



ADVENT WREATH - Each week during Advent we light another candle in our Advent wreath to anticipate the coming of Christ, the light of the world. These candles symbolize the gifts of hope, love, joy, and peace that Christ's coming brings. Today, we light the candle of Hope.

PEACE CANDLE - We have added a peace candle to the Chancel. Jesus said blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called children of God. Please pray for peace daily for all the current wars raging in the world and in our hearts.

INFORMATION FOR FAMILIES

- Childcare is available for babies and toddlers up to age 5 during worship from 10 to 11 a.m. in the Nursery and Toddler Room, downstairs. Activity "busy bags" are available in the Narthex for children to use during the service.
- SUNDAY SCHOOL & CONFIRMATION classes are in session. Students are dismissed with their teachers during the worship service and parents pick up children after the service in their classrooms.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Infant Holy is a beautiful Polish carol, especially beloved in the Anglican carol tradition. It may date as far back as the 13th or 14th century, but was only published in 1908. Many of us associate the carol with the annual Festival of Lessons and Carols from the King's College Chapel at Cambridge, England. Keith Chapman (1945-1989) was an American concert organist and composer. He is best remembered for his symphonic style of playing and his long tenure at the Wanamaker Organ at the Wanamaker's Department Store in Philadelphia.

O Come, O Come Emmanuel is thought of as a Christmas carol, but its text definitely references the anticipation of Advent. The original Latin, VENI EMMANUEL, was translated in 1851 by J. M. Neale (1818-1866). He was a member of the British clergy and struggled with ill health his entire life. Neale also composed the texts for many other hymns, including *All Glory, Laud and Honor,* and translated many other Latin texts, such as *Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence*.

St. Francis in the Americas: A Caribbean Mass was composed in 1997 by Glenn McClure. McClure is a composer, speaker, and scholar. For more than 20 years, Mr. McClure has dedicated himself to building artistic and academic collaborations among students, scientists, classical and indigenous musicians. Mr. McClure has taught at the Eastman School of Music and currently serves on the faculties of Paul Smith's College and SUNY Geneseo.

Some notes from the composer...

St. Francis in the Americas: A Caribbean Mass celebrates the marriage of Latin American cultures and the spiritual legacy of the medieval Italian saint, Francis of Assisi. Followers of "Il Poverello," the little poor man from Assisi, have left their mark on this hemisphere with cities named for the saint (San Francisco, Los Angeles), and customs such as the Christmas nativity scenes we see at holiday time. This concert mass sets several of Francis' writings into languages and musical styles of the New World. The instrumentation features steel drums (invented in the islands of Trinidad and Tobago in the mid-20th century) and other percussion instruments from Latin American traditions. Just as Francis said that his cathedral was the whole world, we see that his simple wisdom could not be limited to one language or musical tradition. We hope you enjoy this musical mosaic of the writings of one of the world's most beloved saints.

This *Mass* combines choir and soloists with various percussion instruments from Latin American traditions. Though the Agnus Dei uses African and Caribbean drums and rattles, the other movements feature the steel drum. The steel drum was invented on the island of Trinidad in the mid-20th century. In response to a legal ban on the use of drums, musicians began searching for other ways to play their music. Eventually, they discovered that pounding dents into the bottom of a 55-gallon oil barrel could create pitches. Decades later, this instrument is now capable of playing music styles ranging from calypso to classical, from samba to jazz. Furthermore, in only a few decades this instrument has become popular all over the world. The steel drum's versatility continues to grow with every new music style it encounters.

Kyrie

This piece weaves the Greek text "Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy" and a prayer written by Francis of Assisi (1182-1226) into the fabric of a Caribbean Samba. Francis wrote this prayer at a pivotal moment of conversion. After he had given up the lavish life of a rich young man, he prayed before a crucifix in a broken down church that commanded him to go "rebuild my church." This humble prayer was the beginning of Francis' life of service, just as the Kyrie marks the humble beginning of our liturgy, a liturgy that calls us to a life of service.

