

SCRIPTURE

Matthew 1:18-25

The birth of Jesus Christ happened like this. When Mary was engaged to Joseph, just before their marriage, she was discovered to be pregnant—by the Holy Spirit. 





POSTLUDE

ADVENT WREATH- Each week during Advent we light another candle in our Advent wreath to anticipate the coming of Christ, the light of the world. These candles symbolize the gifts of hope, love, joy and peace that Christ's coming brings. Today, we light the candle of Peace.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Of the Father's Love Begotten is a chant melody from the 13th century and is the melody for this organ prelude by Wilbur Held (1915-2015). Held was born in Des Plaines, IL, and rose to be the assistant to Leo Sowerby at St. James Episcopal Cathedral. The tune, DIVINUM MISTERIUM, translates as "divine mystery," which certainly describes how God chose to come to be with us. The author of the Latin was Aurelius Clemens Prudentius (348-410), a Spanish poet, devout believer, and lawyer. The translations were made by John M. Neale (1818-1866), who was born into an English evangelical home, but developed great sympathies with Catholicism and Sir Henry Wiliam Baker (1821-1877), an Anglican priest who wrote a number of hymn texts, among them is The King of Love My Shepherd Is.

The original German text for *Comfort, Comfort O My People* was written in 1671 by Johann Olearius (1611-1684). He was born into a family of Lutheran theologians and became a Lutheran pastor. The translation was by Katherine Winkworth (1828-1878), who translated many famous German hymns. She was born in England but moved with her mother to Dresden in 1845. The tune, GENEVA 42, also known as the first line of the hymn, FREU DICH SEHR, takes its name from the *Genevan Psalter of 1551* and also Psalm 42 upon which the text is based.

O Come, O Come Emmanuel is thought of as a Christmas carol, but its text definitely references the anticipation of Advent. The original Latin, VENI EMMANUEL, was translated in 1851 by J. M. Neale (1818-1866). He was a member of the British clergy, and struggled with ill health his entire life. Neale also composed the texts for many other hymns including *All Glory Laud and Honor*, and translated many other Latin texts like *Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence*.

The composer of both the music and the text of *In the First Light* is Bob Kauflin. He was first the pastor of Sovereign Grace Ministries and is now the Director of Sovereign Grace Music. He received his musical education from Temple University with a Bachelor's in Music in 1976. He also has a popular blog, *Worship Matters*.

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The text for *Gentle Joseph, Joseph Dear* is relatively new, 1993. It is a paraphrase by Carol Birkland (b. 1945) of an older translation of the German. It was written specifically for our New Century Hymnal. JOSEPH LIEBER, JOSEPH MEIN, the tune title, takes its name from the first words of the 15th century German carol. There is also an alternate Latin tune name, RESONET IN LAUDIBUS, which means "ring in praise."

The setting of *Jubilate Deo*, Psalm 100, was composed in 1961 by Benjamin Britten (1913-1976). It was composed at the request of Prince Phillip, H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh, for St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle. It was requested to be sung at his 80th and 90th birthdays, and also at his funeral in 2021. The organ part seeks to imitate the harmonics of bells and the choral parts are a dialogue between sections that urge each other to praise God. These outbursts of joy are contrasted with hushed portions describing the qualities of graciousness and mercy. The exuberance has a Christmas-like joy.

Hark! The Herald Angels Sing is easily among the most well known Christmas carols. The text was written by famous Methodist clergy Charles Wesley (1749-1788) in 1739 and was altered to its present version in the same year by George Whitefield (1714-1770). The tune name, MENDELSSOHN, takes its name from its famous German composer, Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847), who was much beloved in England. The melody is borrowed from a larger work, Festgesang, Op. 68 composed in 1840.

Christmas Is Coming was composed by Vince Guaraldi (1928-1976) and is a musical theme from the made-for-TV movie, *A Charlie Brown Christmas* (1965), which also includes his jazz instrumental standard *Linus and Lucy*. He also created music for other animated features and won a Grammy in 1963 for Best Original Jazz Composition for *Cast Your Fate to the Wind*.
