


PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Be still, my soul; thy best, thy heav'nly Friend through thorny ways leads to a joyful end.


Be still, my soul; thy God doth undertake to guide the future as He has the past.



Crops Also Have Excessive Sweating Days

The excessive heat and humidity which ended last night, drove the Midwest indoors and forced animals to seek cover, was also accompanied by "corn sweat," which itself contributed to the high humidity— a reminder that we are part of a great chain of being.

"The heat [was] accompanied by two sources: moist air streaming from the Gulf of Mexico and "corn sweat": The latter happens when corn, soybeans and other crops release moisture as temperatures climb." We are surrounded by millions of acres of soy, corn, sorghum and wheat, whose own adaptation to climate change exacerbated the problem! (Andrea Thompson, The Scientific American, August 36, 2024).

TODAY'S MUSIC

The *Allemande* from the *French Suite No. 4 in E Flat Major*, BWV 815 was composed sometime between 1722 and 1725 by Johann Sebastian Bach (165-1750) while he was the court musician in Köthen. The suites were composed for his students as a way to build their technique. The original was in the book that was given to Bach's second wife, Anna Magdelena. Allemande is a lyric slow Baroque dance form, and it is the first movement of six in this suite.

Precious Lord was composed by Thomas A. Dorsey (1899-1993). Dorsey's likeness was recently added to our music windows on the south aisle along with J.S. Bach and Mahalia Jackson (1911-1972). He began his career as a blues pianist and songwriter. Later he became a church choir director here in Chicago at Pilgrim Baptist Church and was a co-founder of the National Convention of Gospel Choirs and Choruses. Widely known as the "father of the gospel song," he played an important role in the development of African American gospel music. This is his best-known song and was composed following the tragic double death of his first wife, Nettie, and their newborn son in 1932. It was a great comfort to Mr. Dorsey in his grief, as well as countless others who have sung it. Among those who sang it with Dorsey was Mahalia Jackson.

The text of *I Come With Joy* was written by Brian Wren (b. 1936), a pastor in the Congregational Church in England. He wrote the hymn as a summary of a series of sermons on the meaning of communion. The tune is an old American hymn, DOVE OF PEACE, from the *Southern Harmony* hymnal, part of the Sacred Harp tradition. It was arranged by Austin Lovelace (1919-2010), who was organist and choirmaster for a number of years at First United Methodist Church in Evanston.

O For a World is a paraphrase of the 1739 hymn text, *O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing* by the famous Methodist hymnist and theologian Charles Wesley (1707-1788). This text was written in 1982 by Mirian Therese Winter (b. 1938) for the Presbyterian Women's Triennial Conference. She is a Medical Mission Sister, having served in Africa and in this hemisphere. The tune, AZMON, was composed in 1828 by C. G. Glaser (1781-1829) and was later adapted to the melody we know by Lowell Mason (1792-1872). Glaser was a German composer who was educated at St. Thomas Church in Leipzig, the home church of and in the generation following the death of Bach. Dr. Mason was considered the "Father of American Church Music." He was born and educated in New York.

Be Still My Soul is a familiar hymn tune to us. The melody was composed by Jean Sibelius (1865–1957) as part of his famous tone poem *Finlandia* that honored his homeland. The original German text is by Kathrina von Schlegel (1697–17??) and it was translated into English by Scottish Jane Borthwick (1813–1897), who translated and composed many hymn texts. This duet arrangement is by Canadian Andrew Hawryluk, who in addition to composing and arranging music, has a "day job" in mechanical engineering focusing on fluid mechanics.

Issac Watts (1674-1748) penned the text for *Our God Our Help in Ages Past* in 1719. It is a poetic setting of Psalm 90. We sing Watts' setting of Psalm 23 before and as part of the Offertory Anthem. The tune, ST. ANNE, was likely composed in 1708 by William Croft (1677-1727) in London. He became the organist at Westminster Cathedral. As a side note, Bach's famous *Prelude and Fugue in E Flat Major* BWV 552 (1735-36) is often referred to as "St. Anne" because Bach seems to quote that tune in the final theme of the "triple fugue." There is no way Bach would have heard or known that tune, but it certainly is an interesting apocryphal story.

The duet, *Wir eilen mit schwachen, doch emsigen Schritten,* (We hurry with feeble yet eager footsteps) follows the brilliant opening chorus of the cantata *Jesu, du meine Seele* (Jesus, thou my soul) BWV 78, composed in 1724 by J.S. Bach (1685-1750) for Thomaskirche in Leipzig. The cantata is one of three surviving cantatas Bach composed for the 14th Sunday after Trinity (Pentecost in the modern liturgical calendar), which would be from the middle to the end of August. Bach cantatas had to follow the lessons in the Lutheran lectionary. Cantatas were designed as teaching tools, similar to musical sermons, based on the bible. This duet relates to one of the assigned lessons for that Sunday from the epistle Galatians 5: 16-24, where the believer is admonished to "walk in the Spirit." Here, the two soloists ask Jesus to help them hurry to follow him with joy even when they are "feeble" both physically and in faith.

I Sing the Mighty Power of God is another great text by Issac Watts (1674-1848), the eminent English poet, who set the entire books of Psalms as poetry, including Psalm 90, Our God Our Help in Ages Past. His poetry has inspired many composers. The tune, ELLACOMBE, is unattributed and of German origin, first published in a hymnal in 1784. In the 19th century, the tune was named for a village in Devonshire.

I Saw the Light was composed and recorded in 1952 by Hank Williams (1923-1953). He was a beloved country music singer and composer. In his all-too-short life, he recorded 35 singles, 11 of which reached No. 1 on the Country & Western charts.

Most important, over the past 179 years we are glad to have introduced thousands of children and adults to the amazing, inclusive, life changing, uplifting love of God. We do so in worship that is traditional, but far from conventional.
