



Learn to "Be the Neighbor" from Leaders on Race and Reconciliation We are excited to invite our youth on the summer 2024 trip - a Tulsa Race and Reconciliation Week, June 8-15. This will be our second experience with youth service and learning between the UCC and the Disciples of Christ in a nationwide program called "Be the Neighbor." Tulsa Race and Reconciliation weeks are centered around a justice-focused biblical curriculum based on Luke and Matthew. Youth will have opportunities to serve with local ministries and social service organizations. Drawing from Tulsa's history of racial violence in the Trail of Tears and the burning of "Black Wall Street," youth will learn from activists and church leaders who are determined to find hope and seek reconciliation and growth rather than simply lamenting the past. For The Love of Trees and Social Justice. Trees provide for the very necessities of life itself: they clean the air and host diverse animal communities. Increasingly, they will also be important in moderating severe heat waves due to global warming. Yet, the tree canopy in Chicago ranges from 10% to 23% coverage; this is less than other regions and inequitably distributed, with low-income neighborhoods having less canopy. The City of Chicago is initiating a plan called "Our Roots" to increase tree plantings in low-income neighborhoods. It calls for doubling the number of trees planted over the next five years. There is a role we can all play in this effort; more details will be provided next week.

TODAY'S MUSIC

Our prelude, *Someone Asked a Question-Why We Sing* was written in 1993 and features both text and music by Kirk Franklin (b. 1970). In this song, Mr. Franklin also pays homage to the historic hymn text *His Eye Is on the Sparrow*. He has also brought a new and contemporary edge to gospel music by adding the energy of hip-hop.

God Bless Our Homes was written by Frank van Christiensen (1990-1996). He was born in Finland but was brought to the United States as a child. He became a minister in the Presbyterian Church and wrote more than 30 hymn texts. The tune, CHARTERHOUSE, was composed in 1927 by David Evans (1874-1948). He was born in Wales and became an important leader in Welsh church music.

The text for *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling* was written by Charles Wesley (1707-1788). His brother, John, was the founder of the Methodist faith. The words were set to the famous Welsh tune, HYFRYDOL by Rowan Hugh Prichard (1811-1887) when he was only 19. We also sing this tune to the text *Alleluia! Hearts to Heaven*. This text is one of the few that is the source of a "hymn battle" over which tune to sing. The other well-known tune for this text is BEECHER.

The text for *Come Down, O Love Divine* was originally composed in Italian by Bianco de Siena (c. 1350-c. 1434) and translated by Richard Frederick Littledale (1833-1890). Siena was a poet and wool worker who became a non-ordained Jesuit in 1367. Irish born Littledale became both an Anglican priest and lawyer. Due to lifelong illness, he spent much of his time writing. The tune, DOWN AMPNEY, was composed by Ralph (*British pronunciation* - Rayf) Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) in 1906. One of the greatest English composers of the 20th century, he composed nine symphonies, operas, numerous oratorios, and choral works.

Bless God's Holy Name was composed in 1996 by Kenneth T. Kosche (b. 1947) with a text based on Psalm 103. Kosche is a Chicago native and earned both his bachelor and master degrees in Music Education from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and his DMA in Choral Conducting at the University of Washington (Seattle). He is Professor of Music Emeritus at Concordia University of Wisconsin, where he was the Director of Choral Ensembles for many years. He has composed many choral works especially focused on psalm texts and also authored a book about choral conducting church choirs. Even in retirement, he remains very active in church music in his Lutheran parish in Montana. *Just One Person* is from the 1975 musical *Snoopy* based on the Charles M. Schulz (1922-2000) characters in the Peanuts comic strip. The music was composed by Larry Grossman (b. 1938), who was a 1960 graduate of Northwestern University, with lyrics by Hal Hackady (1922-2025), who has composed lyrics for many musicals and television programs. *Snoopy* is considered to be a very successful sequel to *You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown*.

The text for *Blessed Be the Tie That Binds* was penned in 1782 by John Fawcett (1740-1817). He was born in England, orphaned at age 12, and by age 16 became a self-taught preacher. He led a very prominent church in London for seven years. This text states the mutual feelings that Fawcett and his congregation had for each other at his parting for another pulpit. The tune DENNIS was composed by Hans Georg Nägeli (1773-1836). He was born in Switzerland and became a very influential music educator in both Germany and France. His early instruction was from his father and concentrated on the music of Bach.

I Can Tell the World, a truly uplifting Black spiritual, was arranged in 1998. In his all too brief life, Moses Hogan (1957-2003) continued and amplified the great tradition of spiritual arrangement of which William Dawson is part. He recorded a number of compact disks and created solo arrangements for singers like Kathleen Battle. He was commissioned by St. Pauls to write a piece, *I Got a Home in-a That Rock*, in honor of the late Ron McCowan's 25 years of service to this congregation.

God Bless Your Church With Strength is a text authored in 1984 by John A. Dalles (b.1954). He is described as a lifelong Presbyterian and he and Pastor Liz share a similar path. Like Pastor Liz, Dalles was a trained professional architect who then felt a deep calling to ministry. He has written more than 30 hymn texts. The tune, DIADEMATA, was composed in 1868 by George P. Elvey (1816-1893) specifically for this text. He became the organist for St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle.

Go Now in Peace was composed in 1976 by Natalie Sleeth (1930-1992). Natalie Sleeth became one of the most performed and popular composers of church anthems especially for children's voices. One of her hymns, *In the Bulb There Is a Flower*, was chosen for our New Century Hymnal. She was born in Evanston, received her musical training at Wellesley College, and her husband was a professor of homiletics.

Prelude in a Classical Style was composed in 1966 by Gordon Young (1919-1998). He composed choral work and also organ repertoire. He was born in Kansas and received his advanced training at The Curtis Institute. He became organist and choir director at First Presbyterian Church in Detroit and was also on the faculty at Wayne State University. This is his best known work and has been recorded many times.

SPECIAL MUSIC 2023-2024 "MASS APPEAL"

Mass Appeal is a way to look at one of the oldest forms of Christian liturgical worship in three very different ways. The goal is to share how the words of the liturgical Mass can be expressed in varied musical styles, but always with the same goal: expressing the spiritual joy, longing, majesty, and supplication.

Our final offering of MASS APPEAL will be Sunday, May 19, 2024 - *Gospel Mass* was composed in 1982 by Robert Ray. This wonderful setting, largely in English, marries the spiritual energy and uplift of Gospel music with the timeless words of the Mass ordinary. This gives us a chance to showcase not only the Chancel Choir, but also our incredible St. Arbucks Quartet. *Gospel Mass* will be offered in memory of Ron McCowan, our beloved Chancel Choir bass section leader for more than 25 years, who entered that eternal "home in that Rock" on March 4, 2024.
