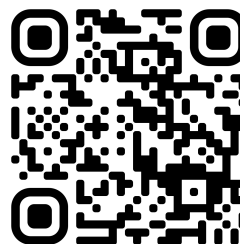

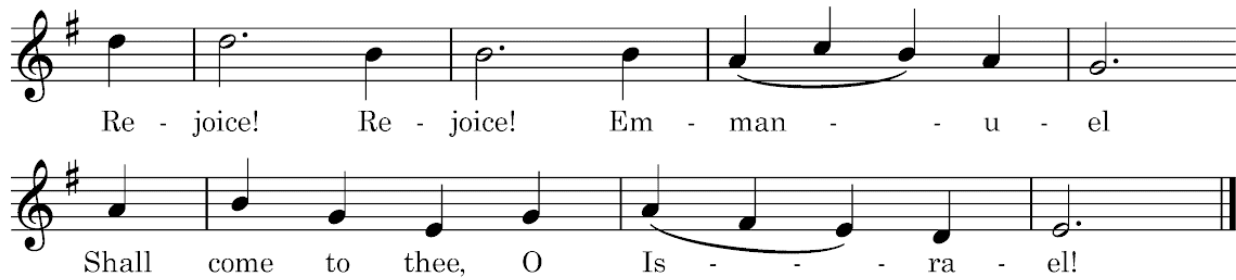

ADVENT WREATH- Each week during Advent we light another candle in our Advent wreath to anticipate the coming of Christ, the light of the world. These candles symbolize the gifts of hope, love, joy and peace that Christ's coming brings. Today, we light the candle of Hope.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Bethlehem Down is a Christmas carol originally composed in 1927 by Peter Warlock (1894-1930). Peter Warlock was the pseudonym of Philip Heseltine. Warlock was born and raised in the great Welsh vocal tradition. There is probably no story in music so strange as that of Peter Warlock. In addition to being a composer, in order to earn a living, he also was a music critic for a London newspaper. When he gave his

first recital of compositions under his real name, Philip Heseltine, he was not reviewed favorably by the press in general. That is when he decided to take the pseudonym of Peter Warlock. Sadly, his personality started to split and Hesseltine, the critic, wrote very unfavorable reviews of Warlock the composer. Finally, Hesseltine, who could no longer stand Warlock and his music, announced and carried out his “assassination” of Warlock. If ever there was a plot for an opera, this is it.

O Come, O Come Emmanuel is thought of as a Christmas carol, but its text definitely references the anticipation of Advent. The original Latin, VENI EMMANUEL, was translated in 1851 by J. M. Neale (1818-1866). He was a member of the British clergy and struggled with ill health his entire life. Neale also composed the texts for many other hymns including *All Glory Laud and Honor* and translated many other Latin texts like *Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence*.

Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence uses a French carol melody, PICARDY, from the 17th century that was harmonized in 1906 by the great English composer of the 20th century, Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). The words are a translation and paraphrase of a hymn from the Greek Liturgy of St. James.

O Come, O Come Emmanuel is also the theme of our Communion Music. The original Latin, VENI EMMANUEL, is an unattributed chant melody. This haunting arrangement by Brendan Henry is also included on St. Arbucks’ seasonal recording, *Mid-Winter Gifts*. Please see the details on how to hear it in the announcements.

The hymn, ***Could We O Savior Worthy Be***, NEW LONDON, is a relatively new tune for us. It was used as the closing hymn in the Benjamin Britten (1913-1976) cantata *Saint Nicolas*, which we sang in worship during Advent in 2018. The hymn dates from 1685 in the “Book of Psalms of David.”

E’en So, Lord Jesus, Quickly Come was composed by Paul Manz (1919-2009) in 1953. He composed this anthem while in a hospital waiting room awaiting results of surgery on his child after being injured in an automobile accident. His son survived. It is performed widely including for “Lessons and Carols” at King’s College Cambridge in England. He was a graduate of Concordia College in River Forest and Northwestern University.

The text for ***Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus*** was written by the great English hymn writer, Charles Wesley (1707–1788). He wrote more than 6,500 hymn texts. The composer of **HYFRYDOL**, Roland Hugh Prichard (1811–1887), was from Wales and was only 19 when he composed this piece.

Vom Himmel hoch, da komm ich her, is one of the most recognised German Christmas hymns. The original music and text are both by Martin Luther (1483-1546), the founder of the Lutheran Church and the cause of the Reformation. The hymn had 15 stanzas (!), and Luther used it as a “game hymn’ about the birth of Christ. Johann Pachelbel (1653-1706) is known for the popularity of his *Canon in D*, which is often requested at weddings as a processional. He is a very worthy predecessor to Bach. He composed for choir, organ and instruments.

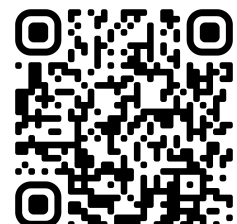

2023 GIVING CAMPAIGN - IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as Saint Pauls United Church of Christ.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls UCC, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 72. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age 70 ½, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 72. You cannot make QCDs from your 401(k); it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor.
