



TODAY'S MUSIC

Ich ruf zu dir, Herr Jesu Christ (I cry to you, Lord Jesus Christ) BWV 639 is a chorale prelude, an organ work based on a Lutheran hymn composed by J.S. Bach (1685-1750). He included this work in his Orgelbüchlein, as well as basing a cantata, BWV 172, on the same chorale and text. The melody, *cantus firmus*, of the hymn was composed by German Reform theologian, Johann Agriola (1494-1566).

Our Introit, a *Lenten Call to Worship*, is based on a 12th century chant. It contains three short stanzas with the final one being a doxology, praise of the Holy Trinity. It closes with the original Latin, *Benedicamus Domino*, "We bless God," repeated twice.

There Is Welcome for the Sinner is a text created by our own Senior Pastor Matt Fitzgerald. He has shared his love of poetry as another window into faith. HOLY MANNA is an unattributed melody from the great American series of shaped-note hymnals from the early 19th century including *The Sacred Harp*.

Lord Jesus, Who Through Forty Days is a text written in 1873 by Claudia Frances Hernaman (1838-1898). She was born in England and her father was an Anglican priest. She composed more than 150 hymns and devoted her life to the religious education of children. The tune, ST. FLAVIAN, is of unknown origin and dates from a hymnal published in the 16th century.

There is no better way, as a church with a strong German heritage, to celebrate the Reformation than with *A Mighty Fortress*, the great Martin Luther hymn. It is arguably the greatest Martin Luther (1483-1546) hymn and encapsulates the theology of the Lutheran Church. EIN FESTE BURG, the name given this chorale, is taken from the first words of the hymn in the original German.

This arrangement of *Lord, I Want to Be a Christian* was composed in 1995 by Moses Hogan (1957-2003). In his all too brief life, Moses Hogan continued and amplified the great tradition of spiritual arrangement that included William Dawson. He recorded a number of compact disks and provided solo arrangements for singers like Kathleen Battle. He was commissioned by St. Pauls to write an anthem, *I Got A Home In-a That Rock*, in honor of Ron McCowan's 25 years of service to this congregation. Mr. Hogan invited Ron and our Chancel Choir to sing that anthem with his professional choir when they sang in Chicago.

Lift High the Cross - George William Kichen (1827-1912) was the original author of the text, but there is a second "contributor" referred to as an "alterer," Michael R. Newbolt (1874-1956), who added to and improved the Kichen text. The tune, CRUCIFER, was composed in 1916 at the height of The Great War by Sydney H. Nicholson (1875-1947). He was Organist/Choirmaster at Westminster Abbey in the 1920s and had a deep influence on English hymnody.

Walk All Over God's Heaven, is much more of a new creation than an arrangement by Mahallia Jackson (1911-1972). She took inspiration from the old hymn I Got a Robe, You Got a Robe. Mahallia has a direct connection with St. Pauls. Brendan Henry grew up loving her music and her deep spiritual commitment that his daughter is named after her. Mahallia Jackson was born in Mississippi but her connection to Chicago was long and deep. She had a long commitment to the civil rights movement and was behind Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as he spoke at the Lincoln Monument. In the tapes of that event, you can hear her shouting at Dr. King, "Tell them about the dream, Martin!" Although she toured the world, she called Chicago her home and came home to Chicago during her final illness. Studs Terkel was among her biggest fans and champions. She is now memorialized, along with her equally famous colleague, Thomas A. Dorsey, in our music windows on the south aisle.
