





TODAY'S MUSIC

Intermezzo in E Major from *Fantasien, Opus 1116, No. 4* is a late work composed in 1892 by Johannes Brahms (1833-1897). Brahms was a great light not only in German Romantic music, but the entirety of Romantic music. He is often grouped with the

"3 B's," Bach, Beethoven and Brahms. His music was championed early in his career by Robert Schumann and he maintained a lifelong friendship with Clara Schumann after Robert died. After a long absence from composing music for solo piano, Brahms composed his *Fantasien Op. 116* while on vacation in Austria. His gift for both beauty and effortless counterpoint are obvious.

The text for *Morning Has Broken* was written by Elinor Farjeon (1881-1965), who also wrote children's books. The tune, BUNESSAN, we know so well is a Gaelic melody.

I Know a Man Who Can was composed in 1968 by Jimmie Davis (1899?-2000) and Jack Campbell (1927-2007). Jimmie Davis not only composed religious and popular country western songs, he also served as governor of Louisiana TWICE, 1944 to 1948 and 1960 to 1964. He became known as the "singing governor" and was also a close friend of Lawrence Welk. The date and year of his birth are uncertain because his parents were sharecroppers and couldn't remember exactly when he was born. His most famous song was *You Are My Sunshine*. Less is known about Jack Campbell. Born in Arkansa, he was known as a religious song writer and also fronted a gospel group, Jack Campbell and the Ambassadors.

Samuel John Stone (1839-1900) wrote the text for **The Church's One Foundation** in 1866. He became an Anglican clergy and finished his ministry in Hagerstown, PA. AURELIA, which means "golden," was composed by Samuel S. Wesley (1810-1876) in 1864 and was originally set to a Wesley text, *Jerusalem, the Golden*. Wesley was English and strove throughout his career to improve church music and the lives of church musicians.

The *Adagio cantabile* from the *Cinnamon Grove Suite* is based on lines from the collection of devotional poetry, *Gitanjali*, by Rabindrath Tagore. After graduating from Oberlin College in 1908, Robert Nathaniel Dett (1882-1943) continued studies during the summer of 1915 at Northwestern University and the American Conservatory of Chicago. "The suite, *Cinnamon Grove*, depends greatly on the literary extra-musical ideas in which Dett shows his great love for, and knowledge of, poetry, as well as his love for [African American] folk song".

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw, Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister and also has a Ph.D. in English literature. He has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879) and is first found in the great American shape-note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

Arioso in C Major, *BWV 156* was originally composed in 1729 as part of a cantata by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750). Bach also reused this work as part of his *Sonata for Violin and Keyboard No. 5*. Leopold Godowsky (1870-1938) transcribed and arranged Bach's work. Godowsky was a Lithuanian born, American-raised virtuoso pianist, composer and teacher. Transcribing earlier works for keyboard or portions of Romantic operas was a specialty of Godowsky and other great virtuoso pianists, such as Vladimir Horowitz. Godowsky famously hated the process and stress of making recordings. His final teaching post was at the Chicago Conservatory, which operated on Michigan Avenue until its closure in 1997.

The text for *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling* was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788). His brother, John, was the founder of the Methodist faith. The words were set to the famous Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887) when he was only 19. We also sing this tune to the text *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven*. This text is one of the few that is the source of a "hymn battle" over which tune to sing. The other well known tune for this text is BEECHER.

Balm in Gilead is a Black Spiritual. In the Hebrew Bible, Gilead was the name of the mountainous region east of the Jordan River that was known for having skillful physicians and an ointment made from the gum of a tree indigenous to the area. Many believed this balm had miraculous powers to heal the body. In the book of Jeremiah, God tells the people of Israel that though many believe in the mysterious healing power of this balm, they can't trust in those powers for spiritual healing or as a relief from their oppression. For slaves in our country, crossing the Jordan River was code for escaping their bondage by escaping to the north, going over rivers like the Potomac and Ohio.
