

THE MEANING OF TOTENFEST

This is the last Sunday of the church year. The new church year begins next week with the First Sunday in Advent. Today, we remember those in our congregation who have died and those whose services had been officiated by a St. Pauls Pastor and we give thanks for their lives. We lift up in prayer the families and friends of those who have lost loved ones. From St. Pauls' German heritage, we call this day Totenfest, which means "a festival celebration for those who have died." The liturgical color for this Sunday is white, a symbol of resurrection.

CREATION CORNER - provided by Green Team

Each year in the U.S., 25-30 million real Christmas trees are sold. For every tree harvested, one to three seedlings are planted. The Christmas trees currently growing on 350,000 acres of green space are taking in carbon dioxide and releasing oxygen, helping to clean our air and slow climate change. Artificial trees last many years, but once unusable, they go into landfills where they never biodegrade! So please use and recycle a real tree. There are 4,000+ local tree recycling programs in the U.S.

Important Note: If your pledged financial support for 2024 is changing from this year, and you have a current recurring donation set up through one of our donation options, please adjust your recurring donation accordingly. IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as St. Pauls.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 73. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you

reach age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 73. You cannot make QCDs from your 401K; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor. TODAY'S MUSIC

A Message for Austin/Praise the Lord/Enter the Void was released in June 2023 on the album Apocalypse by Stephen Bruner (b. 1984), aka Thundercat. It is a tribute to Austin Peralta (1990-2012), a jazz pianist and composer from Los Angeles. The piece incorporates samples from Ryuichi Sakamoto's (1952-2023) album El Mar Mediterrani (1999). Sakamoto was a Japanese composer, pianist, and actor who pursued both a solo career and as part of the band Yellow Magic Orchestra. He pioneered a number of electronic music genres. Stephen Bruner is a well known song writer, pianist, singer, and record producer from Los Angeles. His performing groups include West Coast Get Down.

The Countless Hosts in White Array is a Norwegian folk melody from the 17th century. DEN STORE HVIDE FLOK, which is the tune name, is the first line of the Norwegian poem by Hans Adolf Brorson (1694-1764), who composed the poem in c. 1760. Helen A. Dickinson (1875-1957) provided the translation into English in 1907. This hymn arrangement was made by one of Norway's most famous composers, Edvard Grieg (1843-1907). Among Grieg's many great works is the *Peer Gynt Suite* and his *Piano Concerto*.

God Reigns O'er All the Earth is sung to the tune: TERRA BEATA. The source of the music is an English folk melody which first appeared as a hymn in 1906. The text was written in 1981 and is by one of the most prolific contemporary authors of hymn texts, Jane Parker Huber (1926-2008). She was born to missionary parents in China. A lifelong Presbyterian, she focused her hymn texts and ministry on peace-making, justice, and inclusiveness.

The tune, KREMSER, is an unattributed Dutch folk song that dates from the 16th century. We also know a more traditional Thanksgiving text in English, *We Gather Together to Ask the Lord's Blessing*. The text of this version, "**We Praise You, O God, Our Redeemer, Creator,**" was written by Julia C. Cory (1882-1963) in 1902. Because her father was a Sunday school superintendent and amateur hymn writer, Julia began composing hymn texts at a very early age.

Thomas A. Dorsey (1899-1993) began his career as a blues pianist and songwriter. Later, he became a church choir director at Pilgrim Baptist Church in Chicago and was a co-founder of the National Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses. Widely known as the "father of the gospel song," he played an important role in the development of African American gospel music. His best-known song, *Precious Lord*, was composed following the tragic double death of his first wife Nettie and their newborn son. It was a great comfort to Mr. Dorsey in his grief, as well as countless others who have sung it.

Goin'Home is an anthem based on a beautiful theme in the Symphony No. 9, "Symphony From a New World," by Antonin Dvořák (1841-1904). Dvořák was a Czech composer who spent a very important part of his career in the United States. He was deeply affected by folk music of his Bohemian heritage, so it is not surprising that during his time in our country he was also moved by the African American spirituals he heard. The famous African American composer Harry Thacker Burleigh worked with Dvořák for many years, so it was assumed that the tune we associate with Goin' Home was a spiritual Dvořák had heard. The problem is that there is no record of a spiritual with that title or melody. It is a tribute to Dvořák that he created a melody that was an homage to a musical genre that was foreign to him, but also tugged at the roots of his love for Bohemian folk music. The words were added in 1922 by one of his American students, William Arms Fisher, who expressed the hope and belief of life beyond death just "close by, through an open door."

The author of the text of *For All the Saints* was William Walsham How (1823-1897). He penned the poetry we love so much in 1864. How was an Oxford graduate and served many parishes in England throughout his life. Just to prove there can be a sense of humor even in hymn tune names, SINE NOMINE, means "no name" in Latin. The stirring music was written in 1906 by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958). One of the greatest English composers of the post-Victorian era, he composed music for nearly all genres of performance.

The *Allegro* from *Symphony No. 20 in E minor, Op. 20* was composed by Louis Vierne (1870-1937) in 1902. Along with Charles-Marie Widor, Vierne was one of the great Romantic symphonists for organ. Born blind, he composed six symphonies for the organ. He was also the organist of Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris from 1900 until his death. In fact, Vierne collapsed and died at the console at Notre Dame at the close of a recital there. Maurice Duruflé was at his side as an assistant that day. The *Allegro* shows Vierne's brilliance as both a composer and performer.

SPECIAL MUSIC 2023-2024 "MASS APPEAL"

Once again, there is a theme for special music during the 2023-2024 season offered by our Chancel Choir during our 10 a.m. Sunday morning worship services. Please add these dates to your calendar and please invite your friends to join us in person or online at spucc.org/streaming.

Mass Appeal is a way to look at one of the oldest forms of Christian liturgical worship in three very different ways. The goal is to share how the words of the liturgical Mass can be expressed in varied musical styles but always with the same goal: expressing the spiritual joy, longing, majesty, and supplication.

Sunday, December 3, 2023 - *St. Francis in the Americas - A Caribbean Mass* composed in 1997 by Glenn McClure. This joyfully rhythmic Mass setting is a perfect expression of the journey from the anticipation of Advent to the birth of Jesus on Christmas. It is accompanied by a steel drum band.

Sunday, March 17, 2024 - *Messe solennelle* by Louis Vierne. This French Romantic setting in Latin was composed for choir and organ in 1899. It showcases beautiful and majestic writing for both choir and a pipe organ with the breadth of colors available on our Phoenix and the talents of Kevin Dzierzawski.

Sunday, May 19, 2024 - *A Gospel Mass* was composed in 1982 by Robert Ray. This wonderful setting, largely in English, marries the spiritual energy and uplift of Gospel music with the timeless words of the Mass ordinary. This gives us a chance to showcase not only the Chancel Choir, but also our incredible St. Arbucks Quartet.
