Learn to "Be the Neighbor" from Leaders on Race and Reconciliation We are excited to invite our youth on the summer 2024 trip - a Tulsa Race and Reconciliation Week, June 8-15. This will be our second experience with youth service and learning between the UCC and the Disciples of Christ in a nationwide program called "Be the Neighbor." Tulsa Race and Reconciliation weeks are centered around a justice-focused biblical curriculum based on Luke and Matthew. Youth will have opportunities to serve with local ministries and social service organizations. Drawing from Tulsa's history of racial violence in the Trail of Tears and the burning of "Black Wall Street," youth will learn from activists and church leaders who are determined to find hope and seek reconciliation and growth rather than simply lamenting the past. Youth will look back at the history of racism to understand why and how to address racism today and into the future. TODAY'S MUSIC

Our Introit *Alleluia* is by Henry Purcell (1659-1695). Purcell, one of the great English Baroque composers, spent his entire short life in London. His father was a musician and singer in the King's court. After his father's death, Henry was raised and encouraged musically by his uncle. Among his famous works is the opera *Dido and Aeneas*. His music is used in film scores and his most popular work is his *Canon in C*.

Hail the Day That Sees Christ Rise is a hymn text composed in 1739 by Charles Wesley (1707-1788), who was the youngest of 18 (!) children. He was popularly known as "The Bard of Methodism," and wrote no fewer than 6,500 hymns! The tune LLANFAIR was composed in 1817 by Robert Williams (1782-1821). Williams was a blind basket weaver with innate musical talent. It was said that he could write down a tune having heard it only once.

Come My Way, My Truth, My Life is a text by George Herbert (1593-1633). He bears the title "Shakespeare of the Church." Herbert was a contemporary of "The Bard" (1564-1616), and like Shakespeare, his poetry lifted common religious practice to the spiritually sublime. THE CALL was composed by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) as part of a cycle for baritone, choir and orchestra, *Five Mystical Songs*, composed between 1906 and 1911 and using Herbert's poetry. Vaughan Williams then adapted THE CALL as a congregational hymn.

Christians, We Have Met to Worship is a hymn anthem based on the tune HOLY MANNA. The tune is attributed to Willian Moore and is from the rich early 19th century American singing tradition often referred to as Sacred Harp, which is the title of the most popular of hymnals of that time. David Ashley White (b. 1944) was the chosen winner of our Sesquicentennial Composition Competition in 1993. Mr. White is director and professor of Composition and Theory at the University of Houston Moore School of Music. He wrote and dedicated this anthem to St. Pauls in 1994.

Both the text and tune, GARDEN, for *I Come to the Garden Alone* were composed in 1913 by C. Austin Miles (1868-1946). He was an American pharmacist from Pennsylvania, but abandoned that career to compose gospel songs. He composed hundreds of them and eventually owned a publishing company that printed song books.

The original text of *The Day of Resurrection* was in Greek and attributed to St. John of Damascus (675-754). One of his many accomplishments was codifying Byzantine chant. The translation we sing was made by J.M. Neale (1818-1866), who authored many hymn texts, was a member of the British clergy, and struggled with ill health his entire life. The tune, LANCASHIRE, was composed in 1836 by Henry Thomas Smart (1813-1879). Smart was largely self taught, but composed many fine hymn tunes in addition to teaching himself to play the organ.

Danielbelle Hall (1938-2000) was a deeply committed Gospel artist who sought to evangelize through her singing and composing. She formed her own group, The Danielbelles, and was also a member of Andraé Crouch's gospel group The Disciples. She recorded several solo albums and toured around the world. *Keep Holding On* was composed and recorded in the 1980s.

SPECIAL MUSIC 2023-2024 "MASS APPEAL"

Mass Appeal is a way to look at one of the oldest forms of Christian liturgical worship in three very different ways. The goal is to share how the words of the liturgical Mass can be expressed in varied musical styles, but always with the same goal: expressing the spiritual joy, longing, majesty, and supplication.

Our final offering of MASS APPEAL will be Sunday, May 19, 2024 - *Gospel Mass* was composed in 1982 by Robert Ray. This wonderful setting, largely in English, marries the spiritual energy and uplift of Gospel music with the timeless words of the Mass ordinary. This gives us a chance to showcase not only the Chancel Choir, but also our incredible St. Arbucks Quartet. *Gospel Mass* will be offered in memory of Ron McCowan, our beloved Chancel Choir bass section leader for more than 25 years, who entered that eternal "home in that Rock" on March 4, 2024.
