Acts 2:1-18, 21

TODAY'S MUSIC

Today we welcome the **St. Pauls Brass** to add a triumphant spirit to Pentecost Sunday. Its members are **Kris Hansen, Jim Brandt**, trumpets; **Tom Clancy, Rick Peterson**, horns; **Nancy Pifer**, tenor horn; **Mark Swanson**, trombone; **Chris Bettler**, tuba; **Kevin Dzierzawski**, organ; and **Mark Mosley**, conductor.

Lord, Don't Move the Mountain lyrics and music were written by Doris Mae Akers (1923-1995), a famous African American gospel composer, arranger and singer. This is another gospel song that Mahalia Jackson sang and this arrangement is by Brendan Henry.

The original text for *Come, Holy Ghost, God and Lord* was in German and written by Martin Luther (1483-1546) who began the Reformation and founded the Lutheran Church, which shares some of our denomination's history and lineage. The tune name is the first three words of Luther's hymn, KOMM HEILIGER GEIST. The tune is

attributed and predates the Reformation. The translation into English is also attributed and first found in the *Lutheran Book of Worship 1941*.

Spirit Spill Let Church Begin is a new hymn text composed in 2023 by St. Pauls Senior Pastor Matt Fitzgerald. Matt is a lover of poetry, especially as it relates to faith, so it is natural for him to create new words appropriate for Pentecost. The tune LLANFAIR was composed in 1817 by Robert Williams (1782-1821). Williams was a blind basket weaver with innate musical talent. It was said that he could write down a tune having heard it only once.

Come Ye Sinners Poor and Needy, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals including *Southern Harmony*. Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

What a Covenant is also known to us as *Leaning on the Everlasting Arms*, the first words of the refrain. The text is by Eisha Hoffman (1879-1939). He was educated at Union Seminary and served a number of Congregational churches during the term of his ministry. The tune, SHOWALTER, takes the name of its composer A. J. Showalter (1858-1924), who composed more than 100 hymns. He grew up and was deeply influenced by the American shaped-note tradition, which includes famous hymnals like *The Sacred Harp*.

Hall Johnson (1888-1970) composed both the music and text for *Ain't Got Time to Die.* He was an author, composer, arranger, major choral conductor, teacher, and music historian who focused on recording and publishing spirituals. His students included Shirley Verrett. He was eulogized by Marian Anderson as having done more to advance the beauty and importance of the spiritual than anyone up to that time. This is another especially relevant musical and spiritual message as we emerge from the restrictions of the past 16 months.

The tune for **On God the Spirit We Rely**, TRURO, was composed by Charles Burney (1726-1814). Burney was a music historian and composer. He apprenticed with a well known English Baroque composer, Thomas Arne (1710-778). Text edited by Matt Fitzgerald, 2023.

Ite missa est is subtitled "A Festival Postlude." It was composed by Vinzenz Goller (1873-1953). Goller was born into a musical family in Brixen in the Italian Alps. He fought as an officer in the Italian Army in World War I. He became a church musician and was on the faculty of the Vienna Conservatory of Music for many years. The text is the final words of a Catholic Latin Mass, "*The Mass is ended.*"

"They are like trees planted along the riverbank, bearing fruit each season. Their leaves never wither and they prosper in all they do." Psalm1:3 Oak trees are a keystone species to Chicago ecology. They provide habitat for birds, insects and mammals. Their roots are well-adapted to absorbing water and thereby mitigating flooding. Oaks are struggling in Illinois and the oak corridors in the city

are disappearing.

Assess your backyard or neighborhood this summer: is an oak in distress in your yard or neighborhood? Assure that they have plenty of water and the roots are protected. Are there invasive species competing with oaks? Clear them out.
