SCRIPTURE Gay Kelly

1 Kings 8:22-30

The priests brought the Ark of the Covenant of God to its place in the Inner Sanctuary, the Holy of Holies, under the wings of the cherubim. The outspread wings of the cherubim stretched over the Chest and its poles. The poles were so long that their ends could be seen from the entrance to the Inner Sanctuary, but were not noticeable farther out. They're still there today. There was nothing in the Ark but the two stone tablets that Moses had placed there at Horeb where God made a covenant with Israel after bringing them up from Egypt.

When the priests left the Holy Place, a cloud filled The Temple of God. The priests couldn't carry out their priestly duties because of the cloud. The glory of the Lord filled the temple.

Then Solomon spoke:

"The Lord has told us that he dwells in thick darkness where no one can see him; I've built this splendid Temple, O God, to mark your invisible presence forever."

The king then turned to face the congregation and blessed them:

"O Lord, God of Israel, there is no God like you in heaven above or on earth beneath, keeping covenant and steadfast love for your servants. The Lord has done what he said he would do: I have succeeded David my father and ruled over Israel just as God promised; and now I've built a Temple to honor God, and I've secured a place for the Ark that holds the covenant of God, the covenant that he made with our ancestors when he brought them up from the land of Egypt."

But will God indeed dwell on the earth? Even heaven and the highest heaven cannot contain you, much less this house that I have built! Regard your servant's prayer and his plea, O Lord my God, heeding the cry and the prayer that your servant prays to you today; that your eyes may be open night and day toward this house, the place of which you said, 'My name shall be there.'"

to care for creation,


to seek justice and to resist evil,

In life and death, in life beyond death, God is with us.





TODAY'S MUSIC

A bit of history - Today is the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Paris from the Nazis on August 25, 1944.

Johannes Brahms (1833-1897) is remembered primarily as a symphonist. In addition to works for piano, chamber music, and choir, he composed 200 songs. *Wie Melodien* (Like a melody) is part of Opus 105, No. 1 and dates from 1886. It is a love song that compares the beloved to a constant melody flowing through life.

O God Beyond All Praising is by Gustav Holst (1874–1934). The tune is called THAXTED, which is the main theme of the Jupiter movement from Holst's *The Planets*. It is truly a majestic hymn. Thaxted is the village where Holst grew up. Ralph Vaughan Williams adapted *Thaxted* as a hymn. The author of our text is Michael A. Perry (1942–1996). He began studies as a physicist and changed to theology.

Pam Woll, a member of our Chancel Choir and longtime member of St. Pauls, composed both the music and text of *The Angel's Words* in 2023. Today is its first performance. *The Angel's Words* is a wild guess at Mary's thoughts, prayers and perceptions right after the Angel has dropped the Annunciation on her and flown off to his next assignment. Asked about *The Angel's Words*, composer Pam Woll wrote, "I figured somebody should write a song that reaches out to that scared teenager who's just found out she's going to give birth to a helpless, vulnerable baby—a baby who will eventually be tasked with the salvation of the world. It portrays her as an essentially humble young person struggling to get her head around an enormous sense of destiny and purpose."

Over My Head is another text and melody from the great wealth of spirituals. Its present version was arranged in 1981 by Verolga Nix (1933-2014), a world class pianist and graduate of Oberlin Conservatory, and J. Jefferson Cleveland (1937-1986), one of the most important scholars of African American spirituals. Cleveland and Nix collaborated on a seminal work about African American music, *Songs of Zion*. It is actually a shortened version that includes only the very catchy refrain of a longer song.

Take My Gifts is a relatively new text (1998) penned by Shirley Erena Murray (1931- 2020). She lived her entire life in New Zealand, wrote numerous hymn texts, married a Presbyterian minister, and was committed to both inclusive language and the use of Maori language in some texts. TALAVERA TERRACE was composed by another New Zealander, Colin Gibson (b. 1933). He wrote many hymns, both texts and music, collaborated often with Murray, and was a professor in a theater department at a university in his homeland.

O Love was composed in 2016 by contemporary composer, Elaine Hagenberg. She has won composition competitions from the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) and is sought after as a choral clinician. She chose to set the poetry of George Matheson (1842-1906), who was born in Glasgow, Scotland, and lost his sight in his youth. Still, he graduated from the University of Edinburgh, became a parish minister and wrote numerous hymn texts. Many of us know this text to the hymn tune, ST. MARGARET, composed in 1884 by an English contemporary of Matheson, Albert L. Peace (1844-1912).

I Will Lift the Cloud of Night was composed and written by Charles P. Jones (1865–1949) in 1910. The tune is the composer's last name, JONES. The Reverend Jones was an African American and founder of the Church of Christ. He composed more than 1,000 gospel hymns, both music and texts.

In Peace was composed by B.K. Riha, a contemporary composer, music educator, vocalist, conductor, live looper, and arranger who specializes in pop a cappella vocal music for treble ensembles. She received her Masters of Music in Choral Conducting at Kent State University and is currently on the faculty of Tiffin University.
