SCRIPTURE Mark Sancya

Romans 5:1-10

By entering through faith into what God has always wanted to do for us—set us right with him, make us fit for him—we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. We throw open our doors to God and discover at the same moment that he has already thrown open his door to us. We find ourselves standing where we always hoped we might stand—out in the wide open spaces of God's grace and glory, standing tall and shouting our praise.

And not only that. We continue to shout our praise when we are suffering, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

Christ didn't, and doesn't, wait for us to get ready. He died for us when we were far too weak and rebellious to be anything but God's enemies. In human experience it is a rare thing for one person to give their life for another, even if the person they die for is a good man. Yet the proof of God's amazing love is this: it was while we were sinners, God's enemies, of absolutely no use to God, that Christ died for us.

If Christ spared us from God's wrath by dying for us while we were his enemies, now that we are at peace with God, we can be wonderfully certain of our salvation - because he lives for us. This is more than a matter of bare salvation. We don't just sigh with relief, we hold our heads high in the light of God's love because of the peace Christ has made.





TODAY'S MUSIC

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) had such respect for the music of Antonio Vivaldi (1678-1741), that he hand copied some of his music into his personal library. They never met, however. This work, *Concerto in A minor, BWV 593*, which Vivaldi wrote for strings in 1710, Bach transcribed and arranged for organ in 1713 or 1714. The *Adagio* has both a sense of grandeur and warmth.

The text, *O Day of Radiant Gladness*, was composed by Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885) in 1862. He was the nephew of the famous poet William Wordsworth, and had a long career as a priest in the Anglican Church. The tune, ES FLOG EIN KLEINS WALDVÖGELEIN, is a 17th century German folk melody first published in a manuscript found in Memmingen.

God Is Working His Purpose Out is a favorite hymn of our recently deceased Pastor Emeritus Tom Henry. The text was written by Arthur Campbell Ainger (1841–1919) in 1894. The text demanded a muscular tune, which Martin Shaw (1916–1999) provided in 1951.

Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing, to the tune NETTLETON, is from the rich American tradition of the Sacred Harp hymnals, specifically Wyeth's *Repository of Sacred Music*. The text was written by Robert Robinson (1735-1790), who began his professional life as an apprentice to a hairdresser before committing himself to a religious life.

The text for *Amazing Grace* is by John Newton (1725-1807), who was a slave ship captain, but became an Anglican clergy and fervent abolitionist. He once said that writing this text saved his soul. The tune, NEW BRITAIN, is most likely an African American spiritual and was first published in 1829.

Antonio Vivaldi (1678-1741) was a contemporary of J.S. Bach (1685-1750). Indeed, one could say that he was the "Bach of Italy." Bach thought so highly of his works that he transcribed ten of his pieces into his personal library and for performance. Vivaldi was a prodigious composer of operas, chamber music, songs, and sacred works. This *Gloria* is one of his more well-known works. It was composed sometime shortly after the turn of the century. He composed two other settings of this text. *The Four Seasons* is probably his most widely played works, having even been used in commercials, cartoons and film scores.

The original text for *Thank Our God for Christian Siblings* was written in 1948 by Roger K. Powell (1914-2003) as a rallying song for The National Council of Churches meeting in 1952. The text was updated for our *New Century Hymnal*. PLEADING SAVIOR was first published in 1830 and is attributed to Joshua Levitt (1794-1873). Levitt was a Yale graduate and became a Congregational minister. He aided a slave to escape the South and raised funds for the defense of the Armistad captives.

Balm in Gilead is a Black Spiritual. In the Hebrew Bible, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River. This region was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree particular to that area. Many believed that this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief from their oppression. For enslaved people in our country, crossing the Jordan River was code for escaping their bondage by escaping to the north going over rivers like the Potomac and Ohio. This arrangement is by our own Brendan Henry.

UCC GENERAL SYNOD - WHAT IS IT? WHO IS INVOLVED?

The 34th General Synod of the United Church of Christ (UCC) will be held in two weeks in Indianapolis, Indiana. The theme of this year's Synod is "Making All Things New" (*Isaiah 43: 18-19*). This General Synod is being hosted by the UCC's Indiana-Kentucky Conference (300-400 volunteers are being recruited!). The General Synod is akin to a family reunion of the UCC – it includes opportunities to meet and reconnect, glorious worship services, dynamic keynote speakers, an exhibit hall, educational workshops for the church in action, and, of course, elections of denomination leaders and consideration of resolutions that will shape the positions of the denomination. The General Synod is the UCC's national decision-making body, responsible for giving general direction to the denomination's various programs.

At the General Synod, all UCC groups in various settings of the church are strongly encouraged to participate. Interested visitors are welcome. General Synod rotates among locations in the U.S. and occurs every two years, but a proposal being considered at this meeting would shift the meeting to every three years. While individual UCC churches do not send representatives to the Synod directly, they elect delegates to the Conference in which they are located, which in turn elects delegates to the Synod. General Synod delegates from the Conferences include roughly an equal number of lay persons and clergy that are also roughly an equal number in gender. In addition to delegates from the Conferences, the national denominational officers and board members of the UCC and representation from the "HUGs" (Historically Under-represented Groups) serve as members of the General Synod. The HUGs include disability ministries, youth ministries, The Coalition for LGBTQ Concerns/ONA, and individual groups representing Black, Hispanic, the Council of American Indian Ministries (CAIM), and Pacific Islanders and Asian Americans (PAAM).

Rick Peterson wrote this article about the UCC General Synod. Rick has participated in six General Synods, three as a voting delegate (as a member of the national UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries Board of Directors). Rick is currently the St. Pauls representative to the UCC's Chicago Metropolitan Association and Illinois Conference.
