



Mark 12:18-27

Some Sadducees, who say there is no resurrection, came to Jesus and asked him a question, saying, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that 'if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no child, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother.' 





TODAY'S MUSIC

Schmücke dich, o liebe Seele, BWV 654 by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) is a hymn tune we know in English as Deck Thyself My Soul with Gladness. It is one of the great German communion hymns. It is often referred to by church musicians as "the queen of communion chorales." SCHMÜCKE DICH (Deck Thyself, My Soul, With Gladness) was composed by Johann Crüger (1598-1662). Crüger also composed Nun danket alle Gott (Now Thank We All Our God).

Be Known to Us in Breaking Bread is a text written in 1825 by James Montomery (1771-1854). He was of Moravian parentage, and because of his parents devotion, he became a very committed missionary. He was imprisoned in England for composing a song in support of the French Revolution and was also an ardent abolitionist. ST. FLAVIAN is an unattributed melody from the 16th century that lends itself to being sung in canon, a round, as you will hear it today.

The text of *I Come with Joy* was written by Brian Wren (b. 1936), who is a pastor in the Congregational Church in England. He wrote the hymn as a summary of a series of sermons on the meaning of communion. The tune is an old American hymn, DOVE OF PEACE, from

the *Southern Harmony* hymnal, part of the Sacred Harp tradition. It was arranged by Austin Lovelace (1919-2010), who was Organist and Choirmaster for a number of years at First United Methodist Church in Evanston.

Let Us Talents and Tongues Employ uses a tune, LINSTEAD, of Jamaican origin. Fred Kaan, (1929-2009), who wrote this text in 1975, was born in The Netherlands. After surviving the horrors of occupation during World War II (his parents were active in the Dutch resistance), he became a committed pacifist. He emigrated to England after the war where he became a member of the United Reform Church.

Great Is Thy Faithfulness, tune FAITHFULNESS, dates from 1923 and was composed by William M. Runyan (1870-1957). He finished his ministry in Kansas and was particularly fond of the poet Thomas Chisholm (1866-1960), who wrote this text. Runyan set 25 of Chisholm's poems to music. Chisholm based this text on Lamentation 3:22 & 23: *Because of the Lord's great love, we are not consumed.*

The Promise of Living is the Act I finale from the opera The Tender Land (1952-1954). It was composed by Aaron Copland (1900-1990), one of the greatest American composers of the 20th century. His music uses American folk themes for pieces like Appalachian Spring, Billy the Kid and The Lincoln Portrait. The Tender Land is his second and last opera. The story concerns the coming of age of a young woman at the time of her high school graduation in the 1930s. The story is set during harvest time on a large midwestern grain farm. The libretto was written by Copland's partner at the time, Erik Johns, a.k.a. Horace Everett, (1927-2001) and is based on the book Let Us Now Praise Famous Men by James Agee. The text is equally appropriate for Thanksgiving and communion.

O God Beyond All Praising is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934). The tune is called THAXTED, which is the main theme of the Jupiter movement from Holst's *The Planets*. It is truly a majestic hymn. Thaxted is the village where Holst grew up. It was Ralph Vaughan Williams that adapted "Thaxted" as a hymn. The author of our text is Michael A. Perry (1942–1996). He began studies as a physicist and changed to theology.

Walk All Over God's Heaven is more a new creation than an arrangement by Mahallia Jackson (1911-1972). She took inspiration from the old hymn I Got a Robe, You Got a Robe. Mahallia has a direct connection to St. Pauls. Brendan Henry grew up loving her music and her deep spiritual commitment that his daughter is named after her. Mahallia Jackson was born in Mississippi but her connection to Chicago was long and deep. She had a lifelong commitment to the civil rights movement and stood behind Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as he spoke at the Lincoln Monument. In recordings of that event, you can hear her shouting at Dr. King, "Tell them about the dream, Martin!" Although she toured the world, she called Chicago her home and Studs Terkel was among her devoted fans and champions. She came home to Chicago during her final illness.

ELECTION WATCH 2022: "Laugh about it! Shout about it!" - NOW is the time.

VOTE! If you have not voted already, please vote on or before <u>Election Day, Tuesday</u>, <u>November 8</u>. A recent poll from the Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs, cited in the October 18, 2022 *Chicago Tribune*, found 71% of registered voters "think the very future of the U.S. is at stake" in the upcoming election, regardless of their political party affiliation. "While about two-thirds of voters say they are pessimistic about politics, about 8 in 10 say casting their ballot this year is extremely or very important." The AP-NORC survey also found that the upcoming elections are unique, "with voters both exhausted by the political process and determined to participate in shaping it." Clearly, these are difficult, complex and challenging times - and as those who aspire to who love and serve others, care for creation, and seek justice and resist evil, it is incumbent upon each of us to thoughtfully and prayerfully participate and vote.

2023 GIVING CAMPAIGN - IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as Saint Pauls United Church of Christ.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls UCC, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 72. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age $70 \frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 72. You cannot make QCDs from your 401(k); it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor.
