

Jesus said, "Come to think of it, you will drink the cup I drink, and be baptized in my baptism. But as to awarding places of honor, that's not my business. There are other arrangements for that."

When the other ten heard of this conversation, they lost their tempers with James and John. Jesus got them together to settle things down. "You've observed how godless rulers throw their weight around," he said, "and when people get a little power how quickly it goes to their heads. It's not going to be that way with you. Whoever wants to be great must become a servant. Whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not to be served—and then to give away his life in exchange for many who are held hostage."

SPECIAL MUSIC 2023-2024 "MASS APPEAL"

Mass Appeal is a way to look at one of the oldest forms of Christian liturgical worship in three very different ways. The goal is to share how the words of the liturgical Mass can be expressed in varied musical styles but always with the same goal: expressing the spiritual joy, longing, majesty, and supplication. This morning, we look at a setting of the mass ordinary that is much more traditional and Romantic than our December offering of *St. Francis in the Americas: A Caribbean Mass*.

Our final offering of **MASS APPEAL** will be **Sunday, May 19, 2024** - *A Gospel Mass* was composed in 1982 by Robert Ray. This wonderful setting, largely in English, marries the spiritual energy and uplift of Gospel music with the timeless words of the Mass ordinary. This gives us a chance to showcase not only the Chancel Choir, but also our incredible St. Arbucks Quartet.

The *Romance* from *Symphony No. 4 in G minor, Op. 32* was composed in 1914 by Louis Vierne (1870-1937), just two months before the oubreak of World War I. It is the fourth movement in a five-movement symphony for organ. Interestingly, Vierne dedicated this symphony to an American organist, William C. Carl (1865-1936). If you listen carefully to the *Messe solennelle* in the service, you will hear moments that influenced this later work. Along with Charles-Marie Widor, Vierne was one of the great Romantic symphonists for organ. He was born blind. He studied with César Franck. He composed six symphonies for the organ. He was also the organist of Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris from 1900 until his death. In fact, Vierne collapsed and died at the console at Notre Dame at the close of a recital there. His student, Maurice Duruflé, was at his side as an assistant that day. The *Romance* shows Vierne's harmonic brilliance as a composer, his use of the many colors in organ registration, and his own talent as a performer.

Out of the Depths I Cry to Thee is a text written in 1524 by Martin Luther (1483-1546). The original German of the first line is the tune name, AUS TIEFER NOT. The translation was done in 1863 by Catherine Winkworth (1827-1878). Although born in England, her mother was German. Winkworth moved to Dresden where she developed a deep interest in Lutheran chorales. She translated hundreds of German hymns.

The text for *O Love How Vast, How Flowing Free* is a free translation of an anonymous 15th century Latin poem. The tune, DEO GRACIAS, is also known as AGINCOURT. It is an English ballad that also dates from the 15th century.

The *Messe solennelle* (Solemn Mass) was composed in 1899 to be accompanied by two organs. The choir organ would have been in the chancel of a French cathedral, and, as the name suggests, was to accompany the choir. The "grand organ" would have been in a balcony in the rear of the cathedral. It would have provided a dialogue with the choir and a bigger, more colorful sound than the choir organ. Kevin Dzierzawski has arranged the two original organ parts to be able to perform them on our Phoenix, Aeolian-Skinner Organ. Vierne's score asks for many colors and levels of volume and brilliance that highlight the organ as a worthy "symphonic partner" to the choir's text and music.

Louis Vierne (1870-1937), along with Charles Marie Widor (1845-1937), were the great French late romantic organ symphonists. Both wrote works for the organ on the same scale as orchestral symphonies. (It is Widor's *Toccata* from his *Fifth Symphony for Organ* that opens our candlelight procession on Christmas Eve.) Both wrote only one mass for choir and organ. Both chose to set a *missa brevis*, that is the Mass Ordinary without the *Credo*, the Nicene Creed. Vierne was organist at Notre Dame in Paris. Widor was organist at St. Sulpice, also in Paris. Vierne was blind and served as an inspiration to a generation of organist/composers such as Jean Langlais, who shared Vierne's visual impairment, talent and indomitable spirit.

Come Ye Sinners Poor and Needy, to the tune RESTORATION, is mined from the wonderful early 19th century American shape-note hymnals including *Southern Harmony*. Its composer and lyricist are unknown, but it was first published in 1835. The melody is characterized by a folk-like swing.

The complete title of the *Marche triomphale* is *Marche triomphale pour le centenaire de Napoléon I in F-Sharp Minor, Op. 46*, composed in 1921 by Louis Vierne to celebrate the 100th anniversary of Napoleon's death. It is originally scored for organ, three trumpets, three trombones and timpani. This transcription has been made by Mark Swanson.

Giving Up Plastic Wrap Is Doable!

The plastic wrap we use in the kitchen is prized for being water resistant and ideal for keeping food and leftovers fresher. The big problem is that plastic wrap is difficult to recycle under our current recycling systems. In addition, as the film breaks down, plastic wraps release dioxin into the food system by means of fish and fowl eating the microplastic in landfills and streams. Alternatives to plastic film are readily available: wax paper, parchment paper, aluminum foil, and better yet, glass containers. In addition, one can buy and store less or give leftovers to neighbors in need.

IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as St. Pauls.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 73. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age $70 \frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 73. You cannot make QCDs from your 401K; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor.
