





Take the Pledge: Give Up Single-Use Plastics

Have you ever considered how long it takes for single-use plastic to fully biodegrade? Single-use plastics such as straws, cups, plastic bags, account for half of the plastics we use. They have an average useful life of 12-15 minutes, yet they can take hundreds of years to degrade:

- •Drinking straws 200 years
- •Plastic cutlery 400 years
- •Plastic cups 100 years
- •Plastic bags 400 years

There are viable alternatives: natural cloth for plastic bags; paper and bamboo cutlery and cups for plastic ones; and durable drinking straws now made of recyclable materials such as stainless steel.

TODAY'S MUSIC

People Get Ready was composed in 1965 by Curtis Mayfield (1942-1999) for The Impressions, who made it a hit. Mayfield couldn't have had a more varied career. Starting as a gospel choral singer on the North Side of Chicago, he became a professional football player in the Canadian Football League and then returned to music as a singer-songwriter, guitarist and record producer. His most famous music is the soundtrack he composed for the movie *Super Fly* in 1972. In 1990, he became paralyzed from the neck down when lighting equipment from a stage show he was preparing fell on him. It didn't stop him from singing and he was able to play the guitar laying down. Before his death in 1999, he was elected to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

The author of the text for *The Lord's My Shepherd* is Francis Rous (1679-1569), an English cleric, lawyer and Member of Parliament. It is a poetic setting of Psalm 23. BROTHER JAMES AIR was composed by James Leith Macbeth Bain (c. 1840-1925) and was first published in 1915. Born in Scotland, he was a mystic, healer and poet. Although born into a devout Christian home, he rejected his traditional upbringing.

The text for *Child of Blessing, Child of Promise* was written in 1981 by a UCC pastor and teacher of Theology, Ronald Cole-Turner (b. 1948). The tune, STUTTGART, was composed in 1715 by Christian Friederich Witt (1660-1716). Witt completed a huge hymnal, *Psalmodia Sacra*, the year before his death. Of the 774 hymns (!!!), he composed nearly 100. He was Kapellmeister of the Gotha court in Stuttgart at the same time that Bach was in Leipzig, just 300 miles north. An interesting side note is that Nathan Laube, world renowned organist and friend of St. Pauls, was until recently on the organ faculty at the Hochschule für Musick in Stuttgart. He has since returned to the faculty at the Eastman School of Music.

My Shepherd Will Supply My Need employs a text by the great English poet and hymnodist, Issac Watts (1674-1748). Watts set the entire book of Psalms poetically, many of which we still sing today, notably *Our God, Our Help in Ages Past*. RESIGNATION is another hymn melody whose composer is unattributed and is from the great early American hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*.

Randall Thompson, (1899-1984), wrote the *Alleluia* in 1940 on a commission from Serge Kousevitsky, music director of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. It was performed by the entire student body for the opening exercises of the Berkshire Music Center, summer home of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. A historical note: this anthem was sung to the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. on the night before he was assassinated. A high school choir that was supposed to have sung for the meeting in Memphis that evening was delayed by bus trouble and missed the

meeting. The students were upset, and when Dr. King found out they had arrived late, he asked them to please sing for him in his motel room. The students crowded into that small space and sang this inspiring work, the last music in this world that Dr. King would hear.

The original text for *Thank Our God for Christian Siblings* was written in 1948 by Roger K. Powell (1914-2003) as a rallying song for The National Council of Churches meeting in 1952. The text was updated for our *New Century Hymnal*. PLEADING SAVIOR was first published in 1830 and is attributed to Joshua Levitt (1794-1873). Levitt was a Yale graduate and became a Congregational minister. He aided a slave to escape the South and raised funds for the defense of the Armistad captives.

The *Fugue in C Major* BuxWV 174, was composed by Dietrich Buxtehude (1637?-1707). Buxtehude's music and his skill as an organist had a profound effect on Bach. A true story is that Bach, at age 20, walked (!) nearly 250 miles from Arnstadt to Lübeck just to hear and work with Buxtehude. That would be like walking from St. Pauls to Toledo, Ohio.

SPECIAL MUSIC 2023-2024 "MASS APPEAL"

Mass Appeal is a way to look at one of the oldest forms of Christian liturgical worship in three very different ways. The goal is to share how the words of the liturgical Mass can be expressed in varied musical styles, but always with the same goal: expressing the spiritual joy, longing, majesty, and supplication.

Our final offering of MASS APPEAL will be Sunday, May 19, 2024 - *Gospel Mass* was composed in 1982 by Robert Ray. This wonderful setting, largely in English, marries the spiritual energy and uplift of Gospel music with the timeless words of the Mass ordinary. This gives us a chance to showcase not only the Chancel Choir, but also our incredible St. Arbucks Quartet. *Gospel Mass* will be offered in memory of Ron McCowan, our beloved Chancel Choir bass section leader for more than 25 years, who entered that eternal "home in that Rock" on March 4, 2024.
