





### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

Franz Lizst (1811-1886) composed the *Adagio in D Flat Major S. 172, No. 4* as part of his set of piano pieces, *Six Consolations*, between 1844 and 1850. It has been transcribed for organ by a number of organists, and Lizst transcribed many works of other composers for the piano and also the organ. Liszt could be called a phenom in terms of his prodigious technique, sense of drama, and effect on audiences. There are reports of people weeping and fainting during his concerts.

The text of *Jesus Calls Us O'er the Tumult* was written in 1852 by Cecil Frances Alexander (1818-1895). She was born in Ireland and as a child began to write poetry. In 1850 she married an Anglican priest, who later became the Bishop of Ireland. With her sister, she founded a school for the deaf and spent her life working for the disadvantaged and downtrodden. The tune, GALILEE, was composed in 1887 by Willian Herbert Jude (1851-1922). He was born in Suffolk, England and by age 8 was composing music for school plays. In addition to composing, he also became a famous organist, playing dedicatory recitals over more than 1,000 new instruments.

I Sing the Mighty Power of God is a text by Issac Watts (1674-1848), the eminent English poet, who set the entire books of Psalms as poetry, which included Psalm 90, Our God, Our Help in Ages Past. His poetry has inspired many composers.
BETHLEHEM was composed by Joseph Barnaby (1838-1896). He was a renowned British choral director who introduced Bach's Matthew and John Passions in English translations to English audiences. He was knighted by Queen Victoria.

*Come Ye Sinners Poor and Needy*, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals including *Southern Harmony*. Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

The text for *God, We Thank You for Our People* was written in 1986 by Ruth Duck (b. 1947). She is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ and has written four volumes of hymn texts. HOLY MANNA is an unattributed melody from the great American series of shaped-note hymnals from the early 19th century including *The Sacred Harp*.

Howard Hanson (1986-1981), the composer of *How Excellent Thy Name*, was a native of Wahoo, Nebraska. For many years he was Dean of Eastman Conservatory of Music in Rochester, New York. He wrote a full range of compositions from symphonies to chamber music.

### **Remix by Alex Hansen**

Alex Hansen (b. 1999), son of Kurt and Terry Hansen, was born into the family of faith that is St. Pauls UCC and was baptized and confirmed here. He graduated from Elmhurst University in May 2022 majoring in Music Theory and Composition. He is making his mark as a music producer and recording engineer of his own works, his duo with Diana Perez, *diial*, and other artists.

**What is a Remix?** In contemporary terms, a remix involves taking the recording of a song or instrumental and redoing balances and perhaps adding other voices or instruments. This is a tool often used by DJs. The Chancel Choir sang at "How Sweet the Sound" a "rearrangement" or remix of Handel's *Hallelujah Chorus* in a Gospel style. Our National Anthem, the Star Spangled Banner, is "remixed" regularly by the artists singing it at nationally televised events. A remix does NOT replace the original, rather it gives us another way to experience it musicall and enhancing the impact of the text.

*How Firm a Foundation*, although of anonymous origin, is a true American hymn first published in Funk's *Genuine Church Music* in 1832. That hymnal is part of what is often referred to as the Sacred Harp, or shape-note hymnal, tradition in our country which began in the early 19th century. These treasures gained a rebirth during the bicentennial celebrations in 1976. Did you know that before the revival of this tune, FOUNDATION, this text was most often sung to the tune *Adeste Fideles (O Come, All Ye Faithful)*? The text is also unattributed, but first discovered by John Rippon (1751–1836), who was an English Baptist clergy. He noted the author as "K."

*I Saw the Light* was composed and recorded in 1952 by Hank Williams (1923-1953). He was a beloved country music singer and composer. In his all-too-short life, he recorded 35 singles and 11 of those reached No. 1 on the country & western charts.

### **CHICAGO ELECTION WATCH 2023**

Police District Councils. After decades of discussion, a coalition of community, labor, and faith-based organizations proposed, and the City Council in 2021 passed, an ordinance that empowers local communities to elect people to represent them in each of Chicago's 22 police districts. There are 122 candidates vying for 66 vacancies. Three members of each Police District Council will be elected. Each Police District Council is charged with building stronger connections between the police and the community at the local level; collaborating in the development and implementation of community policing initiatives; holding regular public meetings and working with the community to get input on police department policies and practices; working to develop and expand restorative justice and other similar programs; and nominating members to serve on the city-wide Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability (Commission). The Commission has "a central role" in selecting and removing the Police Superintendent and in setting police department policy. NOTE: While Police Districts are geographical areas, they are not the same areas as the city wards that elect Aldermen.
