



TODAY'S MUSIC

Richard Strauss (1864–1949) composed *Feierlicher Einzug der Ritter des Johanniterordens* (Solemn entry of the Knights of St. John) in 1909. He is perhaps best known for his operas which include <u>Elektra</u>, <u>Salome</u>, and <u>Der Rosenkavalier</u>, to name a few. His music gained popularity long after his death for the opening phrases of <u>Also sprach Zarathustra</u> (Thus spake Zarathustra) that was used for the movie score of <u>2001</u>, <u>A Space Odyssey</u>. <u>Feierlicher Einzug</u> is a majestic work originally scored for 15 (!) trumpets, 4 horns, 4 trombones, 2 tubas and timpani. It was composed and first performed in Dresden, the same year as the composition of <u>Elektra</u>. It was transcribed by Chip DeStefano specifically for St. Pauls.

The *Call to Worship* was composed in 1982 by John Rutter (b. 1945) who also composed the text based on psalms of praise. John Rutter's music was introduced to this country by Mel Olson, who was the Director of Music at Dundee Presbyterian Church in Omaha, NE, where our music director grew up and sang in his choirs.

Christ the Lord Is Risen Today, tune EASTER HYMN or LYRA DAVIDICA, uses a text by Charles Wesley (1707-1788), the great Methodist theologian and hymnodist. The tune's composer is not known and is taken from a collection, *Lyra Davidica*; hence, one of the tune names. It is equally appropriate to sing this great Easter hymn on a day that has a real sense of resurrection for many at St. Pauls.

The text for *Morning Has Broken* was written by Elinor Farjeon (1881-1965), who also wrote children's books. The tune, BUNESSAN, we know so well is a Gaelic melody.

Franz Liszt (1811-1886) composed the *2 Consolations* (Tröstungen) *in E Major*-at different times, the first, S. 171a, between 1844 and 1849 and the second, S. 172, between 1849 and 1850. They are reflective works in the style of a *nocturne*, a night song or serenade. The works are likely to have been inspired by a Lamartine (1790-1869) poem about Consolation. It is hard to understate Lizst's career as a performer. He had a prodigious technique and his audiences were often affected in a manner we would associate with pop stars of this era. Audience members literally swooned and fainted. All of these reactions don't lessen his stature as both a performer and composer.

I Saw The Light was composed and recorded in 1972 by Todd Rundgren (b. 1948). It shares the same title as a well known Hank Williams (1923 - 1953) song he wrote in 1952. Rundgren reported that he composed the song in 20 minutes of creative fire. His song has appeared in many films and television programs. Rundgren has always pushed the creative boundaries in both recording and performing as a

composer, singer, and guitarist. He is certainly one of the most innovative popular artists of our time. Matt Fitzgerald has composed new lyrics for the this service.

The Creator Has A Master Plan was composed by Pharoh Sanders (1940-2022) He was born Farrell Sanders and changed his name after his conversion to Islam. He was a saxophonist was known for creating "spiritual jazz" as well has exploring the overtones on the sax. The legendary saxophonist John Coltrane, who became a close friend of Sanders, recorded this work as an almost musical mantra and featured it on his testament album, *A Love Supreme*.

Worthy Is The Lamb is the final chorus of Messiah and sums up the triumphal message of Christ's resurrection. Although it is most often associated with Christmas, Messiah actually announces the victory of Christ over death. Handel composed the entire work in a two-week flurry of creativity in 1741. The final Amen is a fugue and begins rather modestly with only continuo, one cello, one bass, organ and a quartet of singers. There is a brief violin interlude before the entire choir, trumpets, timpani, and all other instruments storm the heavens in a very Baroque fashion, decoration on top of decoration.

Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885) wrote the text for *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven*. He wrote more than 120 hymn texts and was also the nephew of the famous poet William Wordsworth. The words are set to the famous Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887), composed when he was only 19.

The *Hallelujah Chorus* is arguably the most often performed and well known of the works of George Frideric Handel (1685-1759). This chorus closes Part Two of *Messiah*. The tradition of standing for the *Hallelujah Chorus* dates to King George II standing at a performance in London. It isn't clear if, as tradition suggests, he was deeply moved or perhaps just needed to stand. No matter the reason, the tradition of standing for the *Hallelujah Chorus* is a long established way to honor Handel's genius and the victorious text.

Final from Symphony No. 3 in C Minor, Op. 78 was composed in 1886 by Camille Saint-Saëns (1835-1921), who was at the peak of his skills and popularity. It is most often referred to as The Organ Symphony, because of the prominent part composed for the organ. It is undoubtedly one of the most recorded of the Romantic French symphonic repertoire. The symphony was commissioned by the Royal Philharmonic Society in England. Saint-Saëns conducted the first performance in London and dedicated it to his recently deceased friend Franz Liszt. The symphony requires a pipe organ of significant size to be heard over an entire romantic orchestra. Mark Mosley prepared this transcription.

SPECIAL MUSIC 2023-2024 "MASS APPEAL"

Mass Appeal is a way to look at one of the oldest forms of Christian liturgical worship in three very different ways. The goal is to share how the words of the liturgical Mass can be expressed in varied musical styles, but always with the same goal: expressing the spiritual joy, longing, majesty, and supplication.

Our final offering of MASS APPEAL will be Sunday, May 19, 2024 - *Gospel Mass* was composed in 1982 by Robert Ray. This wonderful setting, largely in English, marries the spiritual energy and uplift of Gospel music with the timeless words of the Mass ordinary. This gives us a chance to showcase not only the Chancel Choir, but also our incredible St. Arbucks Quartet. *Gospel Mass* will be offered in memory of Ron McCowan, our beloved Chancel Choir bass section leader for more than 25 years, who entered that eternal "home in that Rock" on March 4, 2024.
