to decompose, this organic matter releases the greenhouse gas methane. Solid-waste landfills are the largest U.S. source of man-made methane. Sending leaves to landfills harms the environment, robs gardens of nutrients, and destroys wildlife habitat. Leave the leaves! They can help your turf, you can place around trees, use as winter mulch, or cover garden beds. A thick layer of leaves forms natural mulch and fertilizer for the soil as it breaks down.
