to care for creation,


to seek justice and to resist evil,



TODAY'S MUSIC

Intergenerational Orchestra Music Notes - Our church's German founders were justifiably proud of the great German composers, particularly "The Three Bs" -- Bach, Beethoven and Brahms. Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) was one of the leading composers of the Romantic era. Born in Hamburg, he spent most of his life in Vienna. Brahms was both a respectful traditionalist and a subtle innovator; his music embeds romantic motifs within traditional structures.

For his choral work *A German Requiem, Op. 45*, instead of setting the traditional Latin requiem mass, Brahms personally selected Biblical texts in the German language. Rather than prayers for the dead, it offers comfort for the living, beginning with the Beatitudes: "Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted." The arranger, Barbara Buehlman, taught music in Round Lake, Illinois, conducted the Palatine Concert Band, and was executive director of The Midwest Clinic.

Brahms's *First Symphony, Op. 68*, appeared in 1876, though Brahms said it took him 21 years to complete. Brahms was consciously working in the shadow of Beethoven. The horns introduce the grand "Alphorn" theme, while the main theme is reminiscent of the "Ode to Joy" theme in *Beethoven's Ninth Symphony*.

God Speak to Me That I May Speak is a text composed in 1872 by Frances Ridley Havergal (1836-1879). She was born in England and her father was an Anglican priest. Although she did not consider herself a poet, she wrote many hymn texts. She also studied both Greek and Hebrew at the collegiate level. The tune CANONBURY was composed in 1839 and is attributed to the famous German Romantic composer Robert Schumann (1810-1856). It is an adaptation of his melody from Nachtstüke (night piece) No. 4 in G major. Johannes Brahms was a champion of the young Schumann's talent and had a close relationship with Robert and Clara Schumann; Robert until his death, and a lifelong connection with Clara after Robert's death.

The music for *Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee* (Ode to Joy) was composed by Beethoven (1770-1827) and is the chorale melody from the final movement of his *Ninth Symphony* (1824). The original German text (1785) was by the famous poet and dramatist Friedrich Schiller (1759-1805), and the English text was composed in 1907 by Henry Van Dyke (1852-1933). Van Dyke was an American author and clergy. He was appointed ambassador to the Netherlands by President Woodrow Wilson prior to the outbreak of World War I.

Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) was a disciple of Bach, in that he was steeped in the beauty of the structure of harmony and counterpoint in composition. *Lass dich nur nichts nicht Dauren*, composed in 1856 before his German Requiem or any of his symphonies, is a simple double canon at the 9th. A canon is a technical term for a "round" like *Row, row, row your boat*. The sopranos and tenors have one melody started at different times an octave plus one note apart, and the altos and basses have a second melody also started at different times an octave plus one note apart. The effect is heightened by a sublime accompaniment for organ that ties this piece together without the compositional devices that Brahms used becoming obvious. The German text is by Paul Fleming (1609-1640). He was a physician and poet. He was engaged as the court physician by the Duke of Holstein and accompanied him on his travels to Russia and the Persian empire.

The text of *I Come with Joy* was written by Brian Wren (b. 1936), who is a pastor in the Congregational Church in England. He wrote the hymn as a summary of a series of sermons on the meaning of communion. The tune is an old American hymn, DOVE OF PEACE, from the *Southern Harmony* hymnal, part of the Sacred Harp tradition. It was arranged by Austin Lovelace (1919 -2010), who was Organist and Choirmaster for a number of years at First United Methodist Church in Evanston.

There is no better way, as a church with a strong German heritage, to celebrate the Reformation than by bookending our service with *A Mighty Fortress*, the great Martin Luther hymn. It is arguably the greatest Martin Luther (1483-1546) hymn and encapsulates the theology of the Lutheran Church. The tune name, EIN FESTE BURG, is taken from the first words of the hymn in the original German.

ABOUT THE INTERGENERATIONAL ORCHESTRA

Since 2002, our Intergenerational Orchestra has been "Making a Joyful Sound in the City." This is our 25th performance in worship, but our first performance since 2020. The orchestra is composed of musicians of all ages and abilities, most of whom are members of the congregation. Since 2002, 190 people have performed in the group, including 72 young people, and 33 families have had two or more members participate.

Our dear friend Wes Salsbury passed away in January 2022. Wes performed with the Intergenerational Orchestra on bass clarinet or clarinet in all 24 previous performances. We dedicate this morning's music to the memory of Wes Salsbury and others we have lost, including Pastor Emeritus Thomas Henry.
