





#### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

Our prelude today, *Adagio*, was composed by Alexandr Grechninov (1864-1956), who also composed our offertory anthem. More information about him can be found below at *Ninye otpushaiyeshi*. This is the first movement of his *Three Pieces for Organ Op. 159* composed in 1938. His organ composition was deeply influenced by the French symphonists Vierne and Widor. He studied composition in Imperial Russia with Rimsky-Korsakov. He died in New York City and is buried in a Russian community in New Jersey.

The text of *Great Spirit God* was written in 1842 by Joseph R. Renville (1779-1846). His mother was Dakota and his father was French. He was an explorer and Congregational minister. This text and tune became known as the *Dakota Hymn*, and was sung by 38 Dakota prisoners of war as they were led to their execution in Mankato, Minnesota on December 26, 1862. This is the largest mass execution in American history. The English translation was made in 1993 by Sidney H. Byrd, "Hokśila Waśte" (1918-2016) for our New Century Hymnal. He was also a member of the Dakota nation. A veteran of World War II, he became an ordained Presbyterian minister. LACQUIPARLE is a native American Dakota melody.

The text for *My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less* was written in 1834 by Edward Mote (1797-1874). British born Mote wrote a number of hymn texts after a spiritual awakening as a result of the preaching of an evangelical preacher. He also authored a number of Christian pamphlets. SOLID ROCK was composed in 1863 by the prolific hymn writer William Bradbury (1816-1868). He was raised on his father's farm in Maine. He developed a love for music as a child and began playing the organ in church by age 15. Among the best known of his hymns is the children's hymn, *Jesus Loves Me, This I Know.* 

**Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing**, to the tune NETTLETON, is from the rich American tradition of the Sacred Harp hymnals, specifically *Wyeth's Repository of Sacred Music*. The text was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790), who began his professional life as an apprentice to a hairdresser before committing himself to a religious life.

*My Song Is Love Unknown* is a hymn text written in 1664 by Samuel Crossman (1623-1684). Very little is known about his life beyond the fact that he was clergy. The one observation is how clearly this text speaks to us across four centuries. The tune, RHOSYMEDRE, was composed in 1840 by John David Edwards (1806-1885). He was an Anglican priest and the tune name is taken from one of the parishes he served in Wales.

Ninye otpushaiyeshi, commonly known in Latin as the nunc dimittis or the Song of Simeon, was composed by Alexandr Grechaninov (1864-1956). He is primarily remembered for his liturgical music for the Russian Orthodox Church. This is a setting of Simeon's prayer upon seeing the child Jesus. God promised Simeon that he would live to see the Messiah. Grechaninov moved from the Soviet Union to France in 1925, immigrated to the United States in 1939, and spent the rest of his life here. Old Church Slavonic has a similar relationship to modern Russian as Latin does to Italian.

George Matterling added the *Gloria Patri* in the style of Grechaninov. While the Gloria Patri is a prescribed response in liturgical western churches to biblical readings or anthems on biblical texts, it is not part of the liturgy in the Russian Orthodox Church. **A note for this time** - The Russian Orthodox Church was said to be founded by St. Andrew, one of the 12 disciples, when he journeyed from Greece to what became Kyiv, Ukraine, but was then known as *Kiyvan Rus'* (land of the Rus').

The text for *God Whose Giving Knows No Ending* was written in 1961 by Robert L. Edwards (1915-2006). He was a Congregational minister who focused on prison ministry, low income senior housing, and other ministries of social justice. The words are set to the famous Welsh tune HYFRYDOL by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887) when he was only 19. We also sing this tune to the text *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven* and *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling.* 

Billy Taylor (1921-2010) was a great African American jazz pianist, composer, broadcaster, and educator. From 1994, he was the Artistic Director for Jazz at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. He also worked tirelessly to raise funds to replace homes of older jazz musicians in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. *I Wish I Knew How It Would Feel to Be Free* was composed in 1963 at the height of the civil rights movement and became its unofficial anthem. The New York Times called it "one of the greatest songs of the sixties."

#### **CHICAGO ELECTION WATCH 2023**

Chicago Goes to the Polls. The 2023 Chicago elections will take place in two rounds on February 28 and April 4. Elections will be held for Chicago's mayor, city clerk, city treasurer, all 50 members of the City Council, and 66 members of the newly-created Police District Councils. There are currently nine candidates for Chicago mayor; if no mayoral candidate receives a majority of the vote on February 28, there will be a runoff election between the top two candidates on April 4. Early voting in two downtown locations began this past Thursday, January 26, and early voting in all 50 wards begins February 13.
