John 21:1-14

Simon Peter announced, "I'm going fishing." The rest of them replied, "We're going with you." They went out and got in the boat. They caught nothing that night. When the sun came up, Jesus was standing on the beach, but they didn't recognize him.

Jesus spoke to them: "Good morning! Did you catch anything for breakfast?"

They answered, "No." He said, "Throw the net off the right side of the boat and see what happens." They did what he said. All of a sudden there were so many fish in it, they weren't strong enough to pull it in. Then the disciple Jesus loved said to Peter, "It is the Lord!"

So Simon Peter, hearing that it was the Lord, threw on some clothes, for he was stripped for work, and flung himself into the sea. The other disciples came in by boat for they weren't far from land, a hundred yards or so, pulling along the net full of fish. When they got out of the boat, they saw a fire laid, with fish and bread cooking on it.

Jesus said, "Bring some of the fish you've just caught." Simon Peter joined them and dragged the net to shore—full of a great many fish; 153. And though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said, "Breakfast is ready."

Not one of the disciples dared ask, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord.

Jesus then took the bread and gave it to them, and likewise the fish. This was now the third time Jesus had shown himself alive to the disciples since being raised from the dead.





TODAY'S MUSIC

I Expect to See Him is by Jessy Dixon (1938 - 2011), another gospel artist and composer with deep roots in Chicago. His music was beloved outside his own community and he received seven Grammy nominations in his career. He toured the world with Paul Simon after Mr. Simon heard him and the Jessy Dixon Singers at a concert at Radio City Music Hall in New York City. He also wrote music for artists as varied as Diana Ross and Cher.

This Is the Day uses a folk melody and unattributed words from Fiji. It was first published in 1967 in a hymnal in Australia. It lends itself to be sung in a call and response style.

Peace Like a River is another example from the rich history of Black American Spirituals. The first three items of the "fruit of the Spirit" (Galatians 5:22) are love, joy and peace. This spiritual compares the peace of God to a placidly flowing river, the joy of Christ to a merrily bubbling fountain, and the love of God to a deep, wide ocean.

Enter, Rejoice, and Come In was composed in the 1970s by Louise Ruspini (1900-2000) who also provided the text, which is based on Psalm 100. The tune borrows from the first line of the refrain: ENTER, REJOICE.

Helen Kemp (1918-2015), who composed *Look Around*, was an American born voice teacher, church music pedagoge, composer, and children's choir clinician. She attended Westminster Choir College at Princeton University and returned later in life to be on their church music faculty. She also authored several books on children's choirs.

The text for *God We Thank You for Our Pancakes* is a respectful and lighthearted adaptation by Pastor Matt Fitzgerald of a text by Ruth Duck (b. 1947), *God We Thank You for Our People*. HOLY MANNA is an unattributed melody from the great American series of shaped-note hymnals from the early 19th century including *The Sacred Harp*.

Stan Pethel (b. 1950), who composed *Hosanna*, Hosanna, is Professor Emeritus at Berry College near Rome, Georgia. When he was an active member of the faculty, he taught composition and also low brass lessons. He has composed more than 850 works for a wide range of performers and ensembles, and is published by 23 publishing firms.

Let Us Talents and Tongues Employ uses a tune, LINSTEAD, of Jamaican origin. Fred Kaan, (1929-2009) wrote this text in 1975. Kaan was born in The Netherlands. After surviving the horrors of occupation during WWII (his parents were active in the Dutch resistance), he became a committed pacifist. He emigrated to England after the war where he became a member of the United Reform Church.

Craig Curry, who arranged this great hymn tune, *For the Beauty of the Earth*, is a graduate of Wheaton College Conservatory of Music and the University of Miami. He is an active composer whose arrangements and compositions have been widely performed.
