

Mark 4:26-34

Then Jesus said, "This is what the kingdom of God is like. It's as though someone scatters seed on the ground, then sleeps and wakes night and day. The seed sprouts and grows, but the farmer doesn't know how. The earth produces crops all by itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full head of grain. Whenever the crop is ready, the farmer goes out to cut the grain because it's harvest time."

He continued, "What's a good image for the kingdom of God? What parable can I use to explain it? It is like a mustard seed. When scattered on the ground, it's the smallest of all the seeds on the earth; but when it's planted, it grows and becomes the largest of all vegetable plants. It produces such large branches that the birds in the sky are able to nest in its shade."

With many such parables he continued to give them the word, as much as they were able to hear. He spoke to them only in parables, then explained everything to his disciples when he was alone with them.







If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as St. Pauls.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 73. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age $70 \frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 73. You cannot make QCDs from your 401K; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor. TODAY'S MUSIC

Impromptu Op. 90 (D. 899), No. 3 in G flat Major was published in 1827, the year before the death of Franz Schubert (1797-1828) at the age of 31. Op. 90 comprises four impromptus, and Nos. 3 and 4 were actually published after Schubert's death. The G flat Major Impromptu is characterized by long meditative melodic lines. Both the vast amount and quality of work that Schubert composed in his all too short life is almost impossible to fathom. It is also worth mentioning that Kevin Dzierzawski played this work at his father's memorial service this week. We are grateful that he has shared this piece with us during Lent.

To My Humble Supplication is a text composed in 1620 by Joseph Bryan (dates unknown). The tune, GENEVAN 86, derives its name from a famous psalter published in Geneva, Switzerland in 1551. Each psalm setting was assigned its number corresponding to the same number in the Book of Psalms. Among other tunes we still sing from the *Genevan Psalter* is *Comfort, Comfort Ye My People*.

For the Fruit of All Creation is a slightly updated version of the original 1970 Fred Pratt Green (1903-2000) text. One of the most prominent hymnodists in Britain, he was born in Liverpool and became a Methodist minister. AR HYD Y NOS is a traditional Welsh melody first found in *Musical Relics of the Welsh Bands* published in Dublin in 1784.

I Love to Tell the Story has multiple authors. The familiar refrain was written in 1866 by Kate Hankey (1834-1911) and the verses were penned and the music composed in 1869 by William G. Fisher (1835-1912). Although Hankey was born into privilege in London, she spent her life working with the poor and teaching Bible classes. Fisher was an American who had a lifelong interest in music. Although he was a businessman, he composed more than 200 "spiritual songs," and conducted mass choirs at Dwight L. Moody revivals. The tune name, HANKEY, takes its name from Ms. Hankey.

We Plant a Grain of Mustard Seed is a text written in 1990 by Mary Bryan Matney (1955-2010). The tune, NEW BEGINNINGS, was composed for this text also in 1990 by Sally Ann Morris (b. 1952), who was also Matney's life partner. Morris only began composing in 1990 and has created more than 100 hymn tunes since then. This hymn received its first publication in our *New Century Hymnal* (1995).

Beautiful Savior is an unattributed Silesian folk song that was first found in the Münster Gesangbuch of 1677. The hymn tune name, SCHÖNSTER HERR JESU, is drawn from the first line of German text. The translation was done by Augustus Seiss (1823-1904). The arranger, F. Melius Christiansen (1871-1955), was the founder of the St. Olaf College Choir. Along with Peter Christian Lutkin at Northwestern University, Christiansen inspired a huge new interest in a capella singing in this country. Beautiful Savior is the unofficial anthem of St. Olaf in much the same way that the Lutkin Benediction is for Northwestern. Kurt R. Hansen's maternal grandfather, John Mahard Rosborough (1878-1969), worked with Christiansen extensively and studied at Northwestern with Lutkin.

Now Thank We All Our God is a translation by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878) of the original German by Martin Rinkart (1586-1649) written 1636. Although born in England, Winkworth spent many years in Dresden, which is why she was so adept at translating German chorales. She was also a tireless fighter for women's rights. Rinkart became a scholar at St. Thomas School in Leipzig, where Bach would later be Kapellmeister. The tune, NUN DANKET, takes its name from the first words of the German text. It is most often attributed to Johann Crüger (1558-1662), who in reality was the publisher of the psalter where this hymn tune first appeared.

Sunshine Day was released in 1972 on Portrait Records and sung by Black American singer and actor Howard McCrary with four other family members. In 1986, McCrary was nominated for a Grammy for his album *So Good*. He also guest starred on the TV series *Amen* and *Martin*.

Mass Appeal is a way to look at one of the oldest forms of Christian liturgical worship in three very different ways. The goal is to share how the words of the liturgical Mass can be expressed in varied musical styles but always with the same goal: expressing the spiritual joy, longing, majesty, and supplication.

Sunday, March 17, 2024 - *Messe solennelle* by Louis Vierne. This French Romantic setting in Latin was composed for choir and organ in 1899. It showcases beautiful and majestic writing for both choir and a pipe organ with the breadth of colors available on our Phoenix and the talents of Kevin Dzierzawski.

Sunday, May 19, 2024 - *A Gospel Mass* was composed in 1982 by Robert Ray. This wonderful setting, largely in English, marries the spiritual energy and uplift of Gospel music with the timeless words of the Mass ordinary. This gives us a chance to showcase not only the Chancel Choir, but also our incredible St. Arbucks Quartet.
