

ADVENT WREATH - Each week during Advent we light another candle in our Advent wreath to anticipate the coming of Christ, the light of the world. These candles symbolize the gifts of hope, love, joy and peace that Christ's coming brings. Today, we light the candle of Love.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Charles Gounod (1818-1893), composed his *Petite Symphonie in B Major for Winds* in 1885. The work was commissioned by a wind ensemble in Paris, the *Société de musique pour instruments à vent.* Gounod is largely known for his 12 operas, the most famous of which are *Faust* (1859) and *Roméo et Juliette* (1867). He also composed a great number of songs and church music including his setting of *Ave Maria*, which is an "arrangement" of Bach's *Prelude in C Major* with the vocal line being an obligato or descant above Bach's prelude. Gounod was introduced to Bach's music by Fanny Hensel, pianist and sister of Felix Mendelssohn. Bach's music was just being rediscovered in the mid-19th century and influenced Gounod a great deal. *The Petite Symphonie* is a work in four movements for nine wind instruments. Today we hear the first movement, *Adagio - Allegro*.

Of the Father's Love Begotten is a chant melody from the 13th century. The tune, DIVINUM MISTERIUM, translates as "divine mystery," which certainly describes how God chose to come to be with us. The author of the Latin was Aurelius Clemens Prudentius (348-410), a Spanish poet, devout believer, and lawyer. The translations were made by John M. Neale (1818-1866), who was born into an English evangelical home but developed great sympathies with Catholicism, and Sir Henry Wiliam Baker (1821-1877), an Anglican priest who wrote a number of hymn texts, among them *The King of Love My Shepherd Is*.

Angels We Have Heard on High is originally an 18th century French noël (carol) freely translated by James Chadwick (1813-1882), an Irish Catholic priest. GLORIA is from the text of the joyfully cascading Latin refrain, which we sing as a Benediction Response after Christmas and during Epiphany. It is particularly appropriate for today's service since the refrain, *Gloria in excelsis Deo*, is also the opening text of the Poulenc **Gloria**.

The tune for *Lift Up Your Heads*, TRURO, was composed by Charles Burney (1726-1814). Burney was a music historian and composer, who apprenticed with a well known English Baroque composer, Thomas Arne (1710-1778). The words were written by the famous English hymnist and Methodist preacher, Charles Wesley (1707-1788).

Gloria, FP 177, was composed by Francis Poulenc (1899-1963) in 1959. He was the most famous composer of *Les Six*, a group of French composers that rejected both Germanic influences and also that of French Impressionism. Poulenc composed in many genres: solo piano, *melodie* (songs), opera, and many instrumental and orchestral pieces as well. *Gloria* along with his *Organ Concerto*, which has been presented in worship at St. Pauls in the past, are among his most famous pieces.

Poulenc spoke of composing his *Gloria* in the "style of Vivaldi," who also composed a famous setting of *Gloria* in the 18th century. The musical character of *Gloria* spans a range of feelings from majestic, the opening brass theme; lushly mysterious, *Domine Deus*; and a recurring sense of playfulness, especially *Laudamus te*. Poulenc said that the feeling of the *Laudamus te* was inspired after he saw a group of Benedictine monks playing soccer in their robes.

It is important to note that the chamber orchestration of the Poulenc *Gloria* for this service has been lovingly prepared and arranged for winds, harp, timpani, and organ by Mark Mosley. A HUGE thanks to Mark!!!

César Franck (1822-1890) was the cornerstone composer of French Romantic organ composers. The greatest organist/composers, Vierne and Widor, followed in his footsteps. His *Grand Choeur* is another example of pieces that explore all the colors available in an organ the size of our Phoenix.

What a perfect way to open our **Three R's** musical celebration and "giving" theme with **GloRia** marking the first **R**, **REJOICE**.

THE CHRISTMAS TREE IS A CHRISMON TREE - A Chrismon is a symbol of Christ. All the designs have been passed down through centuries of Christian tradition and are made of white and gold, to symbolize the purity and the majesty of Christ. Our chrismons have been made by members and friends of St. Pauls, and the tree itself was a gift to the church in 1997 from the Crowley and Opp-Ekdahl families. It takes 15,300 lights to illuminate the 17' tree.

See how many of the symbols you can find. Some of the symbols are:

The CIRCLE, a symbol of eternity, of God.

The CROSS, in all its variations, a reminder of the saving work of Christ.

The CROWN, a symbol of the victory of Christ.

The FISH, an early Christian symbol.

The ORB, is Heaven and Earth.

The DESCENDING DOVE, represents the Holy Spirit at Christ's baptism.

The TRIANGLE, THREE INTERTWINED CIRCLES, symbols for one God in three persons, the Trinity.

The STARS are made of crosses, showing the connection between the birth and death of Jesus.

The BUTTERFLY, a symbol of the resurrection.

The DOGWOOD, branches form a cross.

The LILY OF THE VALLEY represents Christ's humility.

ALPHA and OMEGA, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet represent Jesus saying that He is the beginning and the end.
