That is the reason I am confident He will care for My own and reveal the path to you.



TODAY'S MUSIC

Lyrics and music for ***Lord, Don't Move the Mountain*** were written by Doris Mae Akers (1923-1995), a famous African American gospel composer, arranger and singer. This is another gospel song that Mahalia Jackson sang, and this arrangement is by Brendan Henry.

The Introit, ***Lift Every Voice and Sing***, is the joyous refrain of a longer hymn that is the unofficial anthem of black churches and the civil rights movement. J. Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954), the composer, and James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938), the poet, were brothers who crafted this wonderful hymn together. They also wrote Broadway musicals and edited song collections as a team.

This Is the Day employs a folk melody and unattributed words from Fiji. It was first published in 1967 in a hymnal in Australia. It also lends itself to be sung in a call and response style.

Gospel Mass was composed in 1981 by Dr. Robert Ray (1946-2022). Dr. Ray said that it was composed as an experimental work for a one-off performance. In a flurry of inspiration, he composed the entire *Mass* in two weeks. He sought to marry the traditional works of the Mass Ordinary in English with the energy and inspiration of gospel music. It was the first work he had ever written! Little did he know that it would be embraced by churches and concert venues around the world. In a 2009 interview, he said, "God controls everything that I do!"

A native of St. Louis, Dr. Ray completed his Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano Performance at Northwestern University. Our music director, Kurt R. Hansen, sang with him in the Alice Millar Chapel Choir and counted him as a friend.

Professionally, Dr. Ray founded the In Unison Chorus in St. Louis, which he led until 2010. He was on the music faculty first at the University of Illinois, and then at the University of Missouri-St. Louis. As a pianist, he concertized around the United States and abroad. At his death, the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra musicians and administration lionized his contributions to the community, and especially his *Gospel Mass*, which they premiered in the orchestral version in 1996.

OUR SOLOISTS

Darshaya L. Oden, soprano, hailing from Detroit, Michigan, is celebrated for her rich musical background and dynamic performances. Holding a master's degree in music (Voice and Opera Performance) from Northwestern University's Bienen School of Music, as well as a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music from Claflin University, Ms. Oden has honed her craft under the guidance of such esteemed mentors as Nancy Gustafson, Lori Hicks, Virginia Davis, and Pamela Hinchman. She has graced the stage in several notable performances, including her portrayal of Madame Lidoine in Francis Poulenc's *Dialogues of the Carmelites*, Cathleen in Ralph Vaughn Williams' *Riders to the Sea* at Northwestern University, and her captivating rendition of Mimi in Giacomo Puccini's *La Bohème* at Southern University.

Beyond her classical repertoire, Ms. Oden has embraced innovative musical expressions, blending opera with gospel and jazz influences, and transcended borders, as evidenced by her European debut at the esteemed Klangwolke Festival in Linz, Austria, alongside the Adrian Dunn Singers. In addition to her stage performances, Ms. Oden has lent her voice to various cinematic endeavors, contributing background vocals to films such as *Honk for Jesus. Save Your Soul* and *Sacred Soil: The Piney Woods School Story*. Ms. Oden's dedication to her craft has been recognized nationally with commendable achievements in such competitions as the National Association for Negro Musicians (NANM) Vocal Scholarship Competition, where she secured first place at both district and regional levels, and placed second at the national level. She remains an active member of the Adrian Dunn Singers, contributing her exceptional talents to collaborative endeavors that continue to captivate audiences worldwide.

Henry Pleas has been a frequent and popular soloist and performer in the Chicago area for more than 35 years. He has sung professionally for Lyric Opera of Chicago, Chicago Opera Theater, Chicago Symphony Chorus, and Sinfonietta Bel Canto. He earned his bachelor's degree at Brown University and his Master of Music degree from Northwestern University.

Additionally, he works as an artistic producer, administrator and teacher. In the 2022-23 term, he joined the voice faculty at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois. He is President of the Chicago south side not-for-profit **New Rhythm Arts Collaborative (NRAC; newrhythmarts.org)**, whose mission is to collaborate with artists to bring music education and productions to the South Side of Chicago. Learn to "Be the Neighbor" from Leaders on Race and Reconciliation

We are excited to invite our youth on the summer 2024 trip - a Tulsa Race and Reconciliation Week, June 8-15. This will be our second experience with youth service and learning between the UCC and the Disciples of Christ in a nationwide program called "Be the Neighbor." Tulsa Race and Reconciliation weeks are centered around a justice-focused biblical curriculum based on Luke and Matthew. Youth will have opportunities to serve with local ministries and social service organizations. Drawing from Tulsa's history of racial violence in the Trail of Tears and the burning of "Black Wall Street," youth will learn from activists and church leaders who are determined to find hope and seek reconciliation and growth rather than simply lamenting the past. Youth will look back at the history of racism to understand why and how to address racism today and into the future. They will learn about types of racism, differences between equity and equality, and the racial wealth gap. Lessons learned will be brought home and put to work at St. Pauls and in Chicago.
