



TODAY'S MUSIC

We are pleased to welcome **Alexandra "Lexi" Makowiecki**, our soloist for the Offertory Anthem. We also welcome Lexi's parents Maria and Bartek Makowiecki. Lexi is a sophomore at Lake Forest High School and studies voice privately with Kurt R. Hansen.

We also welcome a return visit from **Joel Kelsey**, who was the first bass player in the St. Arbucks Quartet. We are so happy to have him for the Sunday he is in town to fill in for Alex Austin.

Lord, Don't Move That Mountain lyrics and music were written by Doris Mae. Akers (1923-1995), a famous African-American gospel composer, arranger, and singer. This is another gospel song that Mahallia Jackson sang, and this arrangement is by Brendan Henry.

To My Humble Supplication is a text composed in 1620 by Joseph Bryan (dates unknown). The tune, GENEVAN 86, derives its name from a famous psalter published in Geneva, Switzerland in 1551. Each psalm setting was assigned its number corresponding to the same number in the Book of Psalms. Among other tunes we still sing from the *Genevan Psalter* is *Comfort, Comfort Ye My People*.

Sing Praise to God is another great hymn from our German heritage. The tune, LOBE DEN HERRN, is the first line of the first stanza of the German text. The composer is unknown and it was first published in a hymnal in 1668. The original text was written by Joachim Neander (1650-1680). Although he was reported to have had a "riotous youth," he became the first important hymn writer of the German Reform Church. This updated translation was made in 1993 for our New Century Hymnal by Madeleine Forell Marshall (b. 1946).

E.A. Hoffman (1839-1929) wrote the text for **What A Covenant**, that many of us learned as *What a Fellowship*, in 1877. He was an ordained minister and wrote over 2,000 gospel songs in his lifetime. The tune bears two names, LEANING, which is the first word of the refrain, and SHOWALTER in honor of the composer, A. J. Showalter (1858-1924). He actually began teach shape-note singing at age 14. He attended a number of private Christian music programs to learn his craft.

O Love That Will Not Let Me Go is a text written in 1882 by Scottish minister George Matheson (1842-1906). He lost his sight as a child, and had a brilliant career as a lecturer, author, and minister. The tune, ST. MARGARET, was composed in 1884 by Albert L. Peace (1844-1912). He was born in Yorkshire England, began as a gifted self-taught musician, went on to earn a doctorate in music from Oxford, served as the organist at the Glasgow Cathedral, and a prominent recitalist.

The **Pie Jesu** is from <u>Requiem</u> by John Rutter (b. 1945). His <u>Requiem</u> was completed in 1985 and is dedicated to the memory of his father, who died in 1984. He chose texts in Latin from *Missa pro defunctis* (Mass for the Dead), in the Liber Usualis. The inclusion of this text is somewhat unusual in requiem mass settings. It was first included by Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924) in his beautiful setting composed in 1890. Rutter was not only a champion of Fauré's music, he also edited the critical edition of Fauré's original version of the <u>Requiem</u> score. Rutter's inclusion and setting of the *Pie Jesu* is an obvious homage to Fauré. We will hear another great setting of this text in two weeks on March 19, when our Chancel Choir sings the <u>Requiem</u> by Maurice Duruflé with organ and chamber orchestra in worship.

How Firm a Foundation, although of anonymous origin, is a true American hymn first published in Funk's <u>Genuine Church Music</u> in 1832. That hymnal is part of what is often referred to as the Sacred Harp, or shape-note hymnal, tradition in our country which began in the early 19th Century. These treasures gained a rebirth during the bicentennial celebrations in 1976. Did you know that before the revival of this tune, FOUNDATION, this text was most often sung to the tune *Adeste Fideles (O Come All Ye Faithful)*? The text is also unattributed, but first discovered by John Rippon (1751–1836), who was an English Baptist clergy. He noted the author as "K."
