





Petition Drive: Special Meeting of the CCPSA (Community Commission for Public Safety) on Pretextual Traffic Stops

Each day, the Chicago Police Department makes more than 1,000 traffic stops, with more than 44 percent of these stops involving minor traffic offenses (e.g., expired registration, an unlit headlight) rather than moving violations, such as speeding or driving under the influence. Officers use such stops as pretexts to investigate non-traffic-related criminal activity. However, contraband such as narcotics, weapons, guns, and alcohol are recovered in less than 1 percent of the stops. Please consider signing a petition sponsored by the Community Renewal Society and the Free2Move Coalition asking the CCPSA to hold a special meeting regarding pretextual traffic stops. If you would like to sign the petition and learn more about the issue, please seek out SPARC members who can point out Julia Ehrhardt, petition coordinator. She will be available after church in the Narthex and at coffee hour during June and July.

CREATION CORNER - provided by Green Team

"The Dirty Dozen" – The Environmental Working Group (EWG) just published its list of the "Dirty Dozen," i.e., fruit and vegetables with the most pesticide residue: strawberries, spinach, kale, collards and mustard greens, peaches, pears, nectarines, apples, grapes, bell and hot peppers, cherries, and blueberries. If organics are not affordable or available, the pesticide residue can be mostly washed off by running water from thirty seconds to a minute. Produce with skins can be brushed and washed. For lettuce and cabbages, remove the outer leaves because they will have higher residues. When finished, do not forget to wash down the brush and sink.

IRA QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you have an IRA and are required, or will be required, to take a minimum annual distribution (RMD) from your account, you may be interested to know that there are tax advantages to taking your distribution as a direct contribution to a charitable organization such as St. Pauls.

If the distribution is made directly from your IRA to St. Pauls, then you enjoy two tax benefits: 1) the distribution does not count as taxable income and 2) the distribution does count towards satisfying your RMD if over age 73. The gift, called a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD), must go directly from your IRA to the organization, and your total gifts cannot exceed \$100,000 per year. You can make QCDs after you reach age 70 $\frac{1}{2}$, which is earlier than the current RMD age of 73. You cannot make QCDs from your 401K; it has to be rolled into an IRA first.

With the 2017 changes in the tax law, some have lost the ability to itemize their deductions, including charitable contributions, and are now taking the higher standard deduction. Making a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a great way to still get a tax benefit for charitable giving. If you have questions about QCDs, consult your tax or financial advisor. TODAY'S MUSIC

We Gather Together is an anonymous Dutch text from 1625 translated by renown musicologist and hymnodist, Theodore Baker (1851-1934). Baker was born in New York City, was educated in Leipzig, Germany, and wrote seminal books about classical composers, the music of the Seneca tribe, and a psalter hymnal. He also translated *Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming* from the original German. The tune, KREMSER, is also Dutch in origin and dates from the 16th century.

Madre'n la puerta'o niño is an unattributed Spanish Carol. It may seem odd to include a Christmas carol in worship in the heat of July, but it is worth remembering at this time in our country that Christ took on the suffering of this world as a poor child. There are so many instances now that should cause us to remember that Jesus said, "Whatever you did to the least of these, you did to me."

The text for *As We Gather at Your Table* was written in 1989 by Carl P. Daw Jr. (b. 1944). Daw is the son of a Baptist minister, has a Ph.D. in English literature and has penned a number of hymn texts. The tune, BEACH SPRING, is attributed to Benjamin F. White (1800-1879), and is first found in the great American shape-note hymnal, *The Sacred Harp*, which dates from 1844.

The text for *God You Have Set Us* was written in 1984 and revised in 1993 by Jane Parker Huber (1926-2008). She was one of the most prolific and forward thinking hymnodists of the last half of the 20th century, having authored more than 30 hymns. Our *New Century Hymnal* includes ten of her hymn texts, and we regularly sing *Called as Partners in Christ's Service*, one of her contributions to our hymnal. She advocated for women in her Presbyterian Church (USA) denomination, and in 2002, received its Woman of Faith Award. The tune NATIONAL HYMN was composed in 1876 by George Willian Warren (1928-1902). He was a largely self-trained musician born in Albany, New York, and became the organist at St. Thomas Episcopalian Church in New York City. The very nationalistic and militaristic text many of us associate with this stirring hymn, *God of Our Fathers*, was authored in 1876, the same year as the hymn tune by Daniel C. Roberts (1841-1897). It was written in celebration of our nation's centennial. He served in the Union Army in the Civil War before becoming an Episcopalian priest. **Drum sing' ich mit meinem Liede ewig** (My song shall alway be Thy mercy) is the ninth of ten movements of *Lobgesang* composed in 1840 by Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847). This larger work is often referred to as *Symphony No. 2*, although Mendelssohn never gave it that title. Mendelssohn chose texts mostly from the Psalms, but also included other texts from the Hebrew Bible in addition to two from the Christian Bible. The text for this duet combines verses from Psalms 28, 31 and 103. The singers extoll and praise God even in the midst of enemies and wandering in darkness.

Intermezzo in A Major, from *Six Pieces for Piano*, *Opus 118*, *No. 2* is a late work composed in 1893 by Johannes Brahms (1833-1897). Brahms was a great light not only in German Romantic music, but the entirety of Romantic music. He is often grouped with the "3 B's," Bach, Beethoven and Brahms. His music was championed early in his career by Robert Schumann and Brahms maintained a lifelong friendship with Clara Schumann after Robert died. After a long absence from composing music for solo piano, Brahms composed this and other piano solo works. His gift for both beauty and effortless counterpoint are obvious.

Lift Every Voice and Sing includes the joyous refrain that our Chancel Choir often sings as an Introit. The longer hymn is considered the unofficial anthem of black churches and the civil rights movement. J. Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954), the composer, and James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938), the poet, were brothers who crafted this wonderful hymn together. They also wrote Broadway musicals and edited song collections as a team. This text reflects both the struggles for civil rights and optimism about the future.

Danniebelle Hall (1938-2000) was a deeply committed Gospel artist who sought to evangelize through her singing and composing. She formed her own group, The Danniebelles, and was also a member of Andraé Crouch's The Disciples. She recorded several solo albums and toured around the world. *Keep Holding On* was composed and recorded in the 1980s.