Gloria

In contrast to more lively settings of the "Gloria" text, this piece creates a melancholy mood with the presence of two melodies: *Amazing Grace* (a British tune entitled *New Britain*, and text written by reformed slave trader, John Newton) and *Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child* (a mournful African American Spiritual). Even though Old Testament scriptures commented on the tragedy of slavery, Christianity still inspired both the slaves and slave owners of the New World. The *Gloria* explores this painful paradox of our history by placing a melody of a slave trader next to a melody of a slave. This piece resonates with the Book of Job by exploring the mysteries of innocent suffering. Latin American cultures were born out of the conflicts and collaborations of Native populations, Europeans and West Africans; therefore, this piece expresses "Glory to God" within the context of their tragic history.

Alleluia

This movement is composed in the dance style of a Calypso. The women's trio trades Alleluias with the full choir, and the movement finishes with a long list of why we sing of the greatness and compassion of God. (This note by Kurt R. Hansen.)

Credo

Unlike the mysterious nature of the *Gloria*, the *Credo* is a powerful, confident statement. The soloist sings over a pulsating salsa rhythm. The complex overlapping drum rhythms are combined with a subtle rhythm pattern sung by the choir. In this way, the choir becomes another rhythm instrument. The overall form, a twelve bar blues chord progression, makes an additional reference to the African contributions to Latin American cultures while hand clapping refers back to the contributions of Spanish music culture.

Santo

The "Santo" sets another one of Francis of Assisi's poems in the liturgical context. The music includes references to a traditional Mexican melody and a "comparsa" rhythm. The driving rhythm of this piece is reminiscent of a great deal of Latin American liturgical music. Whereas Northern European liturgical music often emphasizes the solemnity of prayer, Latin American and African liturgical music often emphasize the lively, dance-like quality of prayer.

Agnus Dei

The "Agnus Dei" or "Lamb of God" is arranged in the style of African singing for choir and percussion. The call and response form is a regular feature of African American singing. The Kenyan work entitled *Missa Luba* inspired the rhythmic style of singing that you find in this movement.

The tune for *Lift Up Your Heads*, TRURO, was composed by Charles Burney (1726-1814). Burney was a music historian and composer, who apprenticed with a well known English Baroque composer, Thomas Arne (1710-1778). The words were written by the famous English hymnist and Methodist preacher, Charles Wesley (1707-1788).

The text for *Joy to the World* was composed in 1719 by the famous British poet and theologian, Issac Watts (1674-1748). Watts' great contribution was setting the entire Book of Psalms poetically. This is a paraphrase of both Psalms 98 & 96. One of his most well beloved texts is *Our God, Our Help in Ages Past*. ANTIOCH was composed by George Friderick Handel (1685-1759), who also composed *Messiah*, and was adapted as a hymn by Lowell Mason (1792-1872). Mason is often referred to as the father of American church music for his contributions.

What is a steel drum? - This is a truly Caribbean instrument that was originally created by noting the dents in the top of a 55-gallon oil drum had a clear and true pitch. By varying the number and size of the dents in a concave lid, it was possible to create a range of pitches. Now the steel pans are created as musical instruments and their sound is a staple of Caribbean music.

THE CHRISTMAS TREE IS A CHRISMON TREE - A Chrismon is a symbol of Christ. All the designs have been passed down through centuries of Christian tradition and are made of white and gold, to symbolize the purity and the majesty of Christ. Our chrismons have been made by members and friends of St. Pauls, and the tree itself was a gift to the church in 1997 from the Crowley and Opp-Ekdahl families. It takes 15,300 lights to illuminate the 17' tree.

The TRIANGLE, THREE INTERTWINED CIRCLES, symbols for one God in three persons, the Trinity.




The STARS are made of crosses, showing the connection between the birth and death of Jesus.

Reducing Food Waste (Suggestions from Pete Peterson, World Wildlife Fund)

The EPA estimates that during the holidays food waste increases by about 25%. Perhaps we are driven by images of bountiful tables filled with family favorites and specialty products. Many of these images arose when food insecurity was high; for example, as during the Great Depression in the 1930s.

We live in a time of abundance for most people. However, to waste food is to waste natural resources and contribute to global warming. This holiday season consider:

- Plan just enough and let go of the image of the groaning board;
- Emphasize vegetarian offerings;
- Look for biodegradable containers to distribute leftovers;
- Freeze what you cannot use for later enjoyment;
- Share with neighbors!

IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as St. Pauls.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 73. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age $70 \, \frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 73. You cannot make QCDs from your $401 \, \text{K}$; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor.
