

TODAY'S MUSIC

If We Ever Needed the Lord Before, We Sure Do Need Him Now was composed in 1943 by Thomas A. Dorsey (1899-1993). He is truly the originator of gospel music, a fusion of church music with jazz. He is a Chicago original and beloved worldwide. Take 6 is an American acapella sextet that was formed in 1980 at Oakwood College in Huntsville, Alabama. They focus music on updated versions of spirituals and Gospel music.

O Radiant Christ, Incarnate Word is a text composed in 1991 by Ruth Duck (b. 1947), one of the most influential hymn composers of our time having penned more than 150 hymn texts. She is also an ordained pastor in the United Church of Christ and retired professor of worship at Garrett-Evangelical Seminary in Evanston, IL. The tune, DICKINSON COLLEGE, was composed in 1962 by Lee Hastings Bristol (1923-1979). He was an American born into the family of the Bristol-Myers Company. He got his organ performance degree at Trinity College in London.

The original text for *Thank Our God for Christian Siblings* was written in 1948 by Roger K. Powell (1914-2003) for a rallying song for The National Council of Churches meeting in 1952. The text was updated for our New Century Hymnal. PLEADING SAVIOR was first published in 1830 and is attributed to Joshua Levitt (1794-1873). Levitt was a Yale graduate and became a Congregational minister. He aided a slave to escape the South and raised funds for the defense of the Armistad captives.

There Shall a Star Come Out of Jacob was composed in 1847 by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) as part of an unfinished oratorio, Christus. Like Mozart, he had a very short and artistically productive life. He was born in Germany, but a great source of his popularity was outside his home country. He was especially beloved in England. Amongst his greatest accomplishments was the revival of the works of J.S. Bach, and the first "modern" performance of Bach's St. Matthew Passion since his death. Elijah is performed in England almost as often as Messiah, which is, of course, by another "adopted" German, Handel. The closing portion of this anthem employs the chorals Wie schöne leuchtet die Morgenstern (How bright appears the morning star.)

The author of *O God of Earth and Altar* (1906) was Gilbert Keith Chesterson (1874-1936). He was a British journalist and lay theologian who also dabbled in hymn writing. LLANGLOFFAN is an unattributed Welsh melody.

Wie schön leuchtet der Morgenstern is known to us in English as an Epiphany hymn, O Morning Star, How Clear and Bright, that can be found in our Black Hymnal No. 158. The chorale melody was composed in 1598 by Philip Nicolai (1556-1608), a Lutheran pastor, poet, and composer. This chorale melody was so beloved that it was set by many composers including Bach (1685-1750). Johann Pachelbel (1653-1706) is not well known outside music circles, but his compositions, especially for organ and choir, provided a deep foundation for German composers in the following generation, such as Bach and his contemporaries.


