


PRAYER OF CONFESSION

SCRIPTURE Mark Sancya

Luke 2:41-50



TODAY'S MUSIC

We are so pleased to welcome the **Pure Sound Youth Choir** from St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Houston, Texas. Pure Sound Youth Choir is a mainstay of the Music and Fine Arts program at St. Luke's, and serves as the worship choir regularly at the 8:30 a.m. Sunday service. Comprised of hard-working and dedicated 6th through 12th graders, these singers follow in the footsteps of young people who have sung since the choir was founded in 1996. The choir tours every other year just after Christmas and destinations have been foreign and domestic, from Alaska to Cuba, Scotland to San Francisco.

On alternate years, the choir traditionally presents Vivaldi's *Gloria* on Christmas Eve, along with scores of alumni singers who return for the event. In addition, they present a major musical every spring, and those shows have included everything from *Oklahoma* and *Guys and Dolls* to *The Little Mermaid* and the 2022 offering, *Once Upon a Mattress*. Under the direction of founder Sid Davis, these young singers change the world each and every week with their unparalleled service.

We also want to acknowledge that our connection to St. Luke's has been facilitated by Chancel Choir member and past St. Pauls Congregation President Jim Brandt. His daughters, Barbara Brandt and Dr. Carrie Carlson, as well as his grandchildren, are deeply involved in the music and fine arts ministry of St. Lukes. Jim raves about the music he hears there when he visits and it is a pleasure to be able to have the Pure Sound Youth Choir share their talents with us.

In dulci jubilo is a tune that we associate with Good Christians Friends, Rejoice. The Latin text means "in sweet rejoicing," and is an undated folk dance from the Middle Ages. It has been set by many composers including Buxtehude, Bach, Liszt, and Holst. Marcel Dupré (1886-1971) was among the most famous French organist-composers of the 20th century. He was also a champion of the great French organ builder Cavaillé-Coll. He composed his setting in 1931.

Come, Lord Jesus! is an arrangement of a familiar Celtic tune set with the text *Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus*. The tune itself was made famous to the masses as a 1970s commercial, if it rings true to your ear!

O Come, All Ye Faithful, known by the Latin tune title ADESTE FIDELES, is definitely a carol that we sing on Christmas Eve, BUT how appropriate the words are after a separation from each other for more than a year, O come all ye faithful, joyful and triumphant.... The words and music are attributed to John Francis Wade (1711-1786), who wrote the text originally in Latin. He left England in 1745 because of the persecution of Catholics. The English text was added by Frederick Oakeley (1802-1880), an Anglican priest, in the mid-19th century.

Gaudete - A traditional, early music setting of the words.

The text for *All Beautiful the March of Days* was written in 1907 by Frances Whitmarsh Wile (1878-1939). She was an American who composed this mid-winter text with encouragement from her pastor while she was a parishioner at a church in Rochester, NY. She composed only a few hymn texts and this is the most famous. FOREST GREEN is an English folk tune that Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) arranged in 1906 for a hymnal. In England, this tune is associated with the carol *O Little Town of Bethlehem*.

Brightest and Best - This work bridges Christmastide to Epiphany in an elegant way and leads us into the new year with a true sense of optimism.

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and has a Ph.D. in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and is first found in the great American shape-note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

Peace, **Peace** employs a type of melody often referred to as a "companion melody," and this one in particular allows for the congregation to sing along with one verse of *Silent Night*.

God Is Working His Purpose Out is a favorite hymn of our recently deceased Pastor Emeritus Tom Henry. The text was written by Arthur Campbell Ainger (1841–1919) in 1894. The text demanded a muscular tune, which Martin Shaw (1916–1999) provided in 1915.

Behold, God Is My Salvation was composed by Jody Lindh, who served as the organist/choirmaster of University Park United Methodist Church, Dallas, TX, from 1969 to 2013, and takes its text from Isaiah 12.


