



TODAY'S MUSIC

Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.

The text for *We Have Come at Christ's Own Bidding* was written in 1988 by Carl P. Daw Jr, (b. 1944). He is the American born son of a Baptist minister and received his Ph.D. in English literature from the University of Virginia. He is also an Episcopal priest who has served a number of congregations in Virginia. The words were set to the famous Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887) when he was only 19. We also sing this tune to the text *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven* and *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling.*

The text for *Child of Blessing, Child of Promise* was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal, *Psalmodia Sacra*, the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), he composed nearly 100. He was Kapellmeister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. An interesting side note is that Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, was until recently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musick in Stuttgart. He returned to Eastman School of Music this past fall.

Jesus, Take Us to the Mountain is a text written in 1991 by Jaroslav J. Vajda (1919-2008). He was born in Ohio of Czech parents and became a Lutheran pastor and university theologian. In addition, he was a poet and translated many Slovak texts. SILVER SPRING was composed in 1991 by Carl F. Schalk (1929-1921). He has a deep Chicago connection. He was on the faculty of Concordia University in River Forest, a long time member of Grace Lutheran Church, also in River Forest, and an editor for the Lutheran Book of Worship. His master's degree in composition was from Eastman School of Music and he composed countless pieces for worship.

You Make Beautiful Things is a simple folk-like melody named BEAUTIFUL THINGS, with text and music authored by Michael (b. 1980) and Lisa (b. 1981) Gungor. They are a married couple who met as students at Oral Roberts University. Their band, Gungor, comprising three to 10 members, has sought to broaden its appeal beyond just Christian contemporary music.

Benjamin Britten, (1913-1976), composed this truly majestic and mysterious setting of Festival *Te Deum*, the great Latin hymn, in 1944 for a centennial celebration of St. Marks, Swindon, England. It contrasts chant-like melodic lines at the beginning with an "outburst" from the choir on *Thou art the King of glory, O Christ*. The serene soprano solo is followed by a full-voiced plea from the choir, *Let me never be confounded*. The text is from the 6th century and of anonymous origin. An interesting note is that *Te Deum* was one of the very few non-biblical prayers to survive and be retained in the review by the Council of Trent held between 1545 and 1563. One of the main objectives of that council, beyond sparking a counter-Reformation movement, was to reduce or eliminate non-biblical parts of liturgy. It is a tribute to the power of this prayer that it survived that review.

The text for *Come Down, O Love Divine* was originally composed in Italian by Bianco de Siena (c. 1350-c. 1434) and translated by Richard Frederick Littledale (1833-1890). Siena was a poet and wool worker who became a non-ordained Jesuit in 1367. Irish born Littledale became both an Anglican priest and lawyer. Due to lifelong illness, he spent much of his time writing. The tune, DOWN AMPNEY, was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) in 1906. He was one of the greatest English composers of the 20th century. He composed nine symphonies, operas, numerous oratorios, and choral works.

Trumpet Tune in E was composed by David N. Johnson (1922-1987), an American organist. He was a lecturer at Syracuse University and earlier the organ professor at St. Olaf College. He served during World War II in the U.S. Army Signal Corp in India, Burma and China. He was decorated for his service.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

CHICAGO ELECTION WATCH 2023: Aldermanic Candidates. The membership of the 50-member City Council will change substantially with the 2023 elections as it will have at least 15 new members compared with those elected in 2019, the last aldermanic election. Twelve aldermen are not running for re-election; and four additional members resigned during their terms and have been replaced by the mayor prior to this election. In addition, in May 2022, after months of debate, the City Council adopted new ward boundaries that created 19 White majority wards, 16 Black majority wards, 14 Latino majority wards, and (for the first time) one Asian American ward. This may change who is elected. Candidates are actively campaigning in most of these wards. St Pauls members are strongly encouraged to educate themselves about the candidates and to vote for those they feel will best represent their interests and the city.
