1 Corinthians 15, selections

Let me ask something profound yet troubling. If you believe the proclamation that Christ is raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised, and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation is in vain and your faith is in vain. Not only that, but we would be guilty of telling a string of barefaced lies about God, because we testified of God that he raised Christ—sheer fabrication, if there's no resurrection. If we all get out of Christ is a little inspiration for a few short years, we are of all people most to be pitied.

But the truth is that Christ *has* been raised from the dead, the first in a long legacy of those who are going to leave the cemetery. For since death came through a human, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human. Just as everyone dies in Adam, all will be made alive in Christ.

But we have to wait: Christ first, then all with him at his return, the grand consummation when he hands the keys to his Kingdom over to God.

Our natural, earthly lives don't lead us by their very nature into the kingdom of God. Their 'nature' is to die, so how could they naturally wind up in the kingdom?

Look, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised beyond the reach of death, never to die again, and we will be changed.

And then, the saying that has been written will be fulfilled:

"Death has been swallowed up in victory.

"Where, O death, is your victory?

Where, O death, is your sting?"

Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

We trust God. God calls us to be the Church,


to celebrate God's presence, to love and serve others, to care for creation, to seek justice and to resist evil,







THE MEANING OF TOTENFEST

This is the last Sunday of the church year. The new church year begins next week with the First Sunday in Advent. Today, we remember those in our congregation who have died and we give thanks for their lives. We lift up in prayer the families and friends of those who have lost loved ones. From St. Pauls' German heritage, we call this day Totenfest, which means "a festival celebration for those who have died." The liturgical color for this Sunday is white, a symbol of resurrection.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Our Prelude is *I Don't Feel No Ways Tired* composed in 1980 by the Reverend James Cleveland (1931-1991). He was inspired by the exclamation of an elderly woman in his congregation. She'd had a hard life with pain, disappointment and mistreatment "just because of who she was." She found strength in her faith, redemption in Christ, and liberation in the Holy Spirit. Her words and fortitude inspired the Reverend Cleveland. He also carried on the tradition started by Thomas A. Dorsey fusing the spirit filled music of gospel with the energy and drive of jazz. Muzette Morgan, our longtime alto section leader and member of St. Pauls, introduced this song to us.

The Countless Hosts in White Array is a Norwegian folk melody from the 17th century. DEN STORE HVIDE FLOK, which is the tune name, is the first line of the Norwegian poetry by Hans Adolf Brorson (1694-1764), who composed the poetry in c. 1760. Helen A. Dickinson (1875-1957) provided the translation into English in 1907. This hymn arrangement was made by one of Norway's most famous composer Edvard Grieg (1843-1907). Among Grieg's many great works is the *Peer Gynt Suite* and his *Piano Concerto*.

The author of the text of *For All the Saints* was William Walsham How (1823-1897). He penned the poetry we love so much in 1864. He was an Oxford graduate and served many parishes in England throughout his life. Just to prove that there can be a sense of humor even in hymn tune names, SINE NOMINE, means "no name" in Latin. The stirring music was written in 1906 by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). He is one of the greatest English composers of the post-Victorian era. He composed music for nearly all genres of performance.

The text for *Child of Blessing, Child of Promise* was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal, *Psalmodia Sacra*, the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), he composed nearly 100. He was Kapellmeister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. As an interesting side note, Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, was until recently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musick in Stuttgart. He returned to Eastman School of Music this fall.

Be Still My Soul uses a tune called FINLANDIA, because the melody was composed by Jean Sibelius (1865–1957) as part of his famous tone poem by the same name that honored his homeland. The original German text is by Kathrina von Schlegel

(1697–17??) and was translated into English by Scottish Jane Borthwick (1813–1897) who translated and composed many hymn texts.

The tune, KREMSER, is an unattributed Dutch folksong and dates from the 16th century. We also know a more traditional Thanksgiving text in English, *We Gather Together to Ask the Lord's Blessing*. The text of this version, *We Praise You*, *O God, Our Redeemer*, **Creator**, was written by Julia C. Cory (1882-1963) in 1902. Because her father was a Sunday school superintendent and an amateur hymn writer, Julia began composing hymn texts at a very early age.

Goin' Home is an anthem based on a beautiful theme in the Symphony No. 9 in E minor, "From the New World" by Antonin Dvořák (1841-1904). Dvořák was a Czech composer, who spent a very important part of his career in the United States. He was deeply affected by folk music of his Bohemian heritage, so it is not a surprise that during his time in our country he was also moved by the African American spirituals he heard. The famous African American composer Harry Thacker Burleigh worked with Dvořák, so for many years it was assumed that the tune we associate with Goin' Home was a spiritual Dvořák had heard. The problem is there is no record of a spiritual with that title or melody. It is a tribute to Dvořák that he created a melody that was an homage to a musical genre that was foreign to him, but also tugged at the roots of his love for Bohemian folk music. The words were added in 1922 by one of his American students, William Arms Fisher, who expressed the hope and belief of life beyond death just "close by, through an open door."

Now Thank We All Our God is a translation by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) of the original German by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) written in 1636. Winkworth, although born in England, spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's rights. Rinkart became a scholar at St. Thomas School in Leipzig where Bach would later be Kapellmeister. The tune, NUN DANKET, takes its name from the first words of the German text. It is most often attributed to Johann Crüger (1558-1662), who in reality was the publisher of the psalter where this hymn tune appeared for the first time.

The *Final* from *Symphony No. 1 in D minor, Op 14* was composed by Louis Vierne (1870-1937) in 1888 to 1889. Along with Charles-Marie Widor, Vierne was one of the great Romantic symphonists for organ. He was born blind. He composed six symphonies for the organ. He was also the organist of Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris from 1900 until his death. In fact, Vierne collapsed and died at the console at Notre Dame at the close of a recital there. Maurice Duruflé was at his side as an assistant that day. The *Final* shows Vierne's brilliance as both a composer and his own talent as a performer.

2023 GIVING CAMPAIGN - IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as Saint Pauls United Church of Christ.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls UCC, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 72. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age $70 \frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 72. You cannot make QCDs from your 401(k); it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor.
