

Mark 6, excerpts

Jesus called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

When King Herod heard of it, for Jesus' name had become known, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him.

But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom." She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter." The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

The apostles gathered around Jesus and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest awhile."



THE LORD'S PRAYER



Petition Drive: Special Meeting of the CCPSA (Community Commission for Public Safety) on Pretextual Traffic Stops

Each day, the Chicago Police Department makes more than 1,000 traffic stops, with more than 44 percent of these stops involving minor traffic offenses (e.g., expired registration, an unlit headlight) rather than moving violations, such as speeding or driving under the influence. Officers use such stops as pretexts to investigate non-traffic-related criminal activity. However, contraband such as narcotics, weapons, guns, and alcohol are recovered in less than 1 percent of the stops. Please consider signing a petition sponsored by the Community Renewal Society and the Free2Move Coalition asking the CCPSA to hold a special meeting regarding pretextual traffic stops. If you would like to sign the petition and learn more about the issue, please seek out SPARC members who can point out Julia Ehrhardt, petition coordinator. She will be available after church in the Narthex and at coffee hour during June and July.

Preparing for Heat and Humidity This Week

The Chicago weather is expected to climb to 100 degrees during the coming week. Due to heavy rains, the ground is water saturated as well, and it will be humid. As the temperature rises, prepare by:

- 1. Looking at the hourly weather report and planning your day during times it is least hot.
- 2. Wear light, loose fitting clothing, preferably made of natural fabrics.
- 3. Drink water BEFORE you get thirsty.
- 4. Stay in air-conditioned places and in the deep shade during this extreme heat.

When it is hot, it is easy to buy already cold, pre-made drinks in single-use plastic bottles. Resist the temptation and carry your own non-plastic containers, flavoring them with lemon or cucumbers.

IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as St. Pauls.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 73. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 73. You cannot make QCDs from your 401K; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor. TODAY'S MUSIC

Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847), like Mozart, had a very short and artistically productive life. He was born in Germany, but a great source of his popularity lay outside his home country. He was especially beloved in England. Amongst his greatest accomplishments was the revival of the works of J.S. Bach, and the first "modern" performance of Bach's *St. Matthew Passion* since his death. *Elijah* is performed in England almost as often as *Messiah*, which is, of course, by another "adopted" German, Handel. This chorus, *Lift Thine Eyes*, for women's voices, is sung just before "*He watching over Israel*" in the oratorio.

Praise to the Living God was a text composed in 1861 by George J. Elvy (1816-1893). He was born in England, was an Anglican choir boy in his youth, and was knighted as an organist for his service to the Crown. This hymn also has an "alterer," Curtis Beach (1914-1993), who altered Elvey's original text slightly in 1966. The tune, DIADEMATA, also by George J. Elvey, was composed in 1868.

Be Thou My Vision is a lovely Irish folk tune, SLANE. The translation was made in 1905 from the original Gaelic by Mary E. Bryne (1880-1931), who was born in Ireland. She was a respected university level academic in Dublin.

Rise was composed in 2017 by Arianne Abela. She is currently the Director of Choral Activities at Amherst College where she directs the renowned Glee Club and Concert Choir. In addition to composing, she is very active as a choral clinician and conductor outside her Amherst appointment, including conducting the score for a Hollywood movie. She holds degrees from Smith College, Yale University and the University of Michigan. Licensed for non-commercial distribution through the Creative Commons BY-NC-ND 4.0 International License.

My Life Flows On in Endless Song was composed both the text and the tune, ENDLESS SONG, by Robert Lowry (1826-1899). Lowry was a preacher and scholar with a musical background from his childhood.

Our Prelude and Offertory are both based on *It Is Well With My Soul*. The hymn was composed by Philip L. Bliss (1836-1878) in 1876. He was a largely self-taught itinerant music teacher. He was converted at age 12 at a revival, and it was Dwight L. Moody (1837-1899), famous evangelist and founder of the Moody Bible Institute here in Chicago, who encouraged Bliss to become a singing evangelist. The text was written by Horatio G. Spafford (1828-1888) in 1873. He also gave the Bliss tune its name, VILLE DU HAVRE. The tune is the name of the ship carrying his wife and four daughters from Chicago to vacation in France. The ship sank in the Atlantic after a collision with another vessel, and only his wife survived. He wrote this text *after* this loss. The arrangement for the Prelude was made by Colleen Henry (1946-2014), mother of Brendan Henry, and wife of our Pastor Emeritus Thomas R. Henry (1943-2022). Timothy DeWitt, the arranger of the Offertory, teaches brass pedagogy at West Virginia University. He is a former member of the West Virginia Symphony Orchestra. Honors include being named Alderson Broaddus's Outstanding Faculty of the Year in 2006.

How Firm a Foundation, although of anonymous origin, is a true American hymn first published in Funk's *Genuine Church Music* in 1832. That hymnal is part of what is often referred to as the Sacred Harp, or shape-note hymnal, tradition in our country which began in the early 19th century. These treasures gained a rebirth during the bicentennial celebrations in 1976. Did you know that before the revival of this tune, FOUNDATION, this text was most often sung to the tune *Adeste Fideles (O Come All Ye Faithful)*? The text is also unattributed, but first discovered by John Rippon (1751–1836), who was an English Baptist clergyman. He noted the author as "K."

Periti autem is the second of *Two Sacred Pieces, Op. 115 No. 2*. The original composition was for male chorus and was composed in 1837 by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847). *Opus 115* was commissioned in 1837 by Johann Christian August Clarus (1774-1854), a physician in Leipzig and since 1836, rector of the University of Leipzig. He ordered the works for the annual ceremony to commemorate the medical professor, Dr. Christian Martin Koch (1752-1803). The Latin text is taken from the Book of Daniel 12:3, the opening of which is "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament." Geoffrey Bergler is trumpet player, composer, arranger, and member of the Seattle Symphony Orchestra.
