

More than 150 years after the Emancipation Proclamation, the Black community still bears the burdens of state-sanctioned racial discrimination. POP TAB PROGRAM: RONALD MCDONALD HOUSE CHARITY

Help support the Ronald McDonald Charities by saving aluminum tabs from all kinds of cans: soda, canned foods, pet food, etc. Each year, Ronald McDonald House Charities of Central Illinois collects approximately 40 million tabs. That cashes out to about \$10,000 for the families they serve. Find a container, add your own decorations or download the printable pop tab container wrap (rmhccni.org/get-involved/pop-tabs) and start collecting. Bring your pop tab donations to the Narthex and add them to our collection bin. This is a wonderful opportunity to introduce young children to helping others and recycling. Little things like pop tabs can make a big difference!

CREATION CORNER - provided by the Green Team RESTORE OUTDOORS

Reduce the grass in your yard. Instead, consider planting a rain garden, pollinator garden, ground cover, or wildflower meadow.

Don't mow in May. "No Mow May" began with the awareness that the loss of nearly 97% of wildflower meadows has resulted in great losses of pollinators. Reverse the trend. Allow four weeks between cuts; cut at 3–5 inches, leave a patch to grow long, or mow just the front yard if community ordinances or neighbors are a factor. Switch to a reel or push mower. Switching to a non-gas-powered mower not only saves you money, but also means less toxic gasses going into the air. Plus, it's great exercise!

JOIN THE MOVEMENT - provided by SPARC

How can we repair relationships defined by historical harms? What will it take to mend the tears in the fabric of our society caused by colonization, slavery and xenophobia? Ta-Nahisi Coates states, "And so we must imagine a new country. Reparations—by which I mean the full acceptance of our collective biography and its consequences—is the price we must pay to see ourselves squarely...What I'm talking about is a national reckoning that would lead to spiritual renewal." TODAY'S MUSIC

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) composed six trio sonatas for organ. The term *trio* refers to one voice for each hand and one voice for the feet on the pedals. The sonatas were études, studies for technique. They can sound easy, but they are NOT! Bach composed this work, *Sonata No 4 in C Major, BWV 529*, sometime between 1727 and 1730. *Largo* is an Italian musical term and means a slow tempo.

Our Introit *Alleluia!* was composed by Henry Purcell (1659-1695). Purcell was the greatest early English Baroque composer whose music continues to inspire composers and performances long after his early death at age 36. His most popular work is his *Canon in D*, which is played at many weddings as a processional. However, he also composed the opera *Dido and Aeneas* and a number of works for staged performances of *The Fairy Queen* and *King Arthur*, as well as solo music for voice and church music.

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and also has a Ph.D. in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and is first found in the great American shape-note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

Come Ye Sinners Poor and Needy, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals, including *Southern Harmony.* Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

My Shepherd Will Supply My Need employs a text by the great English poet and hymnodist, Issac Watts (1674-1748). Watts set the entire book of Psalms poetically, many of which we still sing today, notably *Our God, Our Help in Ages Past*. RESIGNATION is another hymn melody whose composer is unattributed and is from the great early American hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*.

Total Praise was "composed," both the words and music, in 1996 by Richard Smallwood (b. 1948). The word "composed" must be amplified to be understood in the context of Gospel music. Very often printed scores of gospel songs follow AFTER a song is learned and performed. A bit like transcribing a jazz solo that is improvised in the moment. Most gospel choirs learn their music aurally, or by ear. That gives the spirit and voice more freedom within strict time. Richard Smallwood is a classically trained pianist and singer who graduated *cum laude* from Howard University and was also steeped in the style and substance of the gospel musical traditions. He was BOTH classically trained and also adept in creating music and text in a "spiritual jazz" freedom and inspiration. **Total Praise** is one of his most popular gospel songs and came out of a time of great sorrow in his life. *Precious Lord* was "composed" by Thomas Dorsey under the same kind of sorrow. Carol Cymbala is the Music Director of the Brooklyn Tabernacle Choir and has won six Grammy Awards with the choir. The Tabernacle and its Choir celebrate a diverse membership and styles of worship.

Forward Through the Ages is known as *Onward Christian Soldiers* (1865) by many believers. This text was penned by Frederick L. Hosmer (1840-1929) in 1908, as a less militant encouragement to believers. Hosmer became a Unitarian minister who wrote more than 100 hymn texts. The tune, ST. GERTRUDE was composed in 1871 by the famous Arthur Sullivan (1841-1900), who composed a great deal of classical music in addition to his famous collaborative theater pieces with W. S. Gilbert. He composed the stirring tune for the Hosmer text.

Danniebelle Hall (1938-2000) was a deeply committed Gospel artist who sought to evangelize through her singing and composing. She formed her own group, The Danniebelles, and was also a member of Andraé Crouch's gospel group, The Disciples. She recorded several solo albums and toured around the world. *Keep Holdin' On* was composed and recorded in the 1980s.
